#### Game Commission To Set Dates For Coming Seasons

The 1962 hunting seasons in more than 100 regulatory counties in Texas will be set July 20 by the Game and Fish Commission, according to H. D. Dodgen executive secretary.

Public hearings have been held in these counties throughout the state, where any changes in regulations are recommended, and surveys of conditions are now being compiled in readiness for the regular summer meeting of mmission. According to Dodgen, the 1962 season will be basically the same as in 1961, with the exception that a bonus deer may be allowed in several additional counties this season because of the increase in the deer population.

It is expected also that the dove season will be set at that time, following receipt of the blanket date which is expected shortly from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. It is not expected that the dates will be changed this year, but because of a decrease in dove population, it is entirely posible that there will be a bag limit reduction.

It is also indicated that there will be at least a two-day whitewing season in the Rio Grande Valley, subject to the final decision of the Commission. Again, there has been a reduction in the whitewing population in the Valley counties.

Quail season in the regulatory counties may not be set until the October meeting, awaiting information on this year's crop. Bioogists say that right now is too early to get firm indications on the quail crop.

#### No Steam Rollers At Post Office, Harkins Says

When a postal patron receives a damaged parcel, the comment is sometimes made that "It must have been run over with a steamroller." The Post Office Department operates approximately 85,-000 vehicles of types, but no "steam rollers", according to Jolly Harkins, officer in charge of the local post office.

In fact, every effort is made to avoid damage to mail while it is in the custody of the post office. The greatest single cause of damage that does occur is from cartons collapsing under the weight of other mail.

"Plenty of care and good common sense is the rule to follow when mailing anything of a fragile nature," the officer in charge stated. He offered these important tips to assure that parcels arrive at their destinaion in good condition:

1. Select a container that is the right size and strong enough to retain and protect the contents from weight of other mail. Boxes or cartons of corrugated or solid fibreboard, or kraftboard, are recommended. Small articles may be mailed in a chipboard carton if it is of sufficient durability to withstand the pressures of other mail. Suit boxes or shoe boxes do not provide adequate protection and are not recommended

2. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to protect the contents from outside impact. If two or more items are mailed in the same carton, each should be wrapped and cushioned to avoid damaging one another. Fragile items should be cushioned with at least two inches of shredded paper or excelsior on all sides.

3. Parcels containing fragile or delicate articles such as glass chinaware, radios, etc., should always be marked "Fragile".

4. Place a complete and legible address on one side of pare cel only. If address labels are used, secure them to clean, uncontacted wrapper or carton, and as an added precaution against loss, enclose a duplicate label inside the parcel.

A few extra moments spent in properly preparing a parcel for mailing will greatly enhance the prospects of its delivery in good condition. Patrons desiring to know about the "art" of proper packing may obtain the Post Of fice Department's free booklet "How to Pack and Wrap Parcels for Mailing" by contacting the Post Office Department

AUSTIN-That "safe driver insurance plan" with its penalty points for traffic law violations and accidents goes out the window August 1.

State Board of Insurance bowed to legislators' demands that it be greatly modified. But Board members felt it would be better to scrap the whole thing, and try to work out some other plan for a later adoption.

Most Texans will find that the abandonment of the merit rating plan will cost them money. This despite the facct that insured Texas car owners taken as a whole will pay \$10,000,000 less for car insurance in the coming year than they did this year.

However, two-thirds of the car owners, those who have been getting 20 per cent discounts because they have had no accidents or reported traffic convictions, will pay the full rates in the year ahead. The other one-third, those who have been paying as much as 100 per cent extra because of bad driving records, will save substantially. They will pay the same rates as everyone else.

One factor in the decision to drop the plan was concern by members of the Board, and the insurance industry, over the increasing number of car owners who just were doing without insurance. Board members felt that to increase the penalties, which would have been necessary to maintain the 20 per cent discount for the "safe drivers", would drive even more people into uninsurance. This would have made the safe driving insurance plan tically

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert advised the Texas Board of Education that the Available School Fund's income for the 1962-63 school year should be \$197,058,604. The revenue is reaped from ad valorem taxes, poll taxes, interest on securities the school fund owns, motor fuel taxes, omnibus taxes and other rev-

Board deducted \$8,737,536 to finance cost of purchasing and handling textbooks, and divided the balance between Texas' 2. 387,234 children of school age.

So, the public schools will get \$78.50 per child next year; \$2.00 less for each than they were allotted in 1961.

While the 21-member board was on the subject of money, it passed a \$459,877,843 education budget for 1963, and offered State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar a \$4,000.00 annual raise through federal funds.

Edgar "declined the honor," saving he felt his three assistants are more entitled to supplements since they are directly concerned with administaring federal programs

So, raises from \$11,000 to \$13, 500 were voted for L. R. Graham. assistant commissioner of adminstration; Lee J. Wilborn, assistant commissioner for instruction. and M. A. Browning, assistant commissioner for vocational edu-

Then the board agreed to ask the 58th Legislature to raise Edgar's salary of \$18,500 a year to \$24,000 when it convenes in Jan

Cream of the Crop A preliminery glance at the Texas Education Agency's survey of 80,000 teachers revealed that the state's public schools system is getting the "cream of the crop" of high school graduates. Study chairman R. W. Byram of Austin said that new teachers came from

In the year ending August, 196 they spent \$223.67 apiece on 23,-150 full-time student equivalents. but the per capita cost leaped \$42.91 to an average of \$266.58 for each of 26,075 student equivalents a total of \$6, 951,000.

Although 37,175 full and parttime students are actually enrolled in the state schools, the legislature bases its appropriations on the total number of semester hours taken, divided by 15 (a full time course load).

Biggest share of the current appropriation of almost \$7,000,-000 went to San Antonio Junior College, which got \$775,750 for its 3,323 stuudent equivalents. Clarendon Junior College, which has 113 student equivalents, was 32nd on the list with 58 per cent share of \$40,600.

Railroad Commission Chairman William J. Murray, Jr., surprised Capitol newsmen this week by issuing a denial of rumors about the East Texas Oil Field scandal before he even was asked about

He introduced, and then denied a rumor that the Railroad Commission has provided the major oil companies with damageable evidence against independent operators through inclination tests but said Attorney General Will Wilson has "changed the rules' by accepting contributions for directional tests from the big oil firms, and providing information

Murray also refuted rumors that some crooked-hole operators were under his protection. He admitted that he has friends among those under investigation, but stated he'd granted no favors: "I swear that I have treated them alike - independents and majors -and will continue to do so," he added. He further stated that he has not accepted money for campaign expenses in any of the political races he's run since his 1947 appointment to the commission.





#### Sterile Flies Now Produced At Mission Plant

The first box of sterile screw worm flies from the new production plant at Mission came off the assembly line Wednesday of last week and were released over Southern Texas last Friday

"This is a great day in the short history of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Pro-Sexual sterility of screwworm

fries is accomplished by subjecting pupae to radiation from cobalt-60, which emits gamma rays. Pupae are then packaged in cartons, held until they emerge as flies, and then dropped by airplane. About 3 to 5 per cent of the total fly production is not sterilized and provides brood stock for continued production The fly colony was established on Sunday, June 17, the day after formal dedication of the plant. All operations of the plant are timed to coincide with the normal life cycle of the screw-

"We now have a plant to produce from 50 up to 75 million sterile flies per week, the volume needed for eradication of this costly livestock pest in tho Southwest," Marvin J. Bridges. executive director of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, commented.

"The increased supply of sterile flies from this plant will not only greatly strengthen the eradication effort, but also will provide flies for future tests on establishing and maintaining a barrier zone to be formed by continuously releasing sterile flies along portions of the U.S.-Mexican border," Dr. S. C. Gartman assistant veterinarian in charge Animal Disease Eradication Division, U.S. Department of Agriculture, added.

Program officials outlined the plans for months ahead. The temporary facilities at Kerrville will continue to produce about 23 million flies per week as production at the Mission plant is increased. The Kerrville unit will be gradually closed and personnel and equipment transfer red to Mission.

Plans are for the Mission plant to build up to around 50 million flies per week within the next 2

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to 3 months, the average production called for in the program budget. This will then be increased for a short period to the 75million capacity.

This production will provide for release of sterile flies in those areas where overwintering populations must be eliminated where outlying outbreaks threaten to spill over into an area already free of screwworms, and to maintain the artificial barrier Flies will not be used in areas where cold weather can be expected to eliminate in a short time any threat to a screwwormfree overwintering area.

Flies are now being released in Texas over a 60-000-square mile area below a line that runs from Del Rio northeast to Coleman, east to Comanche, and southeast to Port O'Conner, plus 7,000 square miles in souther New Mexico.

However, fly release will re main flexible because of unpredictable circumstances. For ex ample, the size of the screwworm overwintering asea varies ith the severity of the winters. Also shipments of infested livestock could also cause premature spring outbreaks in northern portions and require concentrated fly release for quick control.


