LISTEN TO LUKE

The junior rodeo will be here this weekend and everyone here should make every effort to show the visitors a hearty welcome. A big crowd is expected in town and one of the things which impresses visitors is the attitude of the local people, good or bad.

Let's keep the name of Sanderson synonymous with "friendliness."

The hot weather continues to hang on and rain continues to evade this area.

This blistering sun is taking its toll of damage to the country, to the dispositions of the people, and to the condition of livestock. The annual movement of lambs from ranches of the country is in progress and we have not heard of any heavy lambs being shipped out this year, either.

There has been a heavy demand for water by domestic users this summer in efforts to keep lawns, flowers, and trees alive. We have heard reports of some young trees that actually burned up in the hot sun.

We keep thinking every day will be the last hot dry day for a spell, but wishes are like that. We fear that one of these days we are going to get all of our share of rainfall at once and the dry and bare conditions of the ground on the Sanderson Canyon watershed west and northwest of here is going to put a little more water in Sanderson Canyon than we bargained for.

We have long been of the opinion that several small dams on Sanderson Canyon and 3-mile to hold water through dry seasons and to retard water during wet seasons, would be most advantageous.

We doubt that such dams ever would hold enough water — due to their potential size, for water sports, such as fishing, boating or skiing, but they would be good for putting a little moisture back into the ground around here and to hold water here to be used to water stock on the ranches where the dams were, to furnish some vaporation which might possibly help slightly, and last, but by no means least, possibly prevent a flood that could do a lot of damage in Sanderson.

Now if you don't think we are optimists, talking about a flood on Tuesday afternoon when it's hotter than the hinges on the gates of Hades and about as far from rain as we have ever seen!

Our water district manager reports that this summer has been the highest ever in water consumption locally, due to the lack of rainfall, and it has also been comparatively easy summer in their efforts to stay ahead of the demand water-wise.

The utilization of the good wells leased from the railroad company, probably is the cause of that and the people of the water district need to be eternally grateful that we have an ample, but not abundant, water supply and that it is good water, too!

We are forever amazed at the number of people who have most attractive yards under the adverse conditions with which we labor perpetually.

We would also like to refute completely and for good, the rumors that keeping a nice yard is absolutely prohibitive here. If it were prohibitive there would not be so many yards that were so green and we would not be one of those who tries to keep a good yard.

We appreciate our yard, as do most people who have a nice grassy turf and shade, and we are always glad we have it.

We are all for more people becoming interested in having a prettier yard.

The Sanderson Little League All-Stars lost a thriller and extra innings game to Marfa Tuesday night by a 9-7 score. The game was tied at 7-7 at the end of the regular 6-inning game.

The baserunner tried to run over the catcher, but Munson came up with the ball, preventing the score.

Sanderson had three on in the bottom of the seventh, with none out, and were unable to score.

Carlos Garza was on the mound for the all-stars for the first six innings and because of league rules, was replaced by Pablo Ochoa who pitched the last two. Regulations for the selection of a Little League All-Star team are that there will be no more than nine 12-year-olds providing that two of them are a pitcher and catcher, at least two nine or 10-year-olds, and the balance of the team may be 11-year-olds.

Highway Patrolmen Sought by DPS

"Applications for Patrolmen are now being accepted for our next Recruit Patrol School," said Captain Ray Butler, acting regional commander of the Midland DPS region this week.

"We will accept applications from young men between the ages of 21 and 35 years, who can meet our qualifications until August 6th, as we will need time to examine, grade, investigate, and interview successful applicants before the beginning of our next school on October 2, 1962," Butler stated.

The next recruit examination will be given at Abilene, Midland, El Paso, and San Angelo, Saturday, August 11. Applicants must be 21 to 35 years of age, at least 5 feet 8 inches tall, have a high school diploma or its equivalent, in perfect physical condition, including vision 20-30 or better, be of good moral character, and be able to satisfactorily pass the entrance examination.

Those interested are encouraged to contact the nearest DPS office for application forms. Another recruit school is scheduled to begin February 26, 1963.

Trans-Pecos Season Is 15 Days For Hunting Deer

Deer season in the Trans-Pecos area of Texas will be December 1 to 15 this year, according to alterations in game seasons authorized by the Texas Game and Fish Commission. The Trans-Pecos includes Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidio, Reeves, Terrell, and Val Verde Counties.

The season on elks in Texas was set for the same period.

There was no change announced in the bag limit or possession limit on deer, which is two white tail deer, or one whitetail and one black tail, and only one blacktail.

Antelope season in the Trans-Pecos area this year will be extended to cover two weekends, September 29 through October 7.

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AUSTIN—In an effort to "prevent confusion to occupants, mail men and the public" when the second of two sleek, pink marble State Office Buildings on the Capitol grounds is completed soon, the State Building Commission re-named them after famous Texas patriots.

First State Office Building — generally referred to as "S.O.B. No. 1"—now is designated as the Sam Houston State Office Building; the second, called "S. O. B. No. 2," was named after John H. Reagan, first chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission and Postmaster General of the Confederacy.

Licensing Study Scheduled. House Speaker James A. Turman named Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont chairman of a new committee to study operations of Texas' Examining and Licensing Boards.

Reps. Sam Collins of Newton, Ben Atwell of Dallas, Don Gladden of Fort Worth and Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi will serve on the committee.

Study group was set up to effect "an even greater understanding among the licensing boards and the Legislature," Turman said.

Objects of their research will be the 23 State examining and licensing boards organized for the purpose of testing every prospective practitioner of plumbing,

law, cosmetology, medicine, barbering or hairdressing and 18 other professions and trades in Texas.

Textbooks Publicized

State Commissioner of Education J. W. Edgar sent a list of 203 textbooks, offered for adoption by Texas schools, to all county and independent school district superintendents, and recommend that the list be publicized so the public will know it's available.

Textbooks are those which the State Textbook Committee is studying for the 1963-64 school year. Number must be sifted down to 82 by October. This approved list then will be turned to the State Board of Education.

Between September 1 and 15 the committee will hear any objections private citizens may have to the books. Last fall, there were plenty of protests.

Major complaint was that the objectors didn't know which

books were being considered in time to examine them fully. Strong Voice Silent

When the Texas Railroad Commission held its monthly hearing to determine the August oil allowable, representatives from the major companies and independents were heard, but the strong voice of Commissioner Gen. Ernest O. Thompson was missing.

As one oilman after the other went up to urge a low eight-day allowable, no member of the Railroad Commission challenged them. If "the General" had been there, he might have done so, but he was seriously ill in his home in Amarillo.

Property Tax Still Low

The State's Automatic Tax Board kept to the lowest legal minimum when it set the state ad valorem tax rate for next year at 42 cents on each \$100 valuation.

Tax boards have kept the state's property "tax take" down to the minimum for several years now. It was up to 77 cents per \$100 valuation before a 30-cent general revenue tax was abolished in 1951.

Coke and Tom Green counties and the Dallas County Flood Control District are the only exceptions to the new rate. Rate is 30 cents in these three areas.

The 42-cent tax rate will provide 35 cents for free public school purposes; two cents for Confederate and Texas Ranger pensions and the State Building Commission fund; and five cents for the college building fund.

Short Snorts

While many other state departments were recommending increases in the biennial budgets, the General Land Office decided to ask for an \$82,000 cut. Commissioner Jerry Sadler said new

electronic accounting equipment could get credit for the proposed cut.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson collected a \$185,873 judgement from the U. S. government to cover cost of re-routing 3.7 miles of F. M. Road 184 in Coryell County, which the federal government wanted to develop Fort Hood.

Members of the Texas Water Commission and the Water Development Boards have been conferring with the Governor's Water Conservation Committee to map out plans for conservation storage if the Constitutional Amendment on that subject passed in November.

Attorney General's office received three contributions from independent oil operators this week to help defray the cost of directional surveys to locate illegally-deviated wells in East Texas. General Crude Oil Company of Houston donated \$2,500;

Goldston Oil Corporation of Houston \$1,000; and Vaughn Petroleum, Inc. of Dallas \$200.

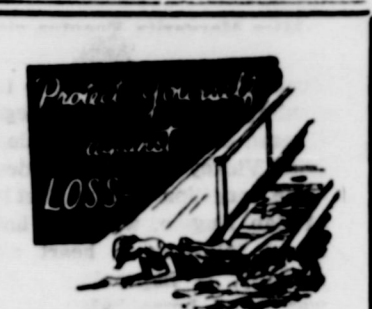

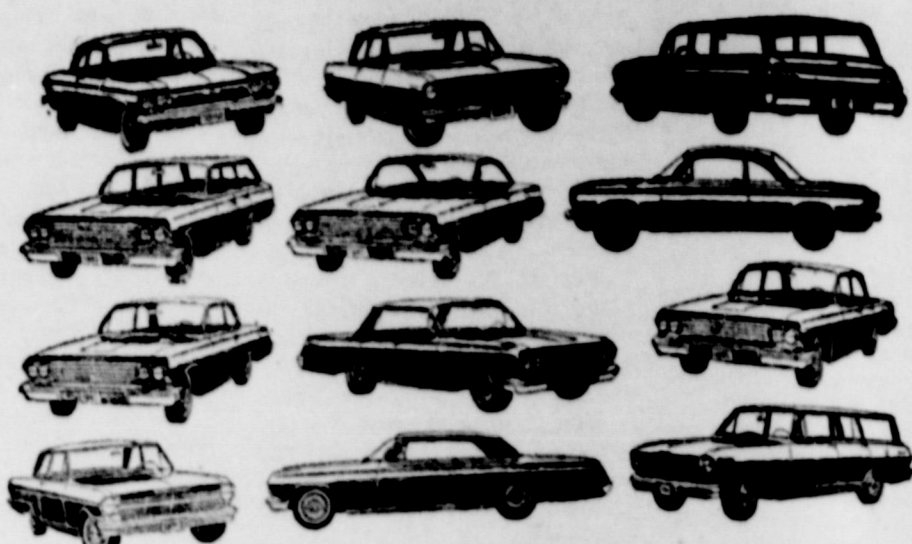
