(1) The name of the applicant is Austin Nance and J. H. Benton, a co-partnership, doing business as SANDERSON CABLE COMPANY, Post Office Box 262, Sanderson, Texas.

The community or area to be served is the town of Sanderson in Terrell County, Texas.

The transmitter site is proposed to be located 30 miles northwest of Sanderson, Texas, on the Gene Thorn Ranch in Brewster County, Texas, and at 30 degrees 08 minutes North Latitude and 102 degrees 55 minutes West Longitude.

(2) The application is for a new VHF television translator station.

(3) The date the application was filed with the FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION was July 25, 1962, and the File Number assigned by the Commission is BPTTV-1559 for Ch. No. 12.

(4) The output channel on which the said station proposes to operate is Channel 12, and the power proposed to be used is 1 WATT, and the effective radiated power from the proposed transmitting antenna is 30.9876 WATTS.

(5) No change in an authorized facility is sought.

(6) No amendment to an application is sought.

(7) The translator station intends to engage in rebroadcasting. The only station whose signals it is intended to rebroadcast is KOSA-TV, Channel 7, Odessa, Texas.

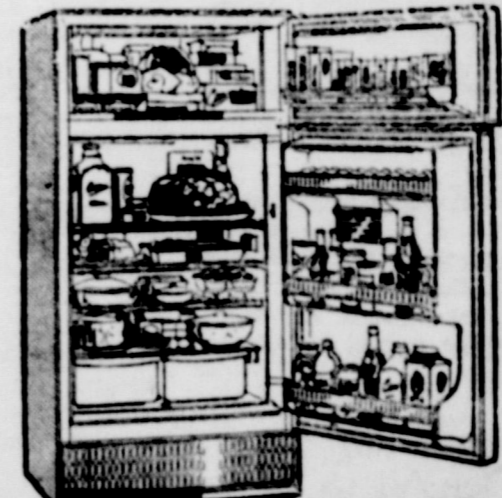
