Rainfall Record For Sanderson For Year Noted

The rainfall record for Sanderson for 1962 has been given The Times by Ervin Grigsby, official weather recorder for the U.S. Weather Bureau.

The rainfall for 1962 totals 1.67 inches, with .33 being the most rainfall received at any one time. There was some moisture in each month during the year with the exception of May and August, with .39 being the most rain in any one month.

The record is as follows: January .05; February .33; March .39; April .38; May 0; June .36 in two showers of .33 and 03: July 16 in two showers of 11 and .05; and August 0. In 1961 there was a total of 14.

35 inches of rainfall with some rain recorded in every month.

Educational Plans Come Before Draft, SS Director Says

Students who plan to continue their studies in colleges or universities and those planning to enter their freshman year should not let draft calls interfere with these educational plans, according to Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director. who heads the 137 Texas draft boards.

"Students will be considered for scholastic deferment and will, in all probability, be given the deferment if they are full-time students and are making passing grades," Col. Schwartz said.

"Of course, there is no such thing as a blanket deferment for students," he continued. "Local draft boards grant student deferments on the basis of their best judgment, based on their regulatory powers and the individual merit of each case."

The state Selective Service director pointed out that, under present policy, no one is drafted under age 22, except the volunteer or the man who wilfully evades the law.

He counseled students to seek deferments from their local boards when these deferments are needed for the students to complete their college or university work.

Some college students also get deferments for their activity as students taking military training This activity includes ROTC and other officer-training programs and enlistment in the National Guard and reserve organizations of the armed forces.

Colonel Schwartz urged young men, both in and out of college. to seek information and understanding from their draft boards.



Very few cars and trucks in Texas are taxed through the ad valorem tax program. Some counties, cities, and school districts tax them, but close to 80 per cent of the vehicles go untaxed. So the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy proposes that something be done about it.

An Amendment to the constitution is their recommendation. They suggest an amendment exempting motor vehicles from the property tax, but allowing the Legislature to tax them.

Plan is to have the Legislature set up a procedure by which a state board would determine the value of all makes and models of motor vehicles. Then the county tax asesssor-collector would collect a tax at the rate of \$1.50 per \$100 of market value when license



Texas Water Commission en-

gineers have calculated the kinetic energy released by Hurricane Carla. They figure the energy exerted over a 24-hour period is equal to 8,700 20-megaton nuclear devices. In other words, it amounted to

a 20-megaton atomic bomb exploded every 10 seconds for 24 hours

State engineers agreed that man can do nothing about the wind involved in such a great force. But they felt that man can protect the land from tidal waters. Galveston County engineers proposed that the island city's seawall be raised six feet.

More Taxes? Legislators and citizens who thought the state's money problem was solved by the sales tax, which took effect a year ago September 1, have another think coming.

Budget requests by state agencies predict another huge increase in public school and college costs in the two-year period starting September 1, 1963, Laws already on the books will divert about \$55,000,000 a year more from the State Treasury to the public schools, without any new

legislative action.

College and university administrators, expecting a new flood of high school graduates, say they need \$40,000,000 a year more to take care of them. This includes \$10,000,0000 a year for the University of Houston, which will be the state's second-largest univerity when it joins the state system in 1963.

So budget-makers are thinking in terms of another tax law of some kind. Only a fast upturn in business conditions, bringing new cash into the treasury from existing taxes, can relieve the situation

Legislators, campaigning this fall, will have a chance to offer voters their suggestions. Some think the exemption on groceries. medicine and low-cost clothing should be taken out of the new sales tax law. Redistricting

There have been rumors of lawsuits to come, ever since the U.S. Supreme Court held that

the courts can force states to redistrict, for legislative purposes. if their systems are patently discriminatory.

But it took Giles Miller of Dallas to bring the first suit. The Republican sued State Treasurer Jesse James, to prevent him from paying the salaries of state offic ials who make up an ex-off-cid legislative redistricting board. That is the body which is supposed to meet and redistrict, if the Legislature fails to do so. Miller's suit departs from pro


