## False Report of **Wreck Given Tuesday Night**

A false report of a wreck 10 miles east of Dryden was given to Texas Highway Patrolman Malcom Bollinger Jr. Tuesday night. The person reporting the accident stated that the sheriff. Highway Patrolman, and ambulance were needed at the scene of the accident.

Mrs. Bolinger first answered the phone when the call came and Mr. Bolinger asked her to inquire the name of the person making the report. He gave a name and Mr. Bolinger picked up the phone and the party calling hung up their phone, according

to Mr. Bolinger. Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey was notified and a car coming from the east was stopped and they stated that there had been no accident in that direction. Sheriff Cooksey called W. V. Munson, operator of the Sanderson Ambulance Service, and asked him to make a "dry run" out east so that they could check on the possibility of determining the person who made the call.

Sheriff Cooksey stated that a determined effort is being made to find the person guilty of reporting false accidents and that prosecution to the full extent of the law will be sought when the guilty one is apprehended.

It has been pointed out repeat edly that such calls are dangerous, costly, and could prove serious in many ways. In answering an emergency call, the officers and ambulance drive at higherthan-usual speeds, so that they can give aid to injured or distressed people, and possibly prevent another accident because of the wreckage. Traveling at such speeds is dangerous to the officers, and ambulance driver; and costly to go a 60-mile round trip in two or three vehicles.

One of the great dangers, it has been pointed out, is the fact that some actual and real emergency could occur during the absence of the officers and ambulance on a false run.

## **Tracks Restored** After Derailment

Southern Pacific Railway workers got the railroad's main line open at Tesnus Monday morning The track was destroyed and 44 freight cars derailed last Wednesday 34 miles west of Sander-

Several hundred feet of "shoofly" track was built around the wreckage and trains were held to

20 mph on the shoo-fly. The cars that were only lightly damaged were placed back on the track and pulled to Sanderson for repairs. Others will be taken by flat-car to San Antonio shops for repair, while still others will be brought to Sander-

son for salvage. It was presumed that a broken flange on the wheel of the first of the 44 cars derailed, caused the accident to the 86-car train. The derailed cars were loaded with copper bullion, catsup, canned goods, and lumber.

A unique accident caused extensive damage to a carload of automobiles between here and Del Rio the first of the week. Some refrigerator car doors on a gondola car came loose from the moorings and shifted. When the train went over a bridge, a part of the load caught on the girders, pulling several of the doors from the car. The next car back was a double-decked load of panel and delivery trucks and the doors struck almost every one of the vehicles on the car and caused severe damage to each of






