Austin - The commisisoners acted on several proclamation changes, at their October 12 meting. The most important changes occurred in the quail seasons for several regulatory authority ar-

eas. The quail season for the Trans-Pecos Dstrict was set back two weeks also, to allow for a late hatch. It is set for Nov. 15-Jan. 13. There will be no open season on Mearns' quail, commonly called "fool quail". Bag limit will be 12 per day and 24 in possession.
