LISTEN TO LUKE

According to information we got from the meeting of the directors of the area Soil Conservation District, the possibility for floor prevention dams on Sanderson Canyon are good or better, depending upon how many local people get behind the project. It seems that the state Water Board men and area and local Soil Conservation men are interested and willing to do what they can, but until and unless the people of Sanderson and Terrell County get behind it, there will be nothing done.

There would be very little cost to maintenance of the dams and main channel once the project is completed and likewise little cost in the actual construction or engineering.

We feel that such a project is worthy of the consideration of local individuals and organizations. And so do the representatives from the State Water Board and the State Soil Conservation Service.

If, by the erection of the dams there are other benefits to the ranchmen and to the town of Sanderson, then everybody is all the happier.

We would appreciate having comments from others about the project.

Deer hunting season will be on as before we know it. And then the first thing we know it will be Christmas. Thanksgiving is practically here already.

Time sure flies!

We doubt that there will be much good deer meat brought in this year if what we hear is a true picture of the entire area.

Ranchmen say the old mossheads are in good shape, but the young deer are not in so good a condition.

The hunting season draws a big crowd of people to this area each year, and few of those hunters care if the deer are in good condition or not. As long as they can get a shot, that's all they want.

We appreciated the remarks of our friends concerning what was said in this column last week. Some agreed and some disagreed, which is what we expected.

But when people have thought about it — one way or another — enough that they will come by and say something, then that is good.

The resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department will be here within the next few days and work will begin on the preliminary stages of the construction of a new road through the "Big Hill" area and the widening and reconstruction of U.S. 90 for a pretty good stretch between Sanderson and Dryden.

Quite extensive work is being done on US 285 between Sanderson and Fort Stockton, and work is also being done on RM 2400 between US285 and 1217.

With the new resident engineer will be some other Highway Department employees moving here. We are glad to welcome all newcomers to our town.

There has been some talk around town about doing something to make the intersection of 1st St. and Hackberry more safe for motorists. There are lots of opinions about how this could be done and maybe we should try all of them, even simultaneously, if necessary, to cut down on traffic accidents at that corner.

After listening to all the suggestions, we like this one best: Eliminate the parking of cars so close to the corner as to prevent good visibility where buildings do not presently interfere.

But this creates a problem, too. Where will the cars park that are presently parked up to the corner?

Skin Patch Test Given Last Week To School Pupils

The tuberculosis skin patch test was given to the pupils of the first, second, and fifth grades of the elementary school last week.

Only two positive reactions to the test were noted and further tests will be given those children by a physician to ascertain if they have been in contact with a person having tuberculosis.

The test was given by Mrs. P. G. Harris Jr. and Mrs. Troy Druse, a committee from the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association, sponsors of the project, who also furnished the material for the tests.

Education Aid Book Available At Library

The American Legion's education and scholarship handbook, "Need a Lift?", containing information about hundreds of college and vocational school scholarships for qualified high school students of this area has been presented to the Sanderson High School library by the Auxiliary of the Clarence Hallie Mulkey Post No. 160 of the American Legion.

This annually revised publication for the 1962-63 school year is recognized as one of the most complete and up-to-date sources of career and scholarship information in the United States. This handbook does not limit its listings to children of veterans but contains scholarships and educational aids which are available to all students.

and scholarship chairman of the American Legion Auxiliary stated that thousands of young people have not taken advantage of the generous education aids that are available due to a failure to plan early for their future education.

She mentioned in particular the Junior GI Bill which provides up to \$110 per month for four years of educational help for sons and daughters of veterans who lost their lives as the result of military service. Over half of the young people eligible for this help have failed to apply, Mrs. Farley said.

Experience has proven that plans for higher education should begin during the student's sophomore year in high school. "The boy or girl who starts considering career and scholarship sources early is the one who has the best chance of going on to school," Mrs. Farley stated.

Parents and students are encouraged to make use of the copies of "Need a Lift?" provided as a service to the community. The publication, prepared by the American Legion's education and scholarship program, is now in its 12th edition with distribution of more than three quarters of a million copies since its first issue in 1951.

Group Meets On Proposed Dam Sites

The Board of Directors of the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District met Tuesday afternoon in the Peavy Building to discuss the possibility of sponsoring a flood control and water conservation project on the watershed of Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile.

Meeting with the group were: Don Allison, district Soil Conservation Service supervisor of Pecos; Bill Ray, local Soil Conservation Service work unit supervisor; Don Anderson president of the Sanderson Lions Club; Rev. F. E. Curry, president of the Sanderson Rotary Club; J. A. Gilbreath, secretary-manager of the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce. Board members present were Joe N. Brown, chairman; Clarence Chandler, Sid Smith, and David Mitchell.

Mr. Allison outlined the steps in making application for state approval of the project and possible obstacles that might be encountered. He also told of the methods and necessities of seeing the project through to completion, once application has been made.

The purpose of the project primarily is to afford possible flood control for Sanderson, with side advantages being to prevent soil erosion on ranches on the watershed, to conserve water that falls on the entire watershed and to recharge water wells adjacent to the channels on the watershed.

It was also pointed out that there would be the possibility of making available some water sports and fish or wildlife accessibility in this area.

All organizations of the county will be reached in giving information concerning the proposals in the project, and their interest and endorsement will be sought at the time of the submitting of the application.

Representatives of state organizations connected with the proposal have voiced a genuine interest in the possibility of such a plan as has been outlined and stated they felt that those involved had a real and justifiable reason behind their proposals.

Expressions of interest on the part of people and organizations involved meant a lot in the expediting of the application, it is said.

The high school auditorium was headquarters for the committee of volunteers from the Legion and Auxiliary who sponsored the project and provided the volunteer workers. L. E. Muller used a loud speaker system on his truck to remind the populace of the project in progress.

The pupils in all of the schools were given the vaccine. Friday afternoon Other residents of the community got their vaccine that afternoon or Sunday afternoon.

Dr. C. H. Spencer and the Legion and Auxiliary were pleased with the response to the project and realize that there were many who already had gotten their vaccine in earlier programs. The odorless, tasteless liquid, three drops on a cube of sugar, can be the means of stamping out polio in any community as it protects anyone who might be a carrier of the germs as well as those who might fall victim to the disease.

Dates for the giving of the other two doses of the vaccine will be announced later. A special time and place will again make the vaccine available to all who will come for it.

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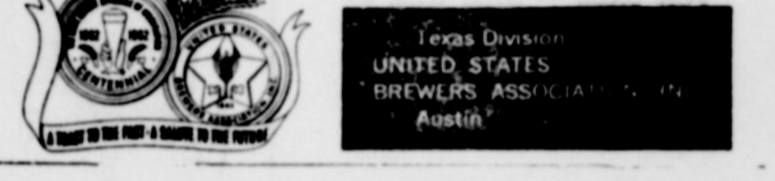
