John Ben Sheppard and two other boys from Odessa were through Sanderson last Saturday morning and spent some time in helping to locate some possible buildings to receive medals from the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

The two proposed sites, if approved will receive the medals and a lot of publicity in the various publications by the state, including state maps, etc., to call attention to all such buildings at the state.

According to information from other states and other towns in Texas, these historical sites are a center of interest for many writers and a drawing card as a starting point for so many people.

People who live in the middle of a forest seldom notice the beauty of a tree. We are like that to some degree, in that we take many things for granted that other people would go out of their way to see and at times good money for the opportunity to look around.

We could name specifically the presence of some caves near Odessa that were obviously occupied at some time or other by native to this country. There are also some Indian drawings and more permanent dwellings in the county.

We think very little of these things because we are accustomed to seeing them.

But a traveler who will pay to see where Geronimo built a fire maybe — surely would be interested in some of the things we have so many of here and near Odessa.

It might be worth thinking about more.

We get burned up — to a crisp — about the actions of people in doing their best to divide the interests of people in this country. We have enough of a division of efforts and interests about some people working on things to drive wedges deeper.

Whether we are Democrats or Republicans, union members or non-union members, Protestants or Catholics, French, English, or Mexican extraction, rock and roll fans, what-not, we are all American.

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Cuban Crisis Brings Draft Obligations To Question

AUSTIN—Since President Kennedy's proclamation of arms quarantine around Cuba, some men who have no legal obligation for draft registration or military service have been asking draft boards about their "obligation".

If you were born on or before August 30, 1922, you are not registered with a draft board and you have no legal obligation to register. Furthermore, you have no responsibility to keep a draft board advised of your current address.

If you were born after August 30, 1922, you are legally required to be registered, unless you are not yet 18 years old.

If you are registered and have reached the age of 35, you are no longer liable for military service under present law; but you are still obligated to keep your local board advised of your current address.

Some men are no longer liable at ages 26 and 28. At these three ages, where a man is no longer liable for service, he is classified V-A, and the little classification notice he is required to carry in his pocket is so marked.

An increasing number of people are asking draft boards for the meaning of the Selective Service classification. These follow:

I-A: Available for military service.

I-A-O Conscientious objector available for non-combatant military service.

I-C Member of the armed forces, Coast and Geodetic Survey, or Public Health Service.

I-D Qualified member of the armed forces reserve, or student taking military training, including ROTC and accepted aviation cadet applicants.

I-O Conscientious objector available for civilian work contributing to maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest.

I-S Student deferred by law until graduation from high school or attainment of age 20, or until the end of his academic year at a college or university.

I-W Conscientious objector performing civilian work in the national interest, or who has completed such work.

I-Y A man qualified for military service only in time of war or emergency.

II-A Occupational deferment, other than agricultural and student.

II-C Agricultural deferment.

II-S Student deferment.

III-A Extreme hardship deferment, or a man with child or children. Any man who prior to August 25, 1953, had a child or children and lived with them in his home, and so advised his board, is eligible for Class III-A. Any man who acquired a child or children on or since August 25, 1953, is not eligible for Class III-A because of them unless military service would result in extreme hardship to them, or certain other dependents.

IV-A A man with sufficient prior active service, or who is a sole surviving son of a family of which one or more sons or daughters already have died in line of duty in the armed forces.

IV-B Certain public officials deferred by law.

IV-C Deferment of certain aliens.

IV-D Minister of religion or divinity student.

IV-F Physically or mentally unfit or morally unacceptable.

V-A Over the age of liability for military service. If a man receives certain deferments resulting in classification in Classes I-D, I-S, I-Y, II-A, II-C, III-A, IV-B, and IV-F before he is 26 years old, his liability for military service will be extended from age 26 to ages 28 or 35, depending upon the deferment received.

Half-Inch Rain Falls All Night Here Monday

About one-half inch of moisture fell in Sanderson Monday afternoon and Monday night in a steady drizzle. There was never a noticeable run-off of moisture in town, even on the streets.

Rainfall from 40-inch up to one inch were reported from all parts of the county contacted, and it was learned that some snow fell at Emerson, about six miles west of Sanderson, and on Big Hill, about nine miles north of Sanderson, with her husband, Mrs. Earl Malou, in Sanderson about 5 a.m., but the snow did not stick to the ground.

Heavier snows were reported to the west, but none was sticking to the ground in Terrell County.

The norther which blew in Saturday brought cold winds and dismal skies, but no moisture was reported until Monday. The temperatures got down near freezing Sunday night and early Monday morning, but moderated during the day to trigger the moisture. There was also some moderation of the temperature during Monday night.

Drizzle continued to fall Tuesday morning.

Terrell Co. Program Committee Sets Plans for Coming Year

The Terrell County Program Committee met at the courthouse in Sanderson last Wednesday to review and approve average costs for the coming year under the Great Plains Conservation Program which is administered by the Soil Conservation Service.

Invited to the meeting were Clarence Jessup, chairman of the County ASC Committee; F. M. Wood, ASC office manager; Ranza Adams, FHA county supervisor; Joe N. Brown, chairman Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District board of supervisors; and W. O. Ray, work unit conservationist Soil Conservation Service.

The committee received current average costs of conservation practices such as brush control, pipe lines, etc., which will be used in the Great Plains Conservation program this year. This is done on an annual basis, and more often if necessary, to keep cost data current. The costs of the item varies from time to time and must be kept in line with the current price because the cost-share assistance offered under the GPCP is based on a percent of the average costs on actual costs.

Named To Staff Of Ed Foreman

Odessa — U. S. Representative-elect Ed Foreman this week announced the appointment of James S. Reed of Midland, as his administrative assistant in Washington. Foreman, first Republican to represent the 16th Congressional District of Texas, takes office January 9.

In making the announcement, Foreman said, "Jim Reed was chosen for this highly important executive responsibility because we feel it necessary to maintain the closest possible contact with the 690,000 people in the district. Jim's qualifications leave little to be desired in such a strategic post. I am proud to include him among our official family."

Besides being Foreman's campaign manager during the new congressman's recent successful bid for election, Reed, 31, is a former Ector County Republican Chairman, former precinct chairman in Midland, and for six years was vice-chairman of the Texas Young Republican Executive Committee.

In addition to Reed, Foreman will appoint a staff assistant from El Paso, who is to be announced within the next few days. The remainder of Foreman's staff will be appointed in Washington.

Sul Ross College Singers Organize

The vocal ensemble of 19 singers at Sul Ross State College, this year will be known as the Sul Ross Singers. In adopting its new name, the singing group also proposed to choose the style and repertoire of chamber music, and to confine its performances to small halls whenever practical. Its first Christmas program will be given on December 4, in the Little Theater on the college campus.

The group is under the direction of Dr. Robert W. Calder, who joined the Sul Ross faculty in September.

The "Rossonian Choristers", an all-college choir, also under Dr. Calder's direction is to be augmented by community choirs in Handel's "Messiah", which will be presented December 9, in the Main Auditorium of Sul Ross College.

Sanderson Loses Final Game To Ozona By 46-12 Score

The Sanderson Eagles lost the final game of their football season to the Ozona Lions by a 46-12 score.

Ozona had a touchdown called back early in the first period and later in the same period, Bryan Montgomery ran over from the 12-yard line to cap a 60-yard push. Leroy Cooper, quarterback, threw to Richard Vargas for the extra two points. Brant Moore scored Ozona's second first frame tally from the 2-yard line and Vargas ran the two extra points.

In the second quarter Montgomery scored again from the one and Vargas earned the two points extra for a 24-0 halftime score.

In the third period, Montgomery scored again from the 7 and Moore added the two points.

In the final frame, Bernard Villarreal went over from the 1 and Billy Carson threw a pass to Sammy Cervantes for the final tally. The point-after try following the next-to-last score failed, and Cooper threw a pass to Scott Mahon for the last two pointer.

The Sanderson Eagles' first TD

was on a 4-yard plunge by Billy Garza capping a 45-yard drive in the third period and John Robbins drove over from the 2 in the final period. Neither conversion try was successful.

Sanderson ended up the season with a win over Alpine and Marfa in non-district games, and the Iraan Braves fell to the Sanderson Eagles in their only conference win.
