Want Your Deer Skin???
Successful deer hunters who do not wish to keep their deer hides are asked to bring them by Dudley's Texaco Station where they will be accumulated and sent to the state's hospitals where they will be used in therapy work.

Hunters are asked to throw a handful of table salt on the raw side of the hide, allow it to drain and then roll it up before they bring them to the station.

All hides will be hauled by freight companies free of charge.
