# Pre-School English In Special Program Proves Valuable

Of each 100 students who entered first grade in Texas public schools in 1961 with no knowledge of English, only 18 completed grade 1 in one year.

The 82 who remained in grade I for a second year cost the state around \$25,000 - figured on an annual instruction cost of approximately \$300 per student.

A pre-school instructional program, authorized by the Legislature in 1959, may prove to be a partial solution to this economic and academic problem.

The program has been in existence for the past three summers. It is administered by local school systems and is financed by the State Minimum Foundation Fund and the participating school districts.

In this pre-school program children have had opportunity to learn to speak and understand English and 76 of each 100 enrolled in the 1961 program completed the first grade in the '61-62 school year and were promoted.

Of each 100 students with preschool instruction, 58 more successfully completed grade 1 than did students from a similar-sized group who lacked this training.

During the past summer, almost 19,000 children enrolled in 154 schools. If 76 per cent of these students complete first grade in 1962-63 as compared with 18 per cent completions by those with no special training this 58 per cent bonus of 19,000 (11,020 at \$300 per person) will total \$3,306,000.

The pre-school program in '62 cost the state and the participating districts \$371,748. Deducting this figure from \$3,306,000 indicates savings of almost three millions dollars on the experimental group of 19,000.

The potential saving of the program is difficult to estimate as there are no exact figures on the total number of non-Englishspeaking children.




