Exemptions Due In Income Tax Those Over 65

Every taxpayer is entitled to at least one personal exemption of \$600 in filing his federal income tax return for 1962, Samuel Haslam, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue Service, Del Rio, said this week.

He added that a taxpayer who was 65 or older before January 1, 1963, or who was blind at the and of 1962 is entitled to an extra exemption. If both conditions existed, he gets two extra exemptions of \$600 each.

The same additional exemptions are applicable to a wife if she qualifies.

"If your husband or wife died during 1962," he said, "the number of his or her exemption is determined as of the date of death. Be sure to check the appropriate blocks on your return." Many questions about federal income tax may be answered by telephoning the local IRS office.

Close Contact Is Answer To Worm Problem

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's screwworm livestock inspectors are vitally concerned with keeping in close contact with individual ranchers so as to stay completely informed on the screwworm situation in a specif-

Delbert F. Stewart of Ozona. who serves this county, is one of the 21 inspectors assigned to the southern half of Texas. Besides Terrell County, he also serves Brewster, Pecos, Val Ver-

de, and Crockett Counties. County Fly Control Committee Chairman Malone Mitchell urges livestock producers to write down or remember the name of the local inspector and contact him immediately if a screwworm infestation is suspected. Stewart's address is Box 1003, Ozona, and his telephone num-

ber is 392 - 2680 Stewart has been covering as much of his assigned territory as possible, visiting with producers and encouraging them to check their animals, treat wounds and collect samples. With each visit, he leaves some specimen collection kits. He is also interested in promoting good screwworm

control measures. "The screwworm eradication program requires the cooperation of everyone with an interest in the livestock industry," Stew art said. "I am here to work with individual producers and I hope they will feel free to call on me when they suspect screwworm infestations. With the combination of sterile fly release, good management practices and very prompt reporting, a screwwormfree Southwest can be a reality.'




