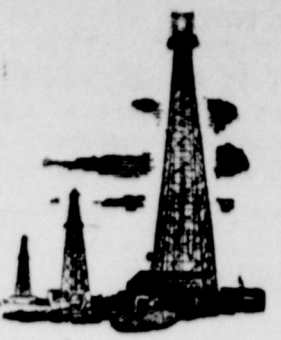

LISTEN TO LUKE

The integration and segregation problems in some parts of the nation have not changed a bit, in spite of a lot of the promises of some, and threats of others. The newspapers are speaking out on the issues as they see them are brand-new or con-something-or-other, and those who are not speaking out are not doing their job.

In last week's papers we read where a Maryland postman stumbled his way to Alabama to offer sympathy for Negro integrationists and was slain on the roadside. It was said that he had at one time been a patient in a mental institution. It was a terrible crime, of course, for a man to have been killed in cold blood and his body left by the roadside where it fell. But this slaying of a man by a man of another race or color, or for one reason or another, is not the first in history. But it is, as far as we know, the first time that the Attorney General of the United States has felt it necessary for him to take the long trip to the scene of the crime, the likes of which has been committed probably in every state in the nation, almost daily—a killing that is the result of hatred or contempt, or dislike, prejudice, or for the joy or thrill (and some say there is one) is watching a man killed.

A succession of events in Alabama shows how the whole racial problem is wrought with hypocrisy, animosity, and—most important—politics. Daily we read of racial atrocities in Washington, D.C., where a Negro is the criminal and the purpose of the killing is as justified as the one of the white man, and it is said that cab drivers in Washington, D.C., daily warn visitors there to stay off of certain streets at night. Have either of the Kennedys shown any concern about the situation right under their noses? After the Alabama killing the President was quoted as saying to a news conference that the killing was "an outrageous crime and said he was shocked over the assassination of citizens on public roads." That was the day before his brother found it necessary to go all the way to Alabama to tell Governor George Wallace that he—Kennedy—intends to enforce the law. Isn't that what he was supposed to do anyway? Did he have to tell the governor that?

Racial atrocities are overlooked where integration is the way of life. They are "public assassinations" and a "national disgrace" in the segregated South. The conclusions now should be obvious. As long as outsiders continue to come into the South to cause trouble the racial turmoil will never be ended peacefully. Turmoil is aggravated when men in high places continually stigmatize the South. That turmoil will continue as long as it can be used as a political weapon by politicians who want the huge Negro votes of New York, Detroit, Chicago, Washington, Cleveland, and Los Angeles.

The strategy is to attack Alabama (11 electoral votes) to win New York (45), Pennsylvania (32), Illinois (27), California (32), and Michigan (20). So what if you lose the 11? You stand to win 256. Apparently that is worth a trip by the attorney general to Montgomery and words of shock at a presidential news conference.

If this isn't abuse of power, what is it? Why do we continue to act so dumb? Remember there are Kennedys who haven't been on any ballot yet, so we had better open our eyes before the day comes when there will be no more presidential elections.

Summer School To Teach English To First Graders

Parents of children who will enter the first grade next fall and who do not speak English well or at all are urged to enroll the children in the special summer school. The purpose of the program is to prepare non-English speaking children for entry into the first grade with a command of the essential English words which will afford them a better opportunity to complete successfully the work assigned to them. The school will begin June 3 and close August 12, according to H. L. Richardson, superintendent.

Any child who will be six years of age or older by the first of September of this year and who has never gone to school before may come to this summer school. Birth certificates must be brought to school when the child registers. Only children who cannot speak English well will be admitted. Supt. Richardson stated, "There will be no charge for attending the school. The program is voluntary and no one will be required to attend. No buses will run for the school. Classes for the special program will be in the Lamar Elementary School. Mrs. Orba Court will be teacher for the summer school.

Prospect Looms In Allison Well

Humble Oil and Refining Co. was preparing to plug back to 3,550 feet for tests of the Leonard at its No. 1 W. M. Allison, in 8-A4-Mrs. A. Pride survey, Terrell County wildcat 18 miles southeast of Sheffield and nine miles northeast of the one-well Brown-Bassett (Atoka - Fusselman) field after recovering 30 feet of mud and 120 feet of salt water on final drillstem test of the Ellenburger. Tool was open one hour on the test taken between 11,174-324 feet. While being drilled a test of the Leonard between 3,375-425 feet, flowed gas at the daily rate of 297,000 cubic feet, and recovered 300 feet of gas-cut mud.

Duck Looping, Calf Riding, Some Highlights of 'Fun Day'

Several new events for entertainment have been arranged to provide fun for area residents here Saturday afternoon and night. The "fun day" is an effort of the Eagle Boosters to provide clean, wholesome entertainment for residents of the county and at the same time bolster the coffers of the athletic program of the schools.

Some of the entertainment to be available Saturday afternoon will be "duck looping", at which participants will toss a plastic loop at the heads of three ducks in an enclosure. Prizes will be given to those who "ring the

If the 58th Legislature's final version of a loan shark law is that which passed the House, folks who do business with the money men still would pay charges up to 500 per cent on the smallest, shortest-term loans.

Small-small loans — those under \$100 — would be regulated by an amendment which provides that on loans from \$19 to \$35, the lender could collect a flat 10 per cent charge plus \$3 as handling charge for each month of the loan, up to no more than two months.

In addition to this, lenders also could collect \$3.50 per month up to four months on loans between \$35 and \$70, and \$4 per month for up to six months on loans from \$70 to \$100.

The over-\$100 clause sets the rates per year per \$100: \$19 up to \$100, \$16, from \$100 to \$200; \$13 per \$100 between \$200 and \$300. This is scaled to the rate of \$7 per \$100 on loans between \$1,000 and \$1,500.

A work-out on the measure — which carries 19 Senate amendments and 23 by the House — is expected in a Senate-House conference committee, but it won't take long if Gov. John Connally and Speaker Byron Tunnell have their way. Both want a loan bill passed this session, and neither wants an extended — or a special — session.

College Bills
Governor Connally, Speaker Tunnell, and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith all are anxious to see the Pan-American and San Angelo College bills passed. Bills finally were pulled out of the House State Affairs Committee, chaired by reluctant Rep. John Allen of Longview.

Allen threatened to resign

over the pressure (committee-men kept him from doing so) because he couldn't see the money in sight to support the 20 colleges already in the state family.

No Tuition Hike in Sight
College tuition increase bills may never come out of the House Tax and Revenue Committee. This, even though the sponsors are both on the committee.

One proposal is to double the state college tuition, as endorsed by the Commission on Higher Education. Morgan offered a compromise of a 50-per-cent increase.

But word had already come "from above" that there will be no tuition hike this year. That virtually ended it.

Railroad Commission Change Is Proposed

A plan to take the railroads and trucks away from the Railroad Commission has been proposed by Rep. Henry Grover of Houston, who told the House:

"Recent developments indicate that the Railroad Commission is overworked, and has more to do than it can handle."

Grover inferred that these indications are the slant-hole oil well scandals and the conflict-of-interest resignation of former Commissioner William J. Murray Jr.

Grover introduced HB 1041 to ease some of the workload by removing the commission's authority over the transportation industry, and leaving it with just oil and gas regulatory authority.

The "Texas Commerce Commission, to be set up to regulate railroads, bus lines, truck lines, and so forth, would be made up of three \$15,000-a-year commissioners.

Railroad Commission was set up in 1891 to regulate the railroads. But authority over oil and gas, since 1917, has caused most of its time and attention to turn in that direction.

Congressional Redistricting
A crowd of witnesses from the late Speaker Sam Rayburn's 4th Congressional District is due to oppose the Congressional redistricting bill which would abolish the old 4th, and relocate it in South Texas.

Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall succeeded in delaying Senate committee action on the measure to May 7, so the opponents can come to Austin.

House passed the bill to the Senate, over protests from Rep. Don Hefton of Sherman. Delay on the hearing may put the redistricting proposal, authored by Rep. Rayford Price of Frankston, in jeopardy.

Governor Connally has said he saw no need for Congressional redistricting this session. He thought it could be handled in 1965.

Meanwhile, U.S. Congressman Ray Roberts, who now represents the old 4th, doesn't seem worried about losing his job. He's looking for a press liaison man for his Washington office.

At-Large Elections Suggested

Eighty Texas counties, in which two county precincts or more, represent a fraction of the total county vote, would be affected if a constitutional amendment ever comes to a favorable vote by the public.

Under the plan, if the total number of votes cast in two or more commissioners' precincts amount to less than 20 per cent of the total vote cast in the election of all four commissioners, the commissioners in the small precincts would be required to run on a countywide-at-large basis.

Doctors Being Called

State draft boards have issued a call for 60 doctors for the armed forces, according to State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

The 60 physicians would be the state's share of a national call for 1,350.

Physicians — either fathers or non-fathers, would be subject to call if they were born on or after January 1, 1935.

One-Day Session

A special one-day (\$8,000) session of the Texas Legislature would be held on December 1, 1964, under a House-approved resolution.

Purpose would be to swear in House members and elect a speaker. Aim is to enable the speaker to make appointments so the 1965 session could get under way immediately.

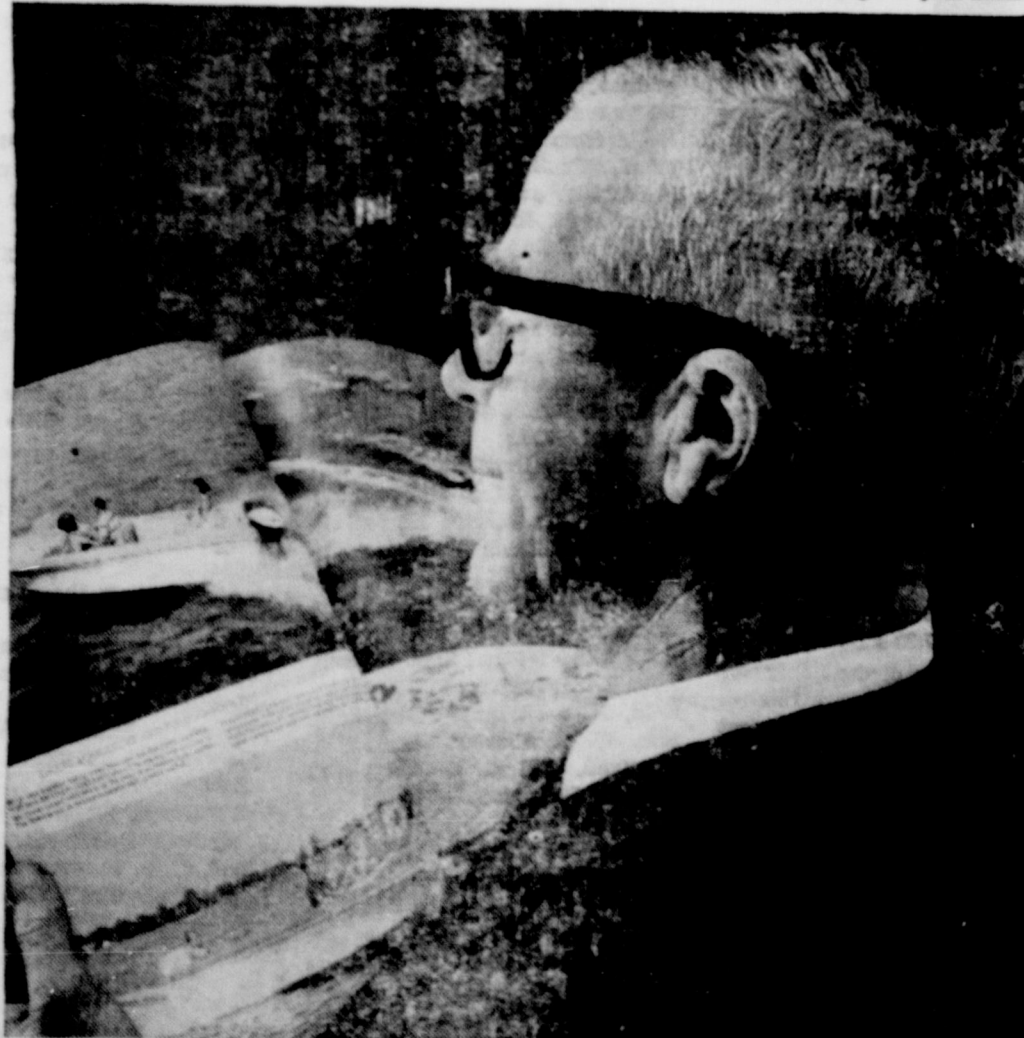

At a recent conference of Central American Presidents in San Jose, President Kennedy told the assembled presidents: "We will build a wall around Cuba." That statement was for the birds. Instead of ships, guns, and men, he built a wall of words. The final outcome, unless Americans get on the line, will be for us to give up our base in Cuba rather than hurt Mr. K's (of Moscow) feelings.

Without any further comment, we quote: "We must end the harassment which this government has carried on of liberty-loving anti-Castro forces in Cuba and other lands. While we cannot violate international law, we must recognize that these exiles and rebels represent the real voice of Cuba, and should not be constantly handicapped by our Immigration and Justice Department authorities." (From a campaign speech by presidential candidate John F. Kennedy on October 15, 1960.)
