The strategy is to attack Alaama (11 electoral votes) to win New York (45), Pennsylvania (32), Illinois (27), California (32), and Michigan (20). So what if you lose the 11? You stand to win 256. Apparently that is worth a rip by the attorney general to Montgomery and words of shock at a presidential news conference

If this isn't abuse of power, what is it? Why do we continue to act so dumb? Remember there are Kennedys who haven't been on any ballot yet, so we had bette ropen our eyes before the day comes when there will be no nore presidential elections.
