We just don't know that we will ever have a wheat farm, so we are not planning on being concerned directly - and there is little chance of there ever beng a wheat farm around here. so we aren't concerned from that angle, eltner. We were just glad to know that the wheat farmers of the nation took it upon themselves to vote against stronger controls for that industry. The referendum did not carry, let alone by the needed two-thirds

The president was in a news east portion on Monday night to lend his strength to the vote, and he reiterated strongly that a defeat would mean \$1.00 a bushel for wheat, hoping that the scare would bring about the acceptance of the tighter controls.

It was a brazen display of a supposed strength on the part of the administration in our way of thinking.

The agricultural department, if it is working for the benefit of the farmers, should try to get along with them in trying to do things the way they want to, rather than trying to run the farms of the nation from Washington. - Or anything else besides the government!

This area seems to be blessed abundantly recently with the most beneficial rains that have een received in many years. And they keep coming, it seems. One doesn't have to remember very far back when we didn't get any rain hardly at all, and some areas got even less rain

We should all remember the source of this blessing and the others we receive, too, and be thankful for them.

Notary Public Re-Appointments Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin has announced that all qualified notaries public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1965, must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the county clerk of his residence be-

tween June 1 and June 10, 1963. Martin emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specically requires that the county clerk approve notary bonds but only on the above dates.

New Rates On Some LD Calls After 9:00 P.M.

Many out-of-state long distance calls placed after 9:00 p. m now cost less than they used to, according to Tom Potter manager for Southwestern Bell

Potter said lower interstate rates have been in effect since April 4 on calls placed between 9:00 p.m. and 4:30 a.m. He also said the lower rates applied to station to station calls of more

The "after 9" rates are now from 5c to 75c less than the night and Sunday rates for the initial three minute period were before April 4.

"For example," Potter said "an 'after 9' call from Dallas to Seattle now costs 90c for three minutes. The charge used to be

Potter also said that certain increases were made on out-ofstate person-to-person calls when the new lower rates went into effect. He said these increase changes were very low and amounted to between 5c and 10c on the initial three minute period. He said the increases were made in order to bring these rates more in line with the cost of providing this personalized

He said the new reduced long distance rates caused a subsequent reduction of an estimated \$30 million a year in revenues for the Bell Telephone System.

Since last Wednesday, Sanderson has received .64-inch, but heavier rains have been reported from all sections of the county.

Last Wednesday Sanderson received .009; Friday, .013; Saturday, .004; and Wednesday of this week, .38, according to Ervin Grigsby, who compiles the offic-

ial rainfall for Sanderson. Heavier rains were reported to the north of Sanderson Wednesday morning and in the eastern part of the county in the Independence Creek area, rains over 1 inch were reported Wednesday morning. Heavier rains were also reported south and east of Sanderson Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning.

New Garbage Truck Put In Service

A new-type garbage truck has been put in service in Sanderson. The truck was purchased Monday by Precinct 1 Commissioner F. M. Weigand and put into use Tuesday morning

The cab-over-engine truck carries a huge barrel on the chassis. The trash can be loaded into the barrel from either side and after loading, the front end of the barrell is pulled down the center of the cylinder by hydraulic pressure, compressing the garbage in the cylinder, making possible the hauling of a larger amount of garbage in the vehicle. It also prevents the blowing of trash from the truck which previously caused some litter on the streets and highway as a result of blow-

The hydraulic movement of the front of the cylinder also unloads the trash from the truck at the dump ground.

The use of the new truck is hoped to conserve maintenance costs and operational costs by making less trips to the dump ground and will also conserve time in collecting and disposing of garbage.





Robison Ranh Plans Conservation Practices


