Ellenburger Test To Be Drilled

Pauley Production Inc., Midland, will drill a 13,500-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Terrell County, 14 miles southeast of Sheffield and 4 3-4 miles south of Connell oil production in the Terrell County portion of the Yucca Butte multipay oil and gas field. It is the No. 1 Annie Spencer, et al.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of section 31, Block B-2 in the CCSD&RGNG Survey. Elevation is 2,642 feet.

It is also 3-4-mile due west of Texas Crude Oil Co. and Superior Oil Co. No. 1 Allison, temporarily abandoned in May, 1961. at 13,117 ft. After extensive tests of the Strawn, Pennsylvanian Mississippian, Fusselman, and Ellenburger.

It flowed gas at the maximum daily rate of 2,198 million cubic feet through Strawn perforations between 10,241-54 feet; at the maximum daily rate of 1.4 million cubic feet through Pensylvanian detrital perforations between 10,300-345 feet; at the daily rate of 205 million cubic feet daily through Fusselman perforations between 11,300-400 feet; and at the maximum daily rate of 376,000 cubic feet through Ellenburger perforations between 12,425-470 feet.

Tax Collectors Discourage Poll Tax Payments

County tax assessors-collectors throughout the state are finding themselves in the unusual position of discouraging the purchase of poll tax receipts this year, at least prior to the November 9 amendment election.

The poll tax amendment, to be voted on November 9, provides for the registration of voters at a cost of 25 cents. Until the outcome of the election is known the present poll tax law providing for the charge of \$1.7? for all between the ages of 21 and 60 applies.

Bill C. Cooksey, Terrell County tax assessor-collector, says most tax assessor-collectors are advising people not to make the poll tax purchase prior to the outcome of the election.

It is perfectly legal for citizens to buy their poll tax and pay the \$1.75, if they prefer. The only hitch is that the money cannot be refunded in case the new poll tax amendment passes.

ty agent's office. The IRS spokesman cautioned that those expecting to file claims should have records adequate enough to enable Internal Revenue to verify the accuracy of the amount claimed.

Gas Production Is \$3.2 Million A Year In Terrell County

With gas production worth about \$3.2 million a year, Terrell County citizens have a financial stake in the worldwide demand for energy and the complex economic and political problems involving the petroleum industry according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Contin-

ent Oil & Gas Association. "We have pulled together some figures from the most authoratative sources so residents of Terrell County can see how local pocketbooks are affected by some of the issues which involve our industry," said J Clyde Tomlinson, association president. "Issues of current concern include the proposals to cut percentage depletion rates extension of federal controls over prices at which Texas producers sell their gas, and development of laws and production methods that will help Texas compete with other states and

nations for markets." The latest year for which U S. Bureau of Mines figures are available (1961) shows Terrell County producing more than 25.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas with a value of almost \$3.2 million. In 1961 there were 25 producing gas wells in the county, according to the Texas Railroad Comission.

Although its first field was discovered 11 years ago, Terrell County is the scene for the industry's continued search for oil and gas. Some 14 wells were frilled there last year, with for being wildcat exploratory wells, according to The Oil and Gas Journal. The association estimated that more than \$2.5 million was spent on drilling in the county this past year and that some \$550,000 of this went for dry holes. Close to \$1.4 million was spent last year on geophysical crews using selsmic devices to probe the underground formations of Terrell County for possible drilling locations.

Leasing added many thousands of dollars to the county's economy. Tabulations by the International Oil Scouts Association show major companies in 1961 were paying rentals on about 646,000 undeveloped acres, which comprise about two-fifths of the county's area.

Royalty payments to Terrell County ranchmen are running at more than \$395,000 annually, the association calculated.

Terrell County producers and royalty owners also make a sizeable contribution to the support of state government, with production tax payments of more than \$221,000 a year.

Industry taxes are likewise important to the county government and school districts in the county. For instance, 42 per cent of the local property taxes collected for the Terrell County Independent School District comes from oil and gas operators.
