Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey and Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg, after their investigation, attributed excessive speed as one of the causes of the accident.

After striking the abutment the car tumbled at least once before coming to rest. The entire body of the car was torn from the chassis except for the strip across the rear of the body, and the wreckage was just twice the length of the car because of the separation. The floor and seats of the vehicle were still attached to the chassis with only the body in the other section. The motor was torn completely loose from the wreckage, as were both of the front wheels, with parts of the car being thrown almost 150 feet beyond the chassis and body.
