But we feel that there should a re-evaluation of our own nciples and our attitudes tords authority.

Our society has degraded into idea that the wrong is not in e act, but in getting caught. We it daily in so many ays. Or we have an attitude a particular situation warants our changing the rules.

This degradation evolves into a attitude that produces a soety of murderers and assassins, special privilege seekers, and pecial privilege sellers.

There is a closed season on oth men and deer, but there are se who change the rules and to justify their actions in the

The rules of scrabble, tennis fooball, water polo, all have rules to insure a uniformity of forts and methods on the part of the participants, to govern the play and make an orderly

contest out of all of them. The penalties had to be set down in order to govern those who insisted on violating the rules, and to ty to prevent their violations in the first place, and particularly repeated violations.

Punishment then is the result of the violation, and not the result of the observer, the official, the referee, or the law enforcer. There are those who are trying o continue their spreading of latred even beyond killing, by

he use of their tongues - probably a more formidable weapon the first place - by laying the blame of the tragedies on the people of Dallas, even Texans, or on the law enforcement agencies.

This is not only the epitome of ignorance and immaturity, but it s also one of the worst types of hatred smears by assassination of the character of those unrelated in any way to the tragedies.

It was a dark day in Texas, yes, even in Dallas, last Friday. But there was little sunshine in Boston, or Hyannis Port, or Muleshoe, or Craven, Colorado, or Nebulus, Nebraska, if there are such towns.

We not only lowered our flags, and our heads in homage and espect, but our heads should have been bowed, too, in shame or our failure to raise the level principles and character suficiently during these years so that such hatred would not exist, and our heads should have been owered in prayer for our forliveness for that and other short-

All people, all over the nation, regardless of political affiliation, ace, religion, or creed, expressed their sorrow and wish well to ur new President, Lyndon B.

Heavy Mailing For Christmas Is Expected Here

Thanksgiving Day can be an even happier holiday for the family already planning Christmas shopping and mailing. This observation came this week from Postmaster Ray Hodgkins, who predicted another heavy mail volume for Sanderson this Christ-

"Our post office will be catching it both ways - going out and coming in. I hope the residents of Sanderson will begin their mailing next week if they have not already done so.'

Mr. Hodgkins suggested that several hours planning during the Thanksgiving holidays can be of immense value in saving time and trouble later on Christmas mailing. Here are a few tips:

1. Dig out last year's Christmas mailing list if you have one, or make up a list if you don't have

2. Check for any changes in ad dress and make corrections wherever possible.

3. Use ZIP Code to speed your mail on addresses wherever possible. If it is not feasible to obtain the addressee's ZIP Code, at lease include your own in the return address. This will have the two-fold effect of encouraging relatives and friends to use your ZIP Code when they send cards to you and yill encourage them to follow your example in including their ZIP Code in their return address.

4. Get an ample supply of good and strong mailing material while there is a local supply and have it at home to avoid extra trips.

Texans contributed only 3.7

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per cent of their total income to help run the state in 1952, whea the average U.S. citizen chipped in 3.9 per cent to his state.

Last year, the average Texan paid 4.9 per cent of his incorfor state taxes, while the average in other states doled out only 4.7 per cent.

State taxes are climbing upward all over the country, but in Texas the climb has been quicker than in other states. This is due partly because the average Texan's income has not risen as fast as his taxes, or as fast as the average income.

In 1949, average per-person income of Texans was 92.8 per cent of the national average. It was only 85.2 per cent of the national average in 1962. Free Food Grants Decline

Distribution of free federal surplus foods by the State Deparutment of Public Welfare decreased by more than 2,000 recipients between September of 1962 and September 1963.

In September of last year 149,-694 recipients in 87 counties and five cities were receiving free farm surplus. This year, the September number had dwindled to 147,533 persons in 88 counties and three cities. Navarro County was dropped from the list during the 12-month period, but Bee and Cameron counties were ad-

to the Legislature in 1965. Loan Licensing Extension Act After a conference with Atty.

Gen. Waggoner Carr, Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell granted a 30-day extension of time in which some 250 finance company operators may be licensed to operate under the 1963 Texas Regulatory Loan Act. The 1963 act affords liberal interest rates for the lenders.

Licensing deadline was No vember 21. So many license applications were held up, due to bonafide technical omissions, that Miskell asked Carr if he could give those "of good faith" a little leeway. Copies of his extension order will serve in lieu of licenses until their aplications are granted, or rejected.

On the deadline date, the Office of Regulatory Loan Commissioner had granted 1,300 licenses to loan companies. Any who now operate in violation of the law are subject to a fine of \$500 to \$1,00 and-or up to six months in

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

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
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
