Marker For Gen. A. W. Terrell Is Planned Here

Plans are under way for the erection of a Confederate Memorial Information Marker for General Alexander D. Terrell in Sanderson, John Ben Shepherd, Odessa, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, announced this week.

The marker will be placed on the courthouse square. Judge R. S. Wilkinson and W. L. LaFleur have been assisting the TSHSC with the marker placement from this county.

"History is of prime interest to tourists," said Mr. Shepherd. "We must also not forget that through this marker program our school children can learn more about the history of the area and state."

General Terrell, born in Virginia, came to Texas in 1852, and was a District Judge from 1857 to 1863 when he entered the Confederate Service as a Lt. Colonel, and commanded Terrell's Texas Cavalry. He led his unit in the Red River Campaign in 1864 to prevent the Union invasion of Texas, being wounded in the Battle of Mansfield. He was promoted to Brigadier General in 1865 and at the war's end went to Mexico rather than surrender. He soon returned to Texas, however, and as a state legislator authored the present primary election law. He was a minister to Turkey in 1893-1897, an outstanding lawyer and public servant.

This county was named after Gen. Terrell.

Potential Set On Mitchell Well

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., No. 1 George K. Mitchell, in section 11, Block 1 CCSD&RGNG Survey in Terrell County, a Strawn gas-distillate discovery 29 files northwest of Dryden and 12 miles west-northwest of the Brown-Bassett multipay field, flowed gas at the daily rate of 2.2 million cubic feet, plus two barrels of muddy water and distillate, on the first gauge of the four-point potential test.

Flow was through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations between 10,106-120 feet and 11,630-670 feet, which had been shut in 96 hours. No time was reported.

Later testing proved absolute open flow of 3.1 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Six thousand gallons of acid was used and the perforations were fractured with 60,000 gallons.

Total depth is 16,369 feet and plugged back depth is 12,475 feet.

Seven and 5-8ths inch casing was set at 14,730 feet.

Terrell Ranchers Eligible For FHA 3 Per Cent Loans

The Times received a telegram from Rep. Ed Foreman Tuesday advising that Terrell County had been included in an area in which ranchmen were eligible for emergency loans at 3 per cent interest.

The telegram follows: "I have just been advised by the Agriculture Department that the Farmers Home Administration has placed Terrell County on the list of those counties eligible for emergency 3 per cent loans."

The emergency loan program was established to provide a supplemental source of credit for those farmers in an area which is designated as a 'disaster area' due to a 'natural' disaster who are in need and not able to get a loan from any other source to carry on normal operation of their farms.

"Eighteen Texas counties were designated as disaster areas and Terrell County was one of these."

"There is no statutory limitation on the amount of a loan, but the FHA must determine what amount is actually necessary for the farmer or rancher to carry on normal operation of the farm or ranch."

"No money under the program is available to expand ranching operations or refinancing debts. Ranchers and farmers in Terrell County could contact Ranza J. Adams, County Supervisor of FHA for Terrell County at 201 Kellogg Bldg., Main and Sydney Baker St., Kerrville."

AC College Awarded Ranch After Four Years of Hearings

Abilene Christian College was the final victor last Wednesday in four years of litigation when the Supreme Court upheld decisions awarding it a 41,824-acre ranch with valuable minerals in Terrell and Pecos Counties, under what was termed a virtual gift by the late William M. Edwards.

Edwards in 1954 executed instruments conveying the property to the college, subject to debts and a life estate. He died in 1953. The college filed suit against Roy Landers, administrator of his estate, and his heirs, seeking to confirm the documents of conveyance.

Landers contested the case on the ground that the effect was to secure the property of Edwards for little or no consideration, and that agents of the college exerted undue influence to secure his action.

On a jury's findings that though Edwards was of sound mind when he signed the papers, he had been the subject of undue influence, the Pecos County District Court entered judgment in favor of the estate, denying the college any benefit of the property.

Records showed that four annual \$50,000 mineral payments had been used to extinguish debts on the property.

The El Paso Court of Civil Ap-

peals reversed the trial court decision, affirmed validity of the documents and awarded the property to the college. Supreme Court made that final Wednesday by refusing the application of the administrator for writ of error, holding there was no reversible error involved.

Terrell County's Accident Loss Is 2nd In District

Total loss of property from accidents in Terrell County was \$35,000, according to a statistical release of the Midland District of the Department of Public Safety last week. This loss was the result of only one accident in the county during the month of October, according to the report.

Loving County, with probably the smallest population in the state, with fewest automobiles and least miles of highways, was the lowest with no accidents.

Major Gossett, commanding officer of the Midland district, expressed his appreciation to the drivers of Terrell County for their attention to careful driving, their courteousness, and their respect for law enforcement and traffic laws, indicated by the low accident rate.

Fatality Recorded In Car Accident Last Wednesday

One El Pasoan was killed and five others were injured in a one-car accident at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday of last week about 20 miles west of Sanderson. They were on their way to Bryan to visit a student for Thanksgiving.

Dead was Jaime Rivera, 16. Reported in serious condition in the Brewster County Memorial Hospital in Alpine were Mrs. Mary Rivera, Mrs. Socorra Salinas, and Robert Salinas. In slightly better condition was Joel Salinas and Rebecca Rivera, 8-year-old daughter of Mrs. Rivera, was uninjured.

The two families left El Paso about 11:30 p.m. Tuesday in a Volkswagen to drive to Bryan to visit Carlos Salinas, a student at Texas A&M College. They also planned to attend the annual A&M-University of Texas football game Thanksgiving Day.

Investigating officers theorized that Mrs. Rivera, who was driving, must have fallen asleep. The car hit a culvert abutment.

With a shocked and saddened nation still grieving over the tragic death of its President...

Herbert Miller, head of the Criminal Division of the U.S. Department of Justice, pledged full cooperation from federal agencies in bringing the complete story to the American people and to the world.

Dallas investigative agencies already had turned their evidence over to the FBI, which is engaged in its own extensive probe.

U.S. Congressional inquiries also have been demanded.

Because of the murder of Lee Harvey Oswald, many facts concerning the assassination of President Kennedy, the attempted assassination of Governor Connally, and the murder of Dallas Police Officer J. D. Tippit will be left unanswered unless some forum is available to fully examine motive and evidence concerning the case.

Carr maintained that a court of inquiry is the only forum where state, local, and federal investigating officials can place evidence on record in a judicial manner, with witnesses subpoenaed under oath.

A decision by the Texas Supreme Court holds that a wife can be forced to testify against

her husband in such a court. Texas law long has held that a wife's testimony cannot be used against her husband in a criminal trial. But the law laying down the procedure for a court of inquiry says that "any person" may be forced to testify before such a public hearing, and if that person refuses, he can be held in contempt and jailed.

Therefore, the Russian-born wife of the accused assassin Lee Oswald, can be forced to testify against her husband. But any evidence her testimony may produce may not be used against her husband in a criminal trial. However, in Oswald's case, there will be no trial to follow the inquiry.

It may be that such evidence would be helpful to state attorneys when they prosecute the case against Jack Ruby of Dallas, the man accused of murdering Oswald.

Governor Connally said he hopes all investigations will be directed "toward determining the facts, conditions, and circumstances that occurred" and will have as their purpose determining whether the assassination was the work of an individual maniac or a conspiracy... and development of plans for future presidential safety. He pledged his cooperation with any investigation — local, state, or federal.

Little White House
A rambling 13-room stone and frame ranch house 65 miles west of Austin has become the nation's Little White House. Home of new President Lyndon B. Johnson, it was built by his grandfather a century ago.

It is doubtful that President Johnson, who has urged Congress to immediately pass Kennedy's civil rights and tax bills and who faces staggering responsibilities in the months just ahead, will have much time to spend in Texas for a while.

But many of the world's top national and world leaders have come to the quiet banks of the Pedernales River to confer with Johnson in recent years. No doubt he often will return to

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the family home he loves so well, not only for rest from the cares of his office, but for the planning of tasks ahead.

It's pretty much assured that a great deal of history will be written at the LBJ ranch.

Major Highway Plan Announced
State Highway Commission has approved a tremendous new interstate and defense highway construction program, running into hundreds of millions of dollars — \$4,366,700,000, to be exact. It's called the "largest work program" in Texas Highway Department history.

It authorizes purchase of all remaining right-of-way on the 3,033 mile interstate highway system and paves the way for construction of an additional 1,206 miles of interstate highways which crisscross the state. Chairman Herbert C. Petry Jr. of Carrizo Springs says the plan assures Texas of continued leadership over all other states in miles of interstate highways and completion of its super-highway goal by the 1972 congressional deadline.

Branch Office Opened
Increasing highway right-of-way condemnation work has forced the Texas attorney general's department to open a third "branch office" in Dallas.

Attorney General Carr already has men assigned to Houston and San Antonio to handle condemnation cases for the state. Within the last few weeks, he has assigned two to the Dallas area as the expressway building boom grows.

Higher Education
Six newly-appointed members of the 15-member Texas Commission on Higher Education attended their first meeting and got a short course in education.

New members are Sam Rayburn Bell of Paris, Joseph A. Chandler of Stephenville, J. C. Looney of Edinburg, Dan C. Williams of Dallas, Charles N. Prothro of Wichita Falls, and Dr. Joaquin G. Cigarroa Jr. of Laredo.

When commission staffers outlined the budget requirements of the agency which guides the 20

state colleges and universities, many commissioners — including older members — were amazed to learn that the state will spend \$112,550 this year to send to out of state schools Negro graduate students who, for one reason or another, cannot take their work in Texas.

Most of the money goes for the education of Negro dentists and physicians. But some is used for law school education and the study of veterinary medicine.

Screwworm Rate Reports
Federal and state animal health authorities reporting on activities for the four weeks ending October 26 indicated a rocketing of the screwworm infestation rate in Texas from 369 samples confirmed as screwworms in the preceding four weeks to 1,577 confirmed samples for the report period.

The upturn was not a surprise to Dr. John L. Wilbur Jr., of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal Disease Eradication Division or to Dr. R. G. Garrett, director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Both had warned that damp fall climates and animal wounds laid open by calving and shearing could cause a sharp increase in the incidence of screwworms unless livestock producers exercised extraordinary precautions.

During the four weeks ending October 26, federal and state agencies, together with Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation officials, moved swiftly to combat the screwworm menace by releasing 347,671,000 sterile flies below an overwintering line that extended as far north as Comanche County in Texas.

State offices in Austin now are operating under a complicated Capital Sentrex telephone system, which means each phone has a separate number.

Audit for the 1963 fiscal year shows that Lamar State College of Technology in Beaumont drew \$2,400,000 of its operating funds from legislative appropriations while papas and pupils paid close to \$3,000,000.

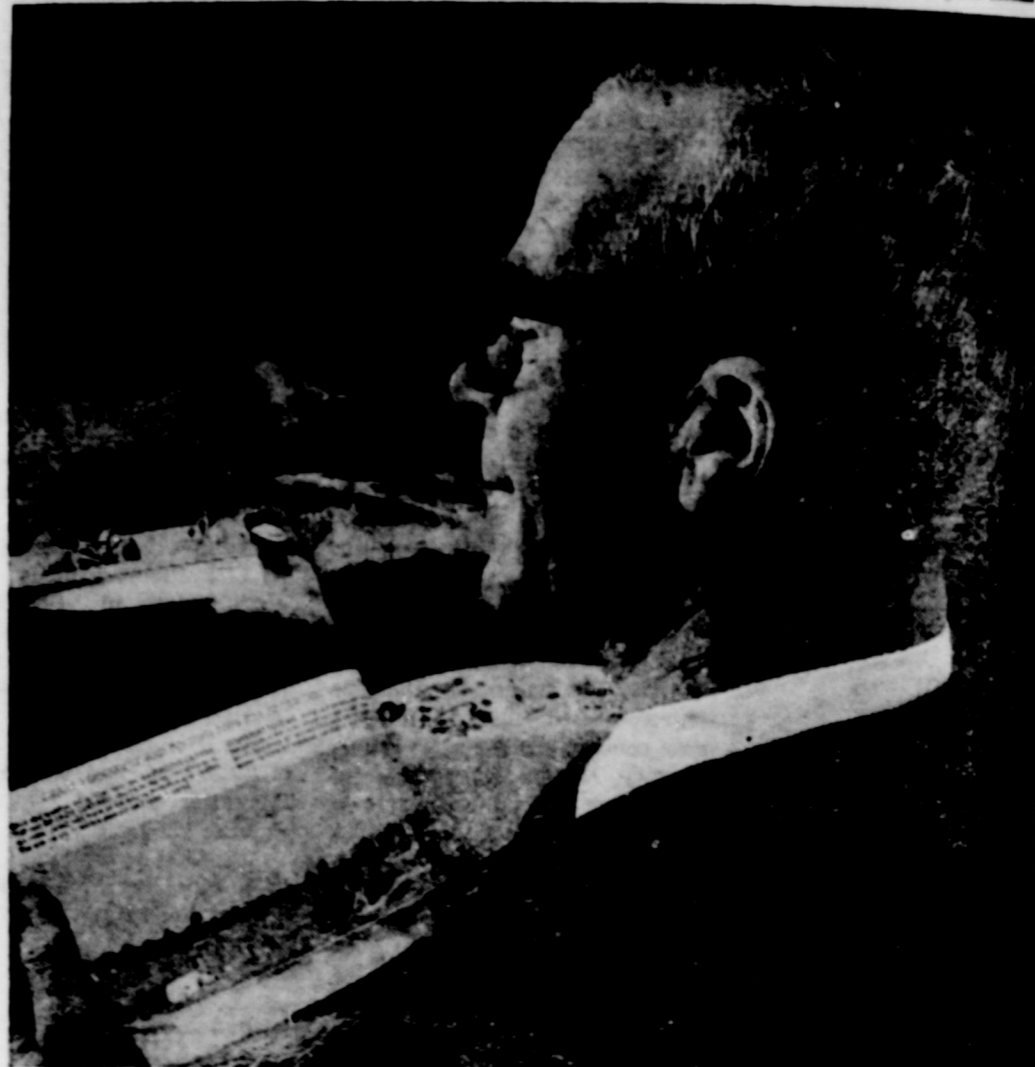

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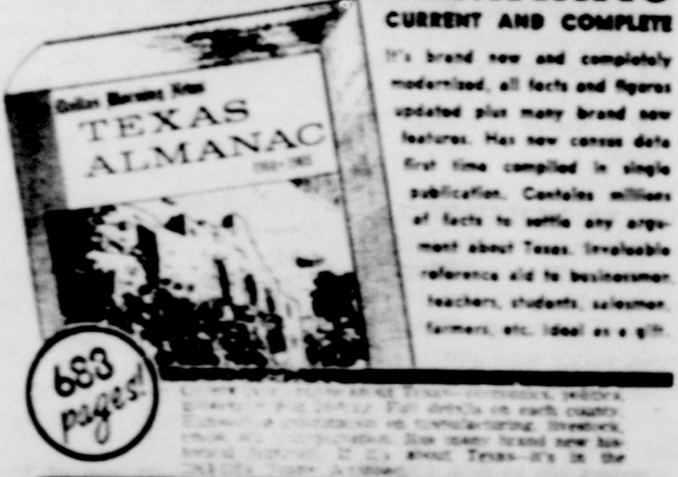
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Miss Margaret Ann Marrazz to wed Don Little

Serve with whipped or sour cream, if desired. Makes 6 servings.
