

Federal Pay Bill Amendment Offered By Cong. Foreman

The following telegram was received from Congressman Ed Foreman early this wek which explains his stand on the Federal Pay Bill which is now before the House for consideration:

"On Wednesday, March 11, duy ing consideration of H.R. 8986, the Federal Pay Bill, it is my intention to offer the following balanced budget amendment: "The authorization for an appropriation contained in this act shall not be effective until such itme as the receipts of the government for the preceding fiscal year have exceeded the expenditures of the government for such year, as determined by the Director of the

Bureau of the Budget." "Under this amendment, those who make many of the fundamental decisions on federal spending -congressmen, senators, cabinets officers- would have a powerful personal incentive (\$10,000 a year to be exact) to eliminate waste and cut back. To lesser degrees so would all other federal employees. Each cut would help to balance the federal budget and a balanced budget would be the key to higher pay."

School Census Shows Decline In County Students

With the completion of the records on the 1964 school census, Terrell County has 580 scholastics, according to Judge R. S. Wilkinson, county superintendent The total includes 278 boys and 302 girls. These figures are only 16 short of the 1963 census.

The scholastics include all boys and girls who will be six years old before September 1 and those not having an 18th birthday before that date. There will be 32 children to

start to school in the first grade next term, fifteen boys and seven teen ngirls. By ages the census shows 50

scholastics in age 7; 54 age8; 54 age 9; 55 age 10; 48 age 11; 50 age. 12; 42 age 13; 55 age 14; 47 age 15; 53 age 16; 34 age 17.

An interesting statistic is that of the 42 pupils who are 13 years old, ten are boys and thirty-two girls. In the other age groups there is only a slight variation in the numbers of boys and girls.
