

Jim Langdon **Explains** Place **Of Oil In Texas**

Texas crude oil currently is selling for more dollars than any year since the Suez crisis in 1957. Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon reports.

Langdon said this should be welcome news to the people of Texas because the Texas oil and gas dollar pays for 42 per cent of the state's cost of public education, and almost 60 per cent of the state's cost of teacher retiremen, old-age assistance, blind assistance, and aid to dependent

He stated that oil production is up three per cent over the previous year, and "an even more encouraging" jump is expected for 1964.

Langdon said the fact that the Texas petroleum industry was in such a healthy state after more than half a century of intensive development could be laid to two factors: (1) there was a lot of oil to begin with; and (2) it has not been wasted promiscousfy.

Critics of the way the Railroad Commission has regulated the oil and gas industries disregarded the Commissioners' duty to guard the public interest. When they talked about allowables and production, they ignored the fact that natural gas has in recent years became an important energy source replacing to some extent oil; and that Texas was more dominant in gas production than in crude oil production.

Top finance officials of the state now feel reasonably sure the next fiscal year for Texas governmental operations will dawn with an unfamiliar general revenue surplus on hand.

Texas' hard-pressed general fund has been in almost constant deficit for more than six years. As of March it still was \$36,600,-000 in the red.

However, budget-makers are impressed with optimistic U.S. Treasury reports that the income tax is going to boom state and local revenues by putting more money in circulation. (Theory: more money spent, more sales taxes collected.)

"There will be a surplus. The question is how much, "commented one veteran finance observer

Ideas on "how much" stretch all the way from a relatively modest \$35,000,000- estimated by the comptroller's office - to upwards of \$90,000,000.

While the feeling is general that the Legislature will begin its budget writing next year with prospects of money on hand, the surplus likely will not be big enough to avert a new tax bill.
