The Comissioners' Court Monday authorized publication of an advertisement for bids on a new ambulance for Terrell County. Specifications and details of

the bid are to be found in other columns of The Times. The action came after the recommendation of the ambulance

committee, County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, Troy Druse, and Herbert Brown The committee reported that they had investigated the cost of repairing the ambulance and in comparison to the worth of the

vehicle, advised the purchase of a new ambulance. The committee recommended that the wrecked ambulance be sold for salvage, with the revenue to go to the cost of the new

ambulance. The ambulance was wrecked about three weeks ago when it hit a deer on US 285 while en route to the Fort Stockton hos-

pital with two wreck victims. Joe Fuentes, driver of the ambulance, and the two occupants were not seriously injured as a

result of the ambulance accident. After extensive investigation and visiting other cities and talking to other ambulance operators, it was the recommendation of the committee that the commissioners purchase a station wagon with a raised roof for greater inside space. They stated that a new cot or stretcher could be purchased that was adapted for use with such vehicles to allow ample space above the patient for comfort, or that the cot or stretcher now owned by the county could be modified to be

of greater comfort for a patient. It was stated that the price of such a vehicle would be about half the price of the regular ambulance body.


