LISTEN TO LUKE

Have you sat down and seriously considered what may be the result of what is happening in this nation?

One thing was brought to our mind just this last week. It concerns a family of national prominence attending a church and joining with them in the observance of the sacrament of holy communion.

It happens that the Christian denomination that we belong to does not bar anyone from partaking of communion in our services.

And we are not going to get into any sort of an argument as to whether or not this is right.

But if this denomination has the privilege of permitting any worshipper to take communion, then this privilege should be granted by men.

And by the same token, there are those denominations who do have certain rules governing a worshipper's participating in the communion service.

And we are not going to get into a quarrel here about that, either.

But those denominations and those churches should continue to be privileged to exercise those rules without interference by man.

And this includes any man! The sanctity of the services is diminished when soiled by the violation of the rules by man — any man.

If a person who is not a member of the Eastern Star or Odd Fellows wants to participate in the services, he should do it according to the rules of the organization and not take advantage of his position — usually his own self-importance — to presume that HE can violate the rules that are set down for everyone but himself.

It is not uncommon that ladies visiting in Sanderson are invited to play bridge with some local club. Or that a visitor here is invited to take a meal with friends, and otherwise shown courtesies.

But we know of no one who would be welcomed to any occasion who thought that by his position or importance that he should be allowed to do what he wanted to do, when he wanted to do it, and under whatever circumstances.

Clyde Carter Dies In Del Rio On Tuesday

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church Thursday afternoon for Clyde Carter, 57, who died in a Del Rio hospital Tuesday morning. The James Funeral Home of Ozona was in charge of the arrangements and burial was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery Thursday afternoon.

The body was brought to Sanderson Wednesday.

Mr. Carter was taken to a Del Rio hospital Friday by his son-in-law, Charles Taylor. He had been ill in recent weeks.

He was born September 29, 1906, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Carter, who preceded him in death. He was married to Miss Nancy Haynes on December 5, 1932. He was a conductor on the railroad and had been in the employ of the Southern Pacific for 40 years.

Besides his widow, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Charles Taylor of Del Rio; Mrs. Paten Black of Monahans, and Mrs. Eddie Crump of Odessa; four grandchildren; one brother, Leslie Carter of Esparto, Calif.; three sisters, Mrs. Henry Mansfield of San Saba, Mrs. Bud Haynes, Silverton, Oregon, and Mrs. Sammie Mangum, San Antonio. Two sisters, Mrs. Frances Marcellis and Dorothy Carter, are deceased.

Paving Projects Slated for US 285

Two paving projects are slated to be done on US 285 in Pecos County and it is thought that the third section will also be contracted to assure about 38 miles of reconstruction on the highway between here and Fort Stockton.

The contract is expected to be let next month on approximately 18 miles of road construction north of the roadside park about 30 miles north of Sanderson. The section south of the roadside park, about 16 miles, is scheduled for a September letting, according to information received.

The reconstruction of the highway south of the Terrell-Pecos County line through the "Big Hill" section, is also slated for September letting, it was revealed.

The last-mentioned portion of reconstruction will call for the relocation of the roadbed to eliminate some of the curves in the present road and make for greater safety in negotiating the hill.

P. O. Dedication Set For June 24

Dedication of the new post office building in Sanderson has been tentatively set for June 26 according to Postmaster J. R. Hodgkins. The time, also tentative, will be from 4 to 6 p.m.

Hodgkins has been in contact with various officials of the postal department for several weeks concerning the dedication and he is working with a committee of the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce in planning the dedication. The committee consists of Jolly Hakrins and Dudley Harrison.

The new building has been in use for about three weeks and the dedication and open house will afford postal patrons an opportunity to go through the building and see how mail is handled in both receiving and dispatching.

The committee stated they were also working on getting some dignitary here for the dedication service.

Old Landmark, 'Carpenter Place' Destroyed By Fire

One of the old landmarks of the county, and a house that recalls many interesting incidents to oldtimers, passed into history last Thursday when it burned to the ground. It is presumed to have been struck by lightning and was completely destroyed by fire.

"The Carpenter Place" as it was known, had been empty of occupants for several months prior to the fire.

The house was built in 1900 by Will Tom Carpenter when he moved west of the Pecos from Crockett county after he moved there with "\$2,700.00 to the good 250 head of goats and about 30 head of stock horses."

According to reliable information, Mr. Carpenter sold out his ranch in Crockett county in 1900 and moved 30 miles west of the Pecos with 250 head of goats, 29 saddle horses and \$2,700.00 which he later used to purchase more goats, drilled a deep well and built the house.

The house was located on the old road which ran from Dryden to Sheffield, about 12 miles north of Dryden and was a favorite stopping place for regular travelers to and from Dryden.

It was said that visitors were always welcome at the Carpenter place.

Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter were married in Missouri. She was a native of Copenhagen, Denmark, and they were married for more than 50 years before his death March 30, 1933. She survived her husband by three years and no heirs could be found after her death on September 1, 1936.

The story of Mr. Carpenter's life is told in an autobiography in diary form edited by Elton Miles, and called "Lucky 7".

Jess and Oscar Davis leased the Carpenter place in recent years and lived in a room which had been added as a wing to the original house. It is said that the house had many items of historical and monetary value inside including papers, letters, books, antiques in furniture, lamps, stoves, etc., at the time the house burned.

Following the death of Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter, the house had been allowed to deteriorate to a state of delapidation.

18-Year-Olds Calls For Physicals Begun

Austin — The first official call directing the physical and mental examination of 18-year-old males by state draft boards began Wednesday, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said this morning.

The quota, effective in July, directs the examination of 1,816 Texas 18-year-olds in that month. These youths will not be considered for armed forces service at this time, Col. Schwartz pointed out. Normally, a man is not reached for draft induction until about age 22.

Instead, their examination is the result of President Johnson's action of January 5, announcing that he was ordering the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly-registered men who are out of school and otherwise available for service.

Men married at age 18 and those known to be continuing in school currently will not be examined under the program. Also, high school graduates whose draft files show they intend to enter college the following semester will not be ordered for examination. If a high school graduate plans to enter college this summer or fall, he should notify his draft board immediately.

The 18-year-olds going for the examination in July will be primarily those who registered with draft boards in January 1964.

"The 18-year-olds who will be sent for examination in July and succeeding months," Colonel Schwartz said, "are those in class I-A, I-A-O, and I-O who became 18 years of age on or after January 1, 1964, the oldest first."

The examination of these 18-year-olds is a part of the President's action on manpower conservation, generally referred to as the "war on poverty". The 18-year-olds who fail the mental examination in July and subsequent months will be referred by draft board letters to local officers of the Texas Employment Commission, where they will receive advice and counsel on jobs and preparation for jobs.

The youths who get these letters will be under no compulsion to visit the TEC offices, but may go if they feel the government's offer to help will benefit them.

In addition to the 1,816 18-year-olds scheduled for examination in July, an additional 1,519 older males — most of them 21 and 22 years of age — will be examined to keep up a supply of manpower for future draft calls. This figure has been running between 5,000 and 6,000 men a month the past few months, Colonel Schwartz pointed out, but is now being reduced for July because of a larger pool of examined and acceptable men and lower draft calls.

Texas local boards have a quota of 262 men to deliver for armed forces service in July. This compares to 812 in January 517 in February, 610 in March, 449 in April, 258 in May and 231 in June.

The ambulance was purchased by the county and the purchase equipping, operation, maintenance, etc., is under the direct supervision and responsibility of County Judge R. S. Wilkinson Troy Druse, and Herbert Brown.

Mrs. L. O'Neill Writes of Tragedy Of Earthquake

Mrs. Lillian O'Neill wrote The Times recently and told of the experience of going through the earthquake in Anchorage, Alaska, where she was living with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Holen, and family.

We are printing the letter below:

"On Friday, 27th March, at approximately 5:36 p.m. a major coastal portion of Alaska was hit by the disastrous earthquake followed shortly by a devastating tidal wave of crushing, destructive proportions. We feel most fortunate for we are alive and well. Our house stood, but hundreds of homes and buildings were shattered. The quake struck with shuddering force and covered a wide area of coastal Alaska. Kodiak, Seward, Whittier and Valdez were all but destroyed. Anchorage, Cordova, and other cities were very hard hit.

"It is difficult to find the words adequate to describe the holocaust. Only the twisted wreckage left in the aftermath of the heaving, rumbling, wrenching earth can attest to the severity of the earthquake. Buildings buckled and collapsed; others shuddered violently and simply crumbled; others split wide open. Streets and lawns were torn apart. Water mains and sewer lines burst; telephone and power lines snapped. The earth rocked and split asunder in great upheavals. This Good Friday earthquake has been rated with the worst in history, 8.6 on the Richter scale.

The most expensive and most beautiful homes in Alaska were near the bluff in the Turnagain area of Anchorage, facing Cook Inlet, where great caverns appeared all about and several miles of the beautiful bluff sloughed off and collapsed into the inlet, carrying with it 77

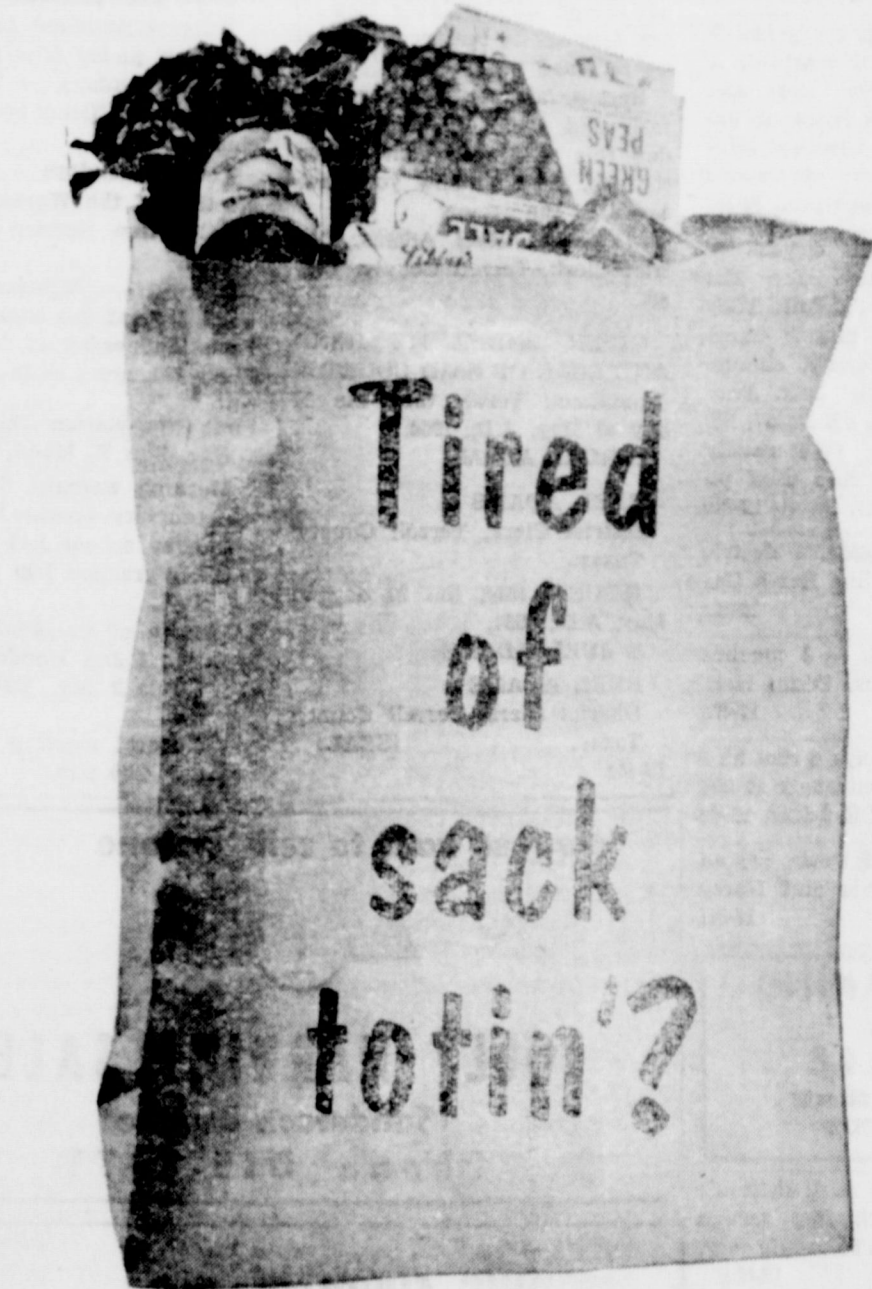

homes which were torn, crushed, twisted, destroyed. More than a city block deep of the bluff sloughed off. It was truly a miracle that hundreds did not die in this area alone, but only a few were lost there. One mother in this area watched as the earth opened up and swallowed two of her children.

"Erma Lee (Mrs. O'Neill's) daughter- and I struggled and groped trying to get the children out of the house here but we could not make it; the house was heaving and shaking so violently it was impossible to stand.

"Lee (Mr. Holen) was at the filling station at the time and started home and got here almost by the time it was over, his car bounced all over the road.

"We had a battery transistor radio and one Norad emergency station was broadcasting information and instruction to a bewildered public. We sat up most of the night trying to find out by radio if any of our friends were missing.

"It lasted about 4 minutes; had it lasted a minute longer I feel our house would have gone, it was heaving so and groaning as in mortal pain. There seemed to be very little panic at the time, but there were 200 tremors within the 48 hours following, some rather strong. We all felt uneasy.

"The fighting courage and spirit of Alaskans is demonstrated in the way they have all pitched in, clearing, and trying to solve major problems.

It is truly incomprehensible to realize the blow which this and other communities have sustained. One can walk from a portion of the city which appears to be relatively normal, and suddenly the street and homes disappear into churned caverns 40 or 50 feet below where they were before - everything totally unrecognizable.

"I say again, God was good to us and I do thank Him from the bottom of my heart.

"My purpose in writing to you was to give you a change of address to Scott AFB, Illinois, but thought you might be interested in the earthquake.

And, even after knowing that he was breaking the rules of the church in which he was worshipping by partaking of communion as a non-communicant, he went back for the second time.

But then he pulled the ears of his hounds on two separate occasions for photographers just to show that he could get by with it.

What powers does this man think he possesses, that he can violate the rules of one denomination in one of their most sacred rites?

The right to worship is given to individuals, but so is the right to worship differently.

If the right of a denomination to have rules regarding their rules and orders of worship are not respected, then neither is there any respect in the worship.

If the rules of a church's sacraments are subject to change by the president of this nation then they should not be withheld from anyone.

If the head of a nation has no regard or respect for the rights and privileges of others, then how can he expect any one else to have that respect?

Have we become a government in which "the king can do no wrong?"

Is there no more sanctity in anything?

I know of no greater privilege than the right of man to worship if, when and how he sees fit.

But when one person forces another person, or a congregation to worship his way, then he is wrong, no matter who he is.

We read recently where one family was barred by court order from attending a church because the loudness and manner of their singing was in a

manner calculated to be disrupting to the spirit and attitude of worship. We cannot see but that was only another means of failure to have respect for others and their right to worship as they pleased.

While we in our denomination do not have those restrictions on communicants, we will respect and even defend the rights of other denominations to make their own rules or recognize

whatever method of worship they see fit.

This might be a minor infraction of a rule to some, and to others it might not be worth consideration. We thought it worthy of mention - to say the least.

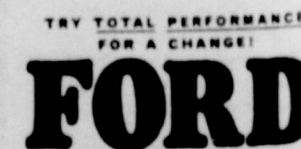
