Mexican Ranchers Aid In Eradication Of Screwworms

Livestock producers in Northern Mexico are so pleased with the reduction in screwworm infestations, because of the screwworm eradication program, they are making personal contributions to keep the project going.

A local cattleman's association in Nuevo Laredo in the Mexican state of Tamaulipas is contributing \$60 a month and the state association of Nuevo Leon is collecting \$10 from each of its members to help finance ground survey and inspection activities and control of screwworm infesta-

Sterile screwworm flies are beign released in an area of Northern Mexico encompassing nearly 250,000 square miles to prevent a buildup of fertile flies that could migrate into the areas of the United States where the insect has been eradicated. The action has reduced screwworm problems for Mexican ranchers as well. Mexico-employed livestock inspectors cooperate with U.S. inspectors in conducting educational and survey work in this buffer zone.

Maintenance of the live-fly barrier between the two countries is credited with keeping the incidence of screwworm infestations in the eradication area at an alltime low for the season.

Less than 90 screwworm cases were reported in Texas during the first six months of 1964. In the same period last year 1,464 infestations were detected, while 17,693 were recorded in 1962. New Mexico has reported two cases

'Death Alert' Is Issued for 4th

Austin - The Texas Safety Association this week issued an "accidental death alert" for the three-day July 4th holiday weekend, beginning at 12:01 a.m. Friday and ending at 11:59 p.m. on

J. O. Musick, TSA general manager, urged Independence Day celebrants to put safety first in all of their activities.

"Whether you are driving on the highway, spending the weekend at the lake, or just relaxing at home, being extra careful can make your holiday a time to remember instead of a time of tragedy," he said.

The safety director reminds citizens that accidents normally increase on a holiday, and holiday weekends are especially haz-

ardous. "This year Independence Day falls on Saturday and many employers will be giving workers a day off Friday. This provides an opportunity for a weekend trip and highways throughout the nation will be crowded," Musick

Last year there were 27 traffic deaths in Texas during the four-day period beginning with the Fourth of July on a Thursday. It is estimated that 32 persons will die in traffic during this three-day holiday.

The TSA "accidental death alert" period coincides with the Department of Public Safety traffic accident watch - "Operation Motorcide". The Association is coordinating its traffic safety program with the DPS and other state agencies. Subject for the TSA traffic safety promotion is "Courtesy and Caution".

Regional officers of the state safety organization will be working with local safety councils civic groups, traffic officials, and others in promoting all phases of

Screwworm Threat Hits Trans-Pecos

Sereyworms are again threatening the livestock industry of West Texas, particularly in the Trans-Pecos region where infestations were discovered late in

Eradication workers moved quickly into Pecos County where two cases were reported on June 29, in an attempt to prevent more infestations from developing.

Sterile screwworm flies, reared in the plant near Mission, are being released by airplanes in the area south of Fort Stockton where the cases were found in cattle castration wounds. Livestock in the immediate area are being sprayed by program in-

Eradication officials expressed concern over appearance of these cases, since this region has a history of heavy screwworm infestation during late summer and early fall. Failure to check this latest outbreak could result in problems later in the season, officials warned.

Only one other screwworm has been reported in the area this year - in Presidio County in mid-May. The first infestation last year was also in Presidio County, appearing a month earli-

Livestock producers are encouraged to be on the lookout for infestations in coming weeks. and should immediately report them to eradication headquarters by collecting a sample of 10 or more larvae from infested sores Sterile flies cannot be dispersed until a confirmed sample is received, officials stated

They also urged stockmen to use all precautions in working their animals, using smears to treat wounds caused through surgery or accidents, and using preventive sprays. Solutions of 0.25 percent Co-ral or 0.5 per cent Korlan give the best protection against screwworm attack, officials said.

Eradicators promised to use all means available to them to control the livestock pests in this area, but emphasized that the full cooperation and assistance of livestock producers is neces-







"The tremendous potential increase in beef and veal production which some of these countries are capable of obtaining in the future and the fact that they have no place to go with their increase except into the export trade, can bring ruination to the U.S. beef producer unless the imports are curbed by law," the cattleman added.

Wulff also strongly condemned the Secretary of Agriculture for statements attributed to the Department of Agriculture in an Associated Press article this

He said that if the article were true, then cattlemen know no help can be expected from that quarter. Wulff referred to the news article which stated in part 'material being distributed by Agriculture Department stresses an Administration contention that Congressionally-imposed barriers to foreign beef would have wide-spread harmful repercussions on exports of U.S. farm products."

"This leads to the conclusion that the Secretary of Agriculture is willing to sacrifice American beef and the American beef producer in order to maintain a favorable balance of trade in other products. Apparently he is blatently attempting to divide and conquer," Wulff stated. "What more reason could we possibly need for passage of adequate legislation establishing reasonable beef import quotas?"

New Auto Insurance Rates Set Texas automobile owners will pay less for auto insurance beginning August 1.

State Insurance Board and industry spokesmen agreed on the new rates, which will average out 1.2 per cent cheaper statewide than last year. Board estimates that motorists

will save \$3,000,000 in premiums compared with 1963. However rates will vary from area to Liability insurance rates reflect a statewide increase of 3.8

per cent, and medical payment coverage will increase about 8.7 per cent. Collision coverage will be reduced .5 per cent. Overall reduction in rates is

due primarily to a 15.5 per cent in comprehensive coverage, due to low wind and hail storm damages last year. Lawmakers Face Tough Job

An already "tough" job faced by Texas lawmakers in the 59th Legislature wil lbe complicated even more by "issues of high emotional content," Lt. Gov Preston Smith feels. These issues, according to the

lieutenant governor, include proposals to legalize parimutual betting on horse races, sale of iquor by the drink in eating establishments, control of oyster shell dredging on the Gulf Coast an oil and gas "pooling" bill further controls on water pollution, repeal of the poll tax and another proposed constitutional amendment to guarantee equal rights to women in property and business management "The Legislature will need

combination of many virtues if it disposes of all the important controversial legislation laid before it," Lt. Gov. Smith told approximately 250 mayors and councilmen gathered in the capital city for an institute on municipal problems. Three major "musts" confront

the Legislature next year, Smith said. These include: deciding the future course of higher education, financing education and "other vital state functions", and congressional and legislative redistricting.

Traffic Deaths Up 14 Per Cent

In a mid-year summary of the traffic situation in Texas, Col. Homer Garrison stressed that (atal accidents on the streets and highways are up about 14 per cent over 1963 - which was the worst year in history for Texas traffic with 2,729 fatalities.

"If this trend continues during the rest of the year, traffic deaths will go over 3,000," he said. "We must break this trend toward ever-increasing fatal accidents which seems to have set in almost exactly two years ago To do so, we must have public awareness of this dangerous situation and the full cooperation of everyone in saving lives and cutting down on injuries and economic loss."

The head of the Texas Department of Public Safety said a study of the present situation shows that the increase in fatal accidents has been in the cities and towns as well as on the open highways. A recent report shows that 445 fotal crashes occurred in cities and towns so far this year compared to 363 for the same period last year. The same report shows that a total of 524 rural fatal accidents have occurred this year, compared to 480 for the same period in 1963.

The Public Safety Director pointed out that nearly half of the fatal accidents that occur on rural highways involved either running off the roadway or headon collision. To guard against these most frequent types of fatal mishaps, Garrison offered these suggestions:

1. Be sure your equipment tires, steering gear, brakes windshield wipers, lights, etc., are in proper working order at at all times. 2. Be sure the driver is in good

physical and mental condition whenever he takes on the exacting job of dring. 3. Always be on the alert for unexpected actions of other driv-

as slick pavement, pedestrians construction areas, etc. 4. Reduce speed before enter-

ers and for other hazards, such

5. Avoid improper passing, one of the major factors involved in headon collisions.

6. Adjust speed to existing conditions and circumstances, regardless of the posted limits.
