Keith Mitchell Jr. Tells Rotarians Of European Trip

Keith Mitchell Jr., was guest speaker for the Sanderson Rotary Club Wednesday morning of this week and showed slides he had taken and told of his trip to Europe from which he just recently returned.

Young Mitchell was one of 22 young men in the Texas Association of Vocational Agriculture students chosen because of their leadership activities in the organization. The group was under the supervision of Mr. Meischen a vocational agriculture teacher in Raymondville.

The group went to Europe as a part of the "People to People" program, initiated by President Eisenhower, with the intent of promoting an understanding between the people of this nation and other nations of the world. The obligations of the young men were to meet the people observe their methods of doing things on the farms and compare their methods with those in this nation, and talk over the differences with the people where they are visiting.

Mitchell stated that he visited Scotland, England, Denmark, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, East and West Germany, France, and Belgium.

The trip lasted for 22 days and all agreed that they learned a lot about agricultural practices in Western Europe.

Among things mentioned that were impressive to the European visitors were the number of people, particularly women, working on European farms, and the type of labor that the women were doing; seeing an Angus bull that sold for \$70,000 as a calf; the sheep industry as carried on in Europe where producers expect a 175% lamb crop in an average year.

Mitchell stated, in regard to the trip, generally, that he was most favorably impressed with Scotland, the beauty of the country, and the friendliness of the people. He was negatively impressed with the accommodations, the quality of the food, and the type of food.

He stated that the meat had no fat on it and usually was half-cooked and tough.

The outside of all places was immaculately clean, but the inside sometime bordered on filth.

In the area behind the iron curtain, the young men were not allowed to take pictures of public buildings, of soldiers, or policemen, or any type of military vehicle or weapon. Mitchell stated that the people there were afraid to talk to them for fear of getting in trouble for what they said.

The agricultural processes in the iron curtain countries, he said, were in some ways equal to ours and in some ways lagging. Women did much of the labor on the farms with men as overseers and all of the group was impressed by the fact that a maximum effort was being made to get every ounce of production out of every available piece of ground.

The methods of protecting the animals from cold weather by bringing them inside barns and houses was unusual for the American boys to see, and there are many small producers in the European countries, and few herds of large numbers of sheep or cattle.

Young Mitchell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. K. Mitchell, Terrell County ranchers, and his father accompanied him to the Rotary breakfast Wednesday morning.

Flag Waving Lag Hit By Reader

One of the faithful readers of The Times sent us the following remarks last week about the lack of patriotism being indicated in so many ways so much of the time.

We appreciate people's interest in some of the better things of life and will be glad to print items we are handed when we are able to do so. Our failure to print some of them does not indicate a lack of interest or such, but sometimes, a lack of space, or time.

While one of the objectives of a newspaper is to bring news, it also has an obligation of trying to afford a livelihood to its owners and advertising must come before some things.

The following comments are by R. S. DeLove, author of "The Quiet Betrayal" and are a part of the Congressional Record.

"It is possible to wave the flag too much? Provided, of course that you wave it with integrity? Is it possible to study Lincoln or Shakespeare too much? Is it possible to read the Bible too much? The great, the good, the true, are inexhaustible for inspiration, example, and strength. I believe that we are not waving our flag enough, not nearly enough. It seems to me that we are developing a tendency to be timid or even apologetic about waving the Stars and Stripes.

"Walk up and down the streets on July 4th and count the flags. It is our nation's birthday, a sacred day in world history, the most important day of America. Why isn't the flag flying on every rooftop and from every home and building? This complacent attitude is strong evidence of cancerous patriotic decay. The flag is a symbol of our national unity. It is the spirit of our undying devotion to our country. It stands for the best that is in us — for loyalty, character, and faith in democracy.

"Isn't our flag a synonym of the United States of America? Does it not represent man's greatest, noblest, most sublime dream? Is it not the zenith of achievement, the goal to which generations have aspired? "I believe it is time for us — for the mad, rushing Twentieth Century American — to stop for a moment and think. Let's arrest our near reverential admiration of material success and return to the spiritual and ethical values —"

Right-of-Way Acquired For US 285 Project

The right-of-way for 1.8 miles of construction on U.S. 285 north of Sanderson has been secured, according to County Judge R. B. Wilkinson. The land is in the area known locally as "Big Hill".

Plans for the relocation of the road and reconstruction in that area are in the making and the securing of the right-of-way was one of the first steps necessary before State Highway Department engineers can proceed with their work.

The acreage involved was very small, according to Wilkinson since the project will only move the highway over slightly from its present location. It was also pointed out that the fence on only one side of the highway would have to be moved.

Post Office Printing Of Envelopes Probed

The Post Office Department has been asked to make a detailed explanation of the post office envelope printing activity and legal authority for the action, according to an Associated Press news release seen this week. The report is being asked by Rep. Robert B. Duncan, a Democrat from Oregon. He questioned the propriety of the Post Office Department accepting orders for stamped envelopes with the printed return address of the customer. His action resulted from his agreement with several small town printers who had complained that it is unnecessary competition with private business.

Rep. Duncan, the report stated, had said that the department, in answering an initial inquiry indicated that it pays, on a competitive bid basis, 40 cents a thousand for printing of the envelopes and charges \$2.50 a thousand or \$1.25 for 500 over and above the price of the unprinted stamped envelopes.

The news release stated that the department in this way offsets losses on the sale of plain stamped envelopes.
