**Turkish Girl Will Be FHS Exchange Student**

This 100-degree weather that Frionans have been baking in (or basking, for those who like to bask) isn't exactly football weather. Still, it's just a little more than three weeks until the Friona Chiefs will begin working out for the 1963 season. Then, too, the annual football magazines have hit the stands, so that helps to set the town's fans talking as to when and whether the Chiefs will break their 27-game losing streak.

At least one of the fall publications has gone on record as believing that the Chiefs are due to snap the string. . . . We quote from "Texas Football," which sizes up every district race for teams of class A through AAAA: "A year ago, Friona lost every game, running its losing streak to 27 games. Now the worm will turn."

The article points out that the Chiefs will have a whopping 25 lettermen back when practice starts, along with eight offensive and nine defensive starters.

Friona players gaining mention in the statewide publication were Doug Dodd, Everett Gee, Gary Renner, Larry Buckley, Mickey Wilson and Ronald Atwey.

About Friona's district race, 3-AA, the magazine had the following to say: "Muleshoe, a winner a year ago, is a solid choice again, although getting to the throne room this year should be a tougher assignment."

Being a native of Muleshoe, and more or less familiar with their case, we'd like to comment on that statement. For one thing, Muleshoe had been trying 25 years (since 1938) to win a district championship outright.

For another thing, they had to play Dimmitt, district favorite in most quarters, on the Bobcats' home field. They had never beaten Dimmitt on their home field.

To win the district crown, it took a wobbly extra-point kick and some gruelling defensive play to turn back Dimmitt, 7-6 in the championship showdown. Now, if a team has any tougher time winning a district championship than that, we want to see it.

In all fairness to the magazine, however, it did point out that overall quality throughout the district would be improved this year. For example, Morton, with 12 lettermen and six starters back, will be improved. So will Olton.

So, the Mules should in all probability have a tougher time with the other members of the district this season, including, we hope, Friona, which they beat 48-0 last year.

Sometimes, things are so close to you that you overlook them as news items. For instance, we knew of our neighbor, Vernon Scott, being involved in a car wreck that totally demolished his car, but failed to get a report in the Star.

We had talked to Scott a couple of times, but just forgot to write the story. Except for minor bruises, he was uninjured. Scott was returning home from Plainview where he had participated in a golf tournament. Meeting a car which was trying to pass another, he pulled onto the shoulder, but the other car clipped his side, and caused him to turn over.

The report goes (and Scott doesn't deny it) that the first thing he checked were the golf clubs, which luckily came through all right. How's that for luck?

Many Frionans paid little attention to the eclipse of the sun last Saturday. Evidently all the publicity about not looking directly at the sun without special precautions caused most people to skip it entirely.

In fact, some city residents may have felt like the Detroit woman, who reportedly called the weather bureau to ask "Why did they call it (the eclipse) off?"

Truth of the matter was that our 30 or 40 per cent of the show just wasn't enough to make a great deal of difference. With

Miss Yazgan, 16, will live with the W. M. Massie family, and will be the second exchange student in three years to make her home with the Massies. Ann Jensen, Friona's first exchange student two years ago, also lived with the Massies.

The new exchange student says her favorite subjects are English, geography, and physics. Sports she enjoys are swimming, horseback riding and tennis.

Her home is in Bebek, a suburb of Istanbul. She has one sister, who is 22, her father and stepmother in her immediate family. Her father is a mechanical engineer, who studied in Germany.

Miss Yazgan's mother, a German from Berlin, died about five years ago when she was just 11, and, she says, all the household depended on her, as her sister was working. "I grew very independent and self-reliant due to the fact that I had to give decisions on my own," her personal statement says.

Her father re-married about three years ago, and her family life has become much more orderly, Nergis says.

"I am very fond of every kind of animal, having grown in a house of three cats, two dogs, a canary bird and a gazelle," she says. Horses and dogs are her favorites, she points out.

**Changes Noted In Police Department**

Travis Clements, 29, who has been with the Police Department at Clovis, N.M., the past four years, became the new night patrolman for Friona the first of this month.

Clements replaces Rex Cowart, who resigned from the city's Police Department to assume duties as the Sheriff's Deputy for the Friona precinct, a position vacated last spring when Bill Morgan became Chief of Police.

Clements, a native of Muleshoe, began his career in law enforcement in Muleshoe, where he worked for a year and a half. His father, Dee Clements, is sheriff of Bailey County.

A graduate of Muleshoe High School, Clements spent two years with the U. S. Army in Germany, where he served with the Counter Intelligence Corps. He and his wife, Paula, have a son, Dennis Lynn, age 10

"After I finish Lycee in A.C.C. (American College for Girls) I am planning to continue my education in Switzerland. Knowing German and English, I would like to learn French as well. After studying four or five years in the "Ecole de

Interpret," I am thinking of becoming a "Simultaneous Interpreter" and work in such organizations like the U.N.," she says.

She lists as reasons for coming to the United States the following:

"To come to the U.S., a place that we hear to be so civilized and cultured in every field, and see it with my own eyes. Then of course to improve my knowledge of English and to broaden my education with a year of study in the U. S. The most thrilling and important aspect of coming to the U.S. is that during my stay there I will get in touch with many Americans of both sexes and all ages, most of whom may not have met a Turk in their whole lives. If I can give them an understanding of Turkey and strengthen the friendship between those two countries, I will consider the time and effort well spent."

Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr reminds that the student is sponsored by the Friona chapter of American Field Service.

"The expenses of her being here will run about \$1,000, which includes the \$700 fee which goes to the AFS," Farr said. "Any community donations would be appreciated by the AFS. We have a balance of \$338.70 at present," he pointed out.

The most recent donation was one of \$50 by the Progressive Study Club. Donations may be given either to Andy Hurst, chairman of the local AFS committee, or to Farr, or deposited to the Foreign Student Fund at Friona State Bank.

**Second Accidental Death Recorded**

Friona recorded its second accidental death in an eight-day period this past Sunday, with the drowning of two-year old Pancho Lopez.

The Lopez youngster drowned in a drainage ditch which carries runoff water from Friona Growers and Shippers to Frio Draw. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pedro Lopez, missed the boy upon returning from Hereford late Sunday, where they had been working.

The baby was found in about two feet of water. He was taken by Friona patrolmen to Farmer County Community Hospital. Patrolman Travis Clements administered artificial respira-

tion until a doctor was summoned, but the boy was pronounced dead at 9:15 p.m.

Officers said that the youngster apparently wandered away from his other brothers and sisters, and may have been in the ditch as long as 45 minutes.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at St. Teresa of Jesus Mission. Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Claborn Funeral Home.

Survivors other than the parents were sisters Sara, 16, Juanita, 13, Margaret, four and Alicia, one, and brothers Danny, eight, and Pedro Jr., 10.

The family lives at a labor camp near Friona Growers and Shippers, not far from where the drowning occurred.

Eight days previously, Cecilia Marruffo, a 15-month old girl, was accidentally killed when an older sister backed a car over her. Prior to the two fatal accidents, it has been some three years since a fatal accident had happened in Friona.

**Temperature Hits High For Year**

The temperature in Friona finally hit the 100-degree mark for the first time this year Tuesday afternoon after flirting with it for the past few weeks.

High temperatures in the city were constantly above 90 during the week, with 62 the lowest nighttime temperature. No moisture was recorded.

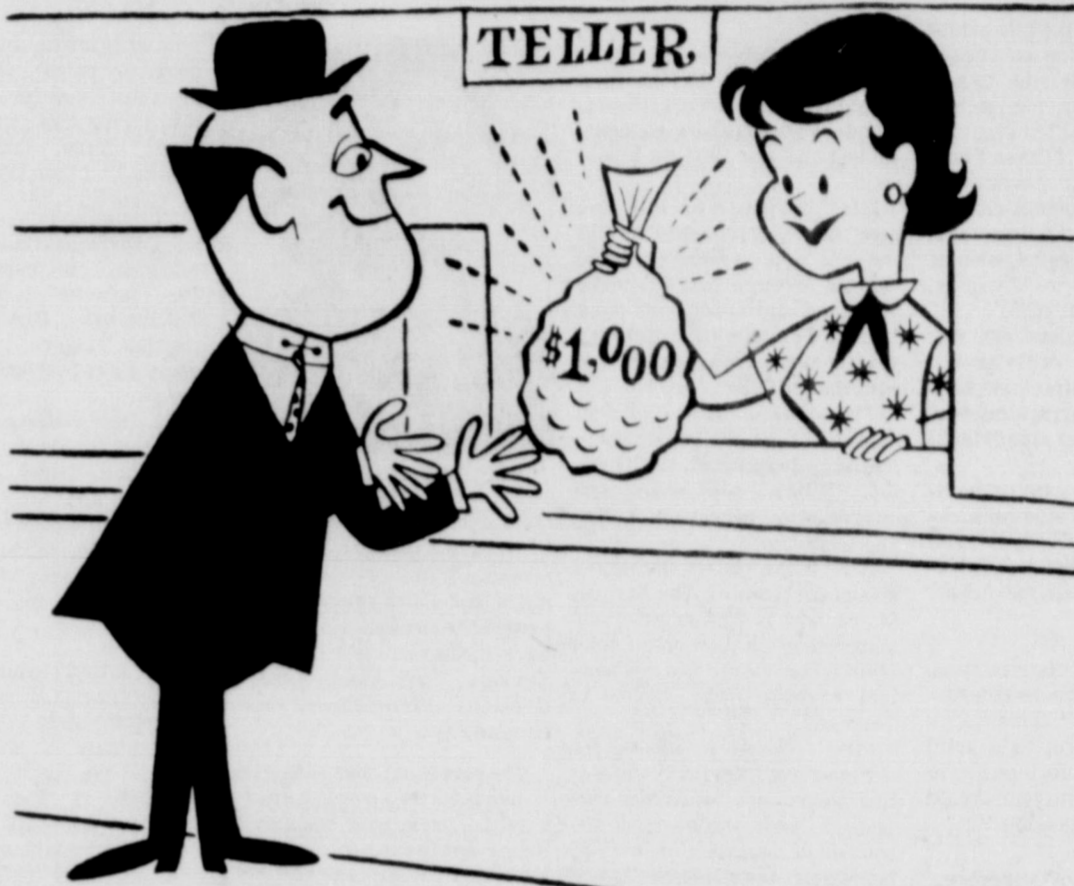
### Airman Clarke Re-assigned

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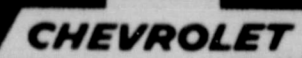


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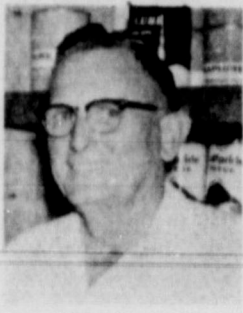

Danny Baize went the distance for Herring, and led the team at the plate with two hits in four trips at bat, one a hit that cleaned the bases in the four-run fourth inning.

Scott Cummings pitched for Hub Grain. The winners outthit the losers just 7-6, but Herring collected six walks and took advantage of five Hub errors.

Chester - Fleming accepted the generosity of Farmer County Implement's nine errors in its Tuesday night win. Terry Fite led the assault with three hits in four at-bats. Don Ready and Tommy Sherley added a pair of hits.

Jordan and Fite limited the losers to four hits. The winners scored six in the second to take a 6-1 lead, getting only one hit during the inning. They came back for six more in the third, and a 12-3 lead.

Friona Drilling took the lead as Mitch Terry singled and scored on Don Carthel's hit. Steve Buckley knocked Carthel in, and he scored on Danny Carthel's single for a 4-1 lead for Friona Drilling.

Brookfield came back to tie the count on a single by Bernard Binger and two errors. Jim Peace scored on a Texas League single by Larry Graves, and he scored the tying run on Jeff Price's infield hit. Brookfield wrapped up the game in the bottom of the sixth when Tommy Mars led off with an infield hit. He stole second, then Binger singled over third base to drive home the winning run.

Graves and Carthel went all the way for their respective teams. Both pitched commendable games.

McCaslin Lumber Company had to rally for an 11-10 win over Friona Star-Hurst Stores, to even its season record at 5-5. Star-Hurst came close to breaking the goose-egg in the win column, holding a 6-2 lead in the fourth inning. But nine errors eventually were their downfall.

Cordova and Dale Neill pitched for McCaslin. Mike Pavulus and Mike Daugherty hurled for Star-Hurst. Neill had four for four for the winners.

Last Thursday, Brookfield Drilling coasted to a 20-2 win over Star-Hurst, scoring 14 runs in the second inning to take a commanding lead. Ray Peace was the winning pitcher. Friona State Bank edged Reeve Chevrolet, 7-6, scoring three runs in the last of the sixth. They had scored three times in the fifth, highlighted by a double by winning pitcher Sargosa Moreno, who also doubled in the sixth.

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# Long-Time Pen Pals United As Pennsylvanians Visit

A friendship which began last week by a Pennsylvania family with their friends in Friona, culminated in a cross-country visit.

gel and Marvin Mengel, Jr. of Allentown, Pennsylvania, spent the week with the Roscoe Parr family, becoming better acquainted with the friends they had known only through letters and telephone calls.

Marvin Jr. and Cordella Parr Eddins began corresponding when they were in the second grade. Marvin had written to Allan Shivers, who was then governor of Texas, and requested that his name be given to a Texas student for corresponding.

Cordella was in Mrs. Hanson's homeroom when Marvin's name was put on the blackboard along with others, for those who wanted to write to "pen pals."

The two corresponded for several years, then when Marvin doubled up in school (he finished high school at 16) Mrs.

Mengel began to write for her son, and soon the two mothers had taken over the original "pen pals."

By 1957, the Mengels decided that they wanted to take a trip to Texas, and meet the friends with whom they had corresponded. Every summer since then, it has been their intention to spend their vacation in this manner, but because of health reasons or business, it had been impossible until this year.

This summer their dream was finally realized, and last Monday (July 15) the Mengels drove into Friona, being royally ushered into town by a true-life Texas duster.

The Mengels were anxious to find out if there were still such things as ranches and honest-to-goodness cowboys. They were quite surprised to find that cotton gins hadn't gone

out of style, but were still very much in existence.

While here, the Mengels were able to see plenty of cowboys participate in a rodeo at Tulla. They ate barbecue while sitting on bales of hay under shade trees. "They considered this rugged living," Parr says.

The Parrs took them, along with the Raymond Gage family of Needmore, on a sight-seeing tour which included Carlsbad Caverns, El Paso-Juarez, and White Sands National Monument. They saw their first bona-fide Indians at a Mesquero reservation.

Among other things, the Mengels were able to see their first coyote, and while on their tour, saw several ranches, assurance that they do still actually exist. The two Mengel men spent a day working with Roscoe in the field, to them this was quite an experience, Parr said.

"They thought that we had a lot of corn," Parr related, explaining that they referred to our maize. They were impressed with irrigation wells which pump twice as much water as any irrigation well they had seen, and thought our tractors were "monsters," Parr said.

"They were sincere in getting away from the general tourist run. We (both families) felt we had known each other always. We enjoyed them very much, and they seemed to enjoy their stay here," Parr said.

The Mengels almost made the long-planned trip last year, but at the last minute sold their home and had to spend their vacation moving. So they spent their vacation money on a "marathon" long-distance telephone call to the Parrs.

Everything worked out right this year. Marvin Jr., who is now a student in John Hopkins School of Medicine and a junior intern at Sacred Heart Hospital in Allentown, had two weeks off to coincide with his parents' vacation, and the trip was realized.

Mr. Mengel is a packing engineer with Western Electric, and his wife is employed in the auditing department there. They are Pennsylvania German. Mrs. Mengel's ancestors are traced back to the original colonists.

She explained that she couldn't speak English when she (Mrs. Mengel) started to school. Marvin Jr. speaks both German and English fluently and hopes to practice medicine in Allentown, where many of the older residents enjoy talking in their

A 1959 graduate of Sunray High School, Bates is a member of Knights men's social club, Student Education Association and Mathematics Club.

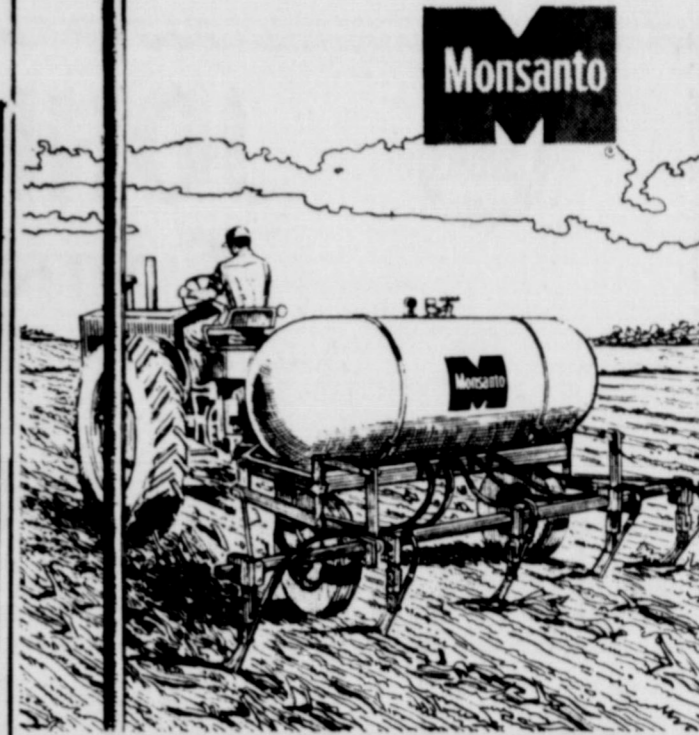



**ONE YEAR AGO**  
 July 28, 1962 -- Jack Seale, campaigning for U. S. Representative for the 18th Congressional District, charged President Kennedy with trying "for complete control," during a Friona speech.

The Parmer County Grand Jury indicted former Bovina mayor Emmett Tabor on counts of theft, inebriement, forgery and passing.

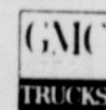

Previously, both had remained open the entire day on Saturday.

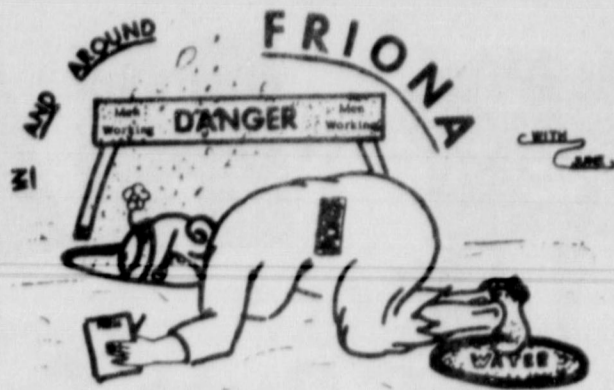
### Equalization Board To Meet Saturday

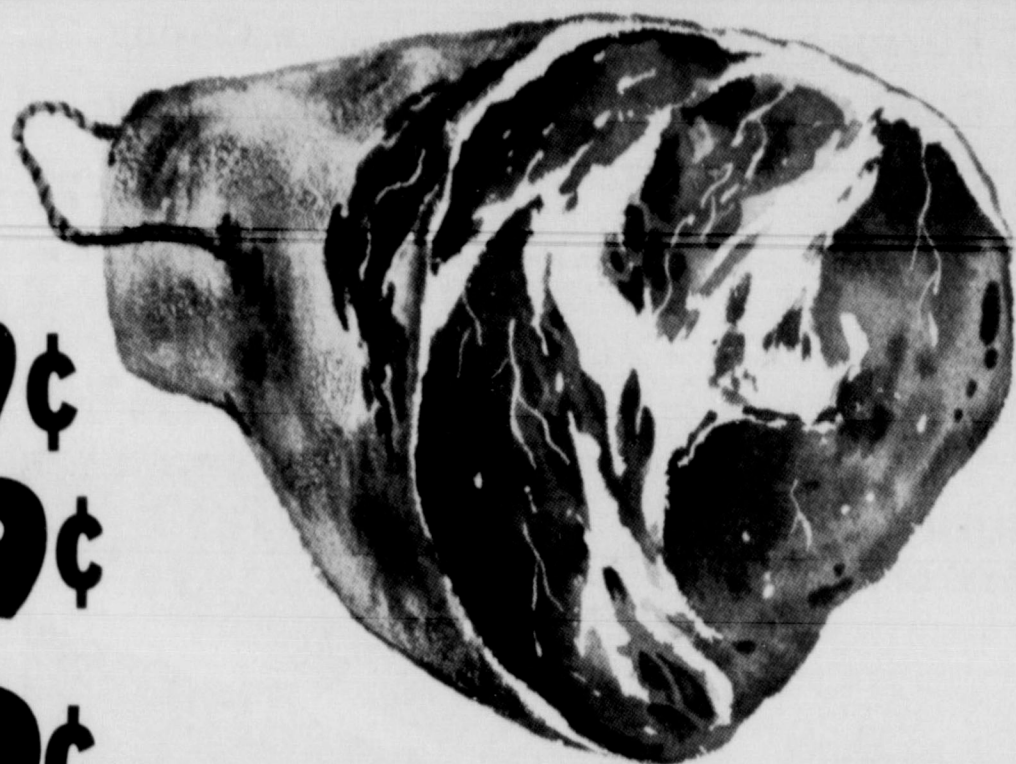

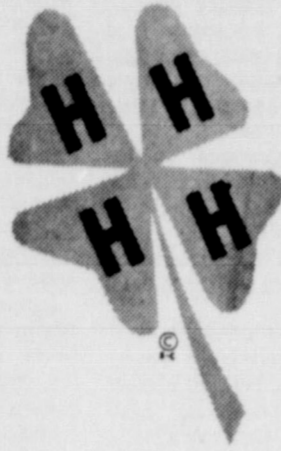

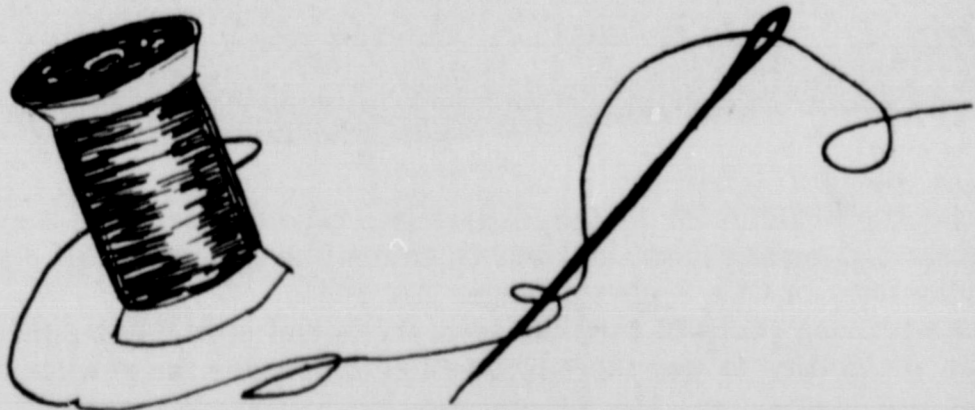

# Camp Begins Monday For FFA, 4-H Youth

The A&M College of Texas Adjunct at Junction will be headquarters for the ninth annual Youth Range Camp for outstanding 4-H and FFA boys. July 29 - August 3 are the dates for this Texas Section, American Society of Range Management sponsored event which recognizes, develops leadership, and gives advanced training in range management to the boys attending.

Boys selected to attend are those who have conducted outstanding range management demonstrations or projects, participated in range and plant judging contests, or shown an active interest in range management. These boys are given scholarships to the camp by interested individuals, livestock associations, 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters, county farm bureaus, banks, soil conservation districts and others.

## HAIL DELAYED CROPS

# Bovina Vegetable Harvest Begins; Crops Are Late

Gateway Produce Company in Bovina began packing operations Monday, but the bulk of its operations will not begin for another week or two, since the vegetable harvest is later than usual this year.

Vegetable growers in the "heart of Farmer County" were hard hit by hail and exceptional amounts of rain during June, and most of the vegetables were wiped out, having to be replanted at a late date.

"We had 780 acres of vegetables up to a good stand around Bovina in June, but hail ruined all but about 200 acres," said Mario Trevino, Gateway's plant manager.

"This has been our worst year for getting the crops started since Gateway located in Bovina in 1958," Trevino said. "Usually by the latter part of June we're ready to begin harvest operations on some crops. This year we were still planting at that time," he added.

As a result of the hail, this year's cantaloupe crop, annually the company's big money commodity, was cut to 250 acres, as opposed to 400 acres last year. The company had cut the crop to 325 acres to start with, and late hail caused another 75 acres not to be replanted to cantaloupes.

After the big hail, which stacked up three feet deep in the Bovina area, all that remained of the original 780 acres of vegetables were some cabbage, a small acreage of cantaloupes and peppers.

With the cantaloupe acreage down, growers have increased or substituted their acreage with sweet corn, which totals 450 acres in the area. Other major crops include 200 acres of cabbage, 200 in cucumbers, 75 acres of peppers, and an additional 100 acres of mixed vegetables.

Included in the minor vegetable crops are turnips, red beets, squash, eggplant, parsley, green onions and mustard greens.

The packing company was scheduled to begin processing cabbage and cucumbers on Monday of this week. If the weather cooperates and the crops mature as expected, Gateway will begin packing corn, turnips, squash and beets on Monday, July 29.

By Monday, August 5, the remaining crops, including cantaloupes, should be ready for processing. "By then, we hope to be processing 14 or 15 items," Trevino said.

The company officials hope that the Farmer County vegetable crop will turn out good, due to crop failures to their operations in the Rio Grande Valley.

"It has been a hard year on vegetables all year, just as it has been on other crops," Trevino said. He pointed out that when Farmer County wheat was hurt by sub-zero freezing weather last winter, the Rio Grande Valley also received a couple of freezes, which spelled the loss of some 500 acres of melons belonging to Gateway, as it was too late to replant them.

Farmers with large plots of sweet corn include James Boardman, 75 acres; Ray Landrum (near Friona), 60

acres; Robert Peggram, 50 acres; Marlin Ferguson, 50 acres; Arlan Hartzog, 40 acres; Bud Crump, 30 acres; and Lawrence Jamerson, 30 acres.

Gateway Produce has 106 acres adjacent to its packing house, planted to cantaloupes, cabbage, cucumbers and mixed vegetables.

Some of the other larger vegetable plots are distributed as follows: cabbage -- Boardman, 40 acres; John Lorenz, 40 acres; and Mark Charles, 20 acres; cucumbers -- Boardman and Lorenz, 40 acres; Tom Caldwell and Ferguson, 35 acres. The main pepper growers include Wendol Christian, Ferguson and Caldwell.

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# Parr's Onions Tops; Spud Harvest Goes Mechanical

Bruce Parr Produce Company has just completed processing what Parr terms an "exceptional" onion crop, and

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is in the third week of processing potatoes, which he says aren't "up to Parr" this year. The produce company 10 miles east of Friona has "gone mechanical" with its potato harvest this year, with a new mechanical digger-loading machine, which has eliminated about 50 per cent of the labor problem connected with harvesting potatoes.

Under conventional potato harvest methods, a crew of from 50 to 60 field workers are needed, along with another six or eight to load the trucks. With the machine, just a handful of men are needed, and the

trucks are loaded as the potatoes are dug.

The elimination of the extra laborers also cuts down on the accompanying housing problem, Parr points out.

Another advantage of machine-loading the spuds, is that they can be dug through the heat of the day, rather than just at morning and evening, without the danger of "burning," which occurs if they lay in the field.

"You have very little control over the potato harvest under the old method," Parr said. "This way you can schedule it to suit yourself."

At the first of the week, the company lacked just a few sacks of onions having the 1963 crop sold and shipped out. The onions were of excellent quality, with practically no cullage, and a good market was realized.

"We came within the skin of our teeth of losing our onion crop," Parr said. He pointed out that if the crop had received another quarter inch of moisture at the critical period, they would have been ruined.

As it was, the onions turned out to be the best in years. The dry harvesting conditions were ideal and there was a good

market. Parr had seven and one-half acres of onions, and harvested 300,000 pounds, or 40,000 pounds per acre. "We experimented with some three-row beds in our onions, and they turned out pretty good," Parr said.

The produce company processed and shipped its own onions this year for the first time. It has been processing potatoes for several years, but this is the first time that the onions were handled "at home."

In the processing shed, Parr has installed other labor-saving devices, to keep abreast of the constant labor pinch. He has special attachments to hand trucks which allow the loaders to load as much as 900 pounds of potatoes per load, then unload the attachment, which stands in place with its load, awaiting shipment.

Parr's processing plant is under the direction of Tom Gonzales, a native of Hereford, who with his family makes up the entire processing crew.

"Tom has been helping me since 1956. I'd be lost without him and his family," Parr says.

Parr has 165 acres of potatoes this year, and still has

about 125 acres to be harvested. So far, the spuds have yielded about 180 sacks per acre. "We've had no trouble delivering the potatoes, but they're just not as good as we're used to," he says. "Compared to other areas, though, they may not be so bad," he adds.

Parr's company packs its number one potatoes under the "Kim" brand, named for his eight-year-old son. His number two potatoes are sacked under the "Parmer County Potatoes" label, and his specialty spuds

bear an Angus in the foreground, with the Parr brand, a neat three-color printed on bright burlap.

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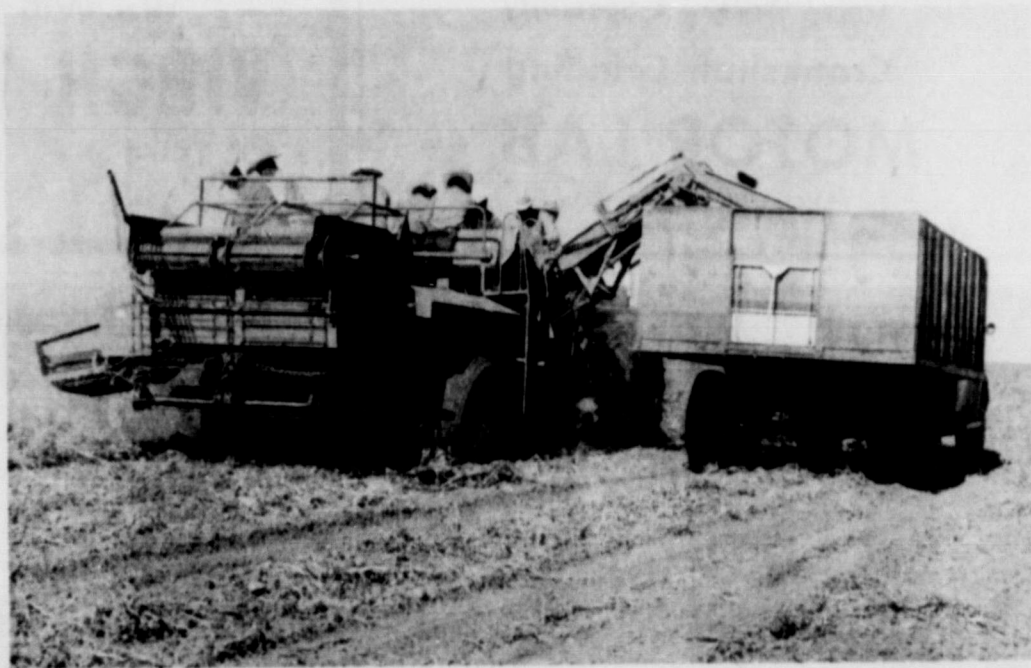

## NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

Farm Safety Week has been promoted by Farm Bureau and other farm organizations for many years. Farmers have a hazardous occupation compared to most others, as indicated by the accident rate on farms. Most farm accidents, like other accidents, could probably have been prevented if the victims had not been careless for an instant, in the operation of some equipment, or in the handling of livestock.

Farm Safety Week is just about over now, and we hope safety promotion by news media, individuals, clubs and everyone interested may contribute to a safer year of farming than we have seen before.

THE "Loyalty Pledge", promulgated by the USDA in March of this year, requiring ASC county committeemen to sign a pledge to support farm programs they must administer, was rescinded on July 11, 1963. ASC committeemen will now be required to pledge that they will faithfully, fairly, and honestly perform their duties to the best of their ability. This is a reasonable pledge to be required in any place of public service.

H. R. 3669 by Harris, of Arkansas, and S. 774 by Humphrey, of Minnesota, to amend anti-trust laws to authorize

manufacturers to fix resale prices, called a "Quality Stabilization" bill are being considered by House and Senate Commerce Committees in Washington. Farm Bureau Opposes these proposals, and we would think nearly any consumer would oppose them. Competition, which gives the consumer a choice of retailers, depending upon the best price for a given item, would be out of the picture with this kind of law. Some states operate under this type of law now, and dealers are subject to fines and prison sentences if they sell under the prescribed price.

Gideons are prohibited from distributing Bibles in the schools of Orange County, Florida. Nine taxpayers in the county objected on the grounds that "distribution of the Bible, provided by Gideons International, violated the teachings, tenets and principles of the religious faiths of some of the taxpayers". The District Court of Appeals was upheld by the Florida Supreme Court "in view of the recent decision of the U.S. Supreme Court concerning Bible reading". It seems that predictions by some so-called

rightists who claimed there would be further quieting of religious ideals in all public places were right.

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## On The Farm In Farmer County

Everyone at the present time is concerned about the Sorghum Midge, and it is something we should know about, but not get alarmed about.

There is a possibility now that we could have Sorghum Midge in our grain sorghum in the months of August and September.

The Sorghum Midge is probably the worst insect that attacks grain sorghum, and the insect is present in nearly all southern states.

If you examine a head of sorghum or other host plant while it is in the bloom, you may see many of the small, orange-colored midges crawling over the spikelets. These midges are laying their eggs in the spikelets or seed husks. Pinch the spikelets a few days later and you will crush the small maggots that have hatched from the eggs. In a week or

two after the plants have bloomed you will find the seeds dark and shriveled and containing the small orange-colored larvae or pupae of the midge.

The injury to sorghum grain by the sorghum midge is done by the larvae, or maggots, which feed on the juices of the developing seed, causing them to dry up and become discolored. The infested grain heads appear blighted or blasted; they resemble sterile heads and produce practically no grain. An infestation of one larva per spikelet is sufficient to cause the loss of the grain. Blighted heads, however, may be due to lack of fertilization or some other cause.

No variety of sorghum has yet shown any great resistance to the attacks of the sorghum midge. The insect readily infests all varieties of the sorghums, sorgos (sweetsor-

ghums), broomcorn, Johnson-grass, and Sudangrass. Purple-top, a wild grass plentiful in many of the Southern and Eastern States, is sometimes infested. Apparently the midge does not breed extensively in any other native wild grasses.

Serious injury to a field of sorghum does not occur unless there is a nearby infestation from which an influx of female midges may come. Johnson-grass, when allowed to head, provides an excellent place for development of the midge. It blooms very early, thus permitting the individuals first emerging to breed and increase in numbers before the sorghum fields come into bloom. Midges continue to breed throughout the season in Johnson-grass, thereby making it a constant source of infestation to blooming sorghum fields.

Fields of early sorghum from which midges are emerging are serious sources of infestation to adjacent fields that come into bloom later.

Volunteer and early-blooming host plants may develop in a field some time before the main crop comes into bloom. These early heads are usually heavily infested and may provide an infestation for the remainder of the field.

Midges may fly a considerable distance from an infested field to fields of other host plants which are in bloom, especially with the help of the wind, which is an important factor in their dispersion. Practically all spread is in the direction of the prevailing winds.

## At Home In Farmer County

Many growing families have chosen plastic upholstery because it is very practical and easy to care for, yet there are problems even with this especially with white or very light plastic.

Plastic Upholstery facts. Vinyl plastic fabrics on upholstered furniture, headboards, stools, hassocks, and the like, may look fragile -- but one sure thing is, they aren't. They shed spilled liquids, resist dirt, and are hard to scuff. They also resist many kinds of stains, though not all. Moreover, dirt can get ground into the grain of the plastics, when they've had long, hard use, to a point where sudsy-water wiping isn't enough.

Solution for stubborn dirt. For ground-in dirt, use a heavy concentration (very sudsy) of regular laundering detergent, and a medium bristled brush. Apply a pool of suds--one-half cup or so -- to an area of the plastic, scrub briskly with the brush, and wipe up the soil and suds with a clean bath towel. Rinse, polish-dry with another towel.

Coping with Stains. Particular troublemakers for vinyl fabrics are shoe polish, paint, ballpoint ink, nail polish and polish remover. Treat as promptly as possible. Note: Rinse plastic after using a stain remover.

For shoe polish (or heel marks): Sponge lightly with cleaning fluid. Paint: Sponge with turpentine. Ballpoint ink: Using rubbing alcohol. Nail polish use polish remover: Blot well, and sponge with cleaning fluid. Brownish stains: These result from contact with products containing sulfur. To re-

move, saturate a clean cloth with 6 per cent solution of hydrogen peroxide (from a drug store), then place on area for 30 minutes or as long as overnight.

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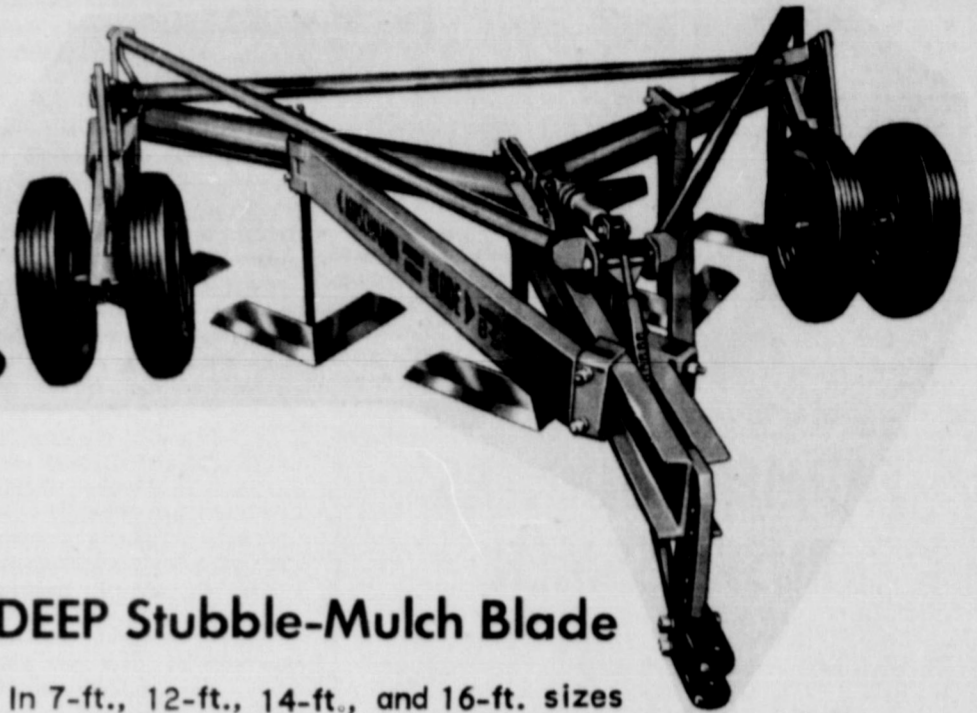
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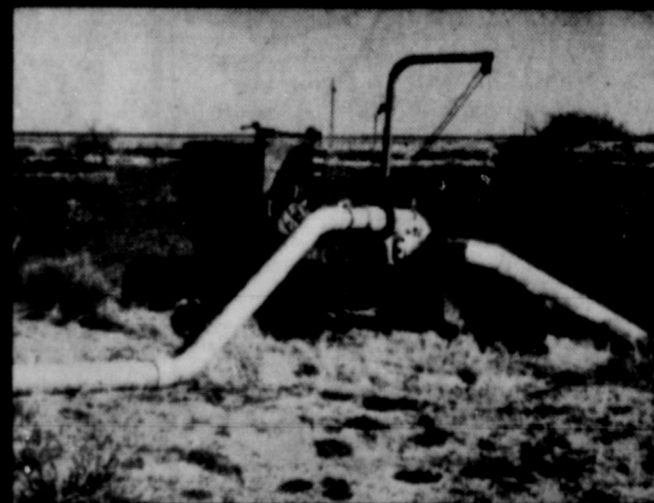
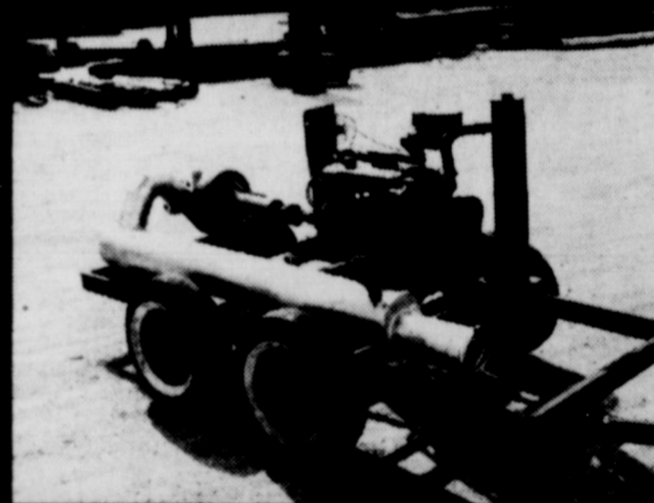
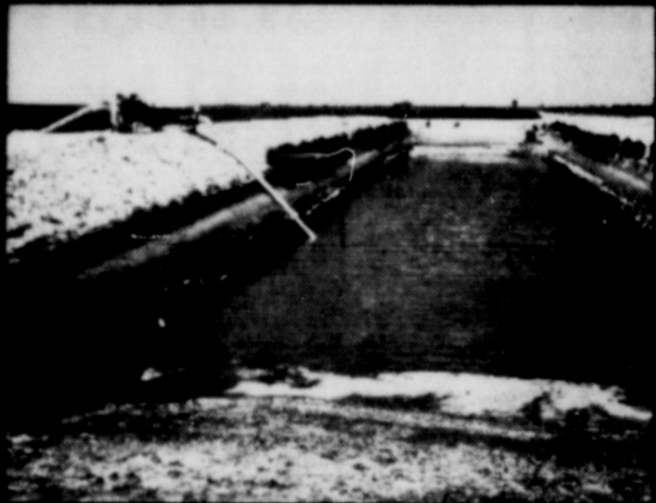
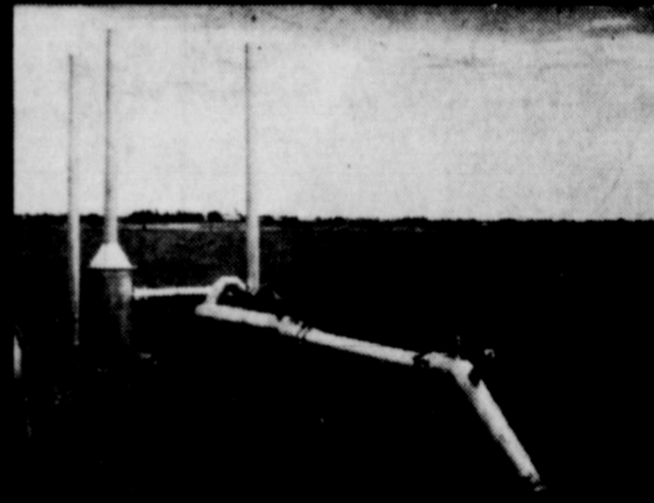
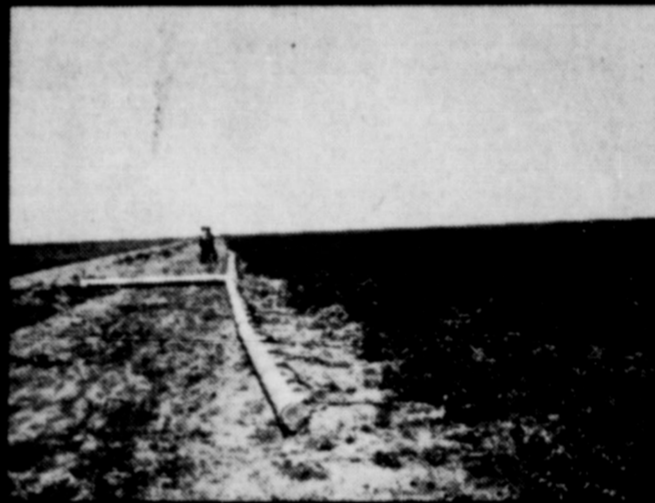
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
