Northcut Quits Trucking After 34 Years' Work

M. G. Northcut Sr. completed a deal last week in which his trucking firm was sold to Jim Turner. Northcut had been in the trucking business in Sanderson since 1930.

In recounting his experiences in the trucking business, he said that what he recalled most vividly was the work that he had put in during those 34 years past.

Northeut moved to Sanderson from the ranch west of Dryden now operated by Milton Holmes and had a 1930 Chevrolet bobtail ton and a half truck when he began the business. He said that he had worn out at least 50 trucks and driven no telling how many millions of miles.

In the early days of the trucking business, he said, there were no trucks in Fort Stockton or in Rankin and his crew was busy in that wide area during the seasons when livestock is shipped. They hauled the stock in to the railroad from the ranches, and only in later years did they begin the hauls to the market from the ranches.

Northcut recalled several incidents which were outstanding memories to him, some of which had a note of humor about them. and others, he said, were only funny now in looking back on

He said the most serious accident in which he was involved was when he ran into the back of another of his trucks on a ranch road. The driver in the truck in front of him had stopped to pick up a can which he trought to be full of oil and one he had lost, and Northcut, because of the dust, did not see the stopped vehicle and ran into it full tilt. He said the radiator and instrument panel were in his lap and the trailer had jammed against the back of the cab and he was pinned in about eight inches of space in the cab. After he was finally extricated, he was brought to Sanderson and treated, but it was not learned until later that he had broken both legs, and he had walked around some before being brought to town, and some after coming to town, too.

One of his humorous experiences, he said, was when a local colored man had bummed a ride to Fort Stockton. Ordinarily he had a "swamper" with him, but on this trip he didn't and welcomed the rider because he had previously wondered how he was going to make it up some of the hills without a "swamper" to scotch the wheels when the truck stalled. Northcut said he had briefed the man on what he should do when the truck stall-

When the truck stalled, the Negro jumped out and did exactly what he was asked to do He used a huge rock from beside the road and "scotched" the wheels to prevent the truck

from rolling back down the hill

When they decided to try to make it further up the hill, the Negro was told to follow the truck, since Northcut figured he would need to "scotch" in a hurry before reaching the brow of the hill. The truck started, and by Northcut's pursuasion and straining, made the brow of the hill on the next run. He stopped and got out to wait for his helper and he came up the hill lugging the rock which weighed ap-

proximately 125 to 150 pounds. Mr. Northcut, in recalling the past, also noted that mud was an enemy of his early trucking career, and it did rain more then, he said. He told of taking two days in coming to town (Continued to page 4)

Tight Ground Given As Reason For Lack Of Rain's Benefits

By W. O. Ray Conservation Specialist Soil Conservation District

It has been noted around this area that grass has not responded to recent rainfall though some places have received from one-half to an inch of moisture on several occasions during the growing season.

Much of the rangeland has never fully recovered from the last extended drought and put on a grood permanent cover of grass. This is one reason why rainfall is not effective. Range that is practically bare of cover takes a hard pounding from high intensity rainfalls received in this area. The ground becomes sealed and cannot take in moisture readily. Bare areas may have a penetration of less than one inch in depth, from one inch rainfall, because the water runs

off so quickly it can't soak in. This forms a cycle. As ground cover becomes less, the moisture intake is reduced, and with less moisture more plants die each year thus leaving more bare

With an average yearly rainfall record of approximately !! inches not many years provide the slow soaking rains needed for a deep moisture supply. An inch of rainfall on rangeland in weakened condition with no submoisture and a very dry humidity is ineffective. All trace of the rain may be gone within a week, which is not time enough to produce any feed.

Grasses live and grow on food manufactured in their own green leaves. The leaves are also the mechanisms that provide suction to draw moisture and nutrients from the soil. The ability of the grass plant to manufacture food and take in moisture is reduced when the leaves are destroyed from drought or over-

In order to start this cycle in the other direction, it will be necessary to get the range covered with grass to slow down runoff and allow for more penetration. This can be accomplished by a planned program of summer deferrments and good range management following defer-


