We read a news article the other day telling how big the national debt was and it went on to say that this figure was larger than the national debt of all other nations of the world.

We have no desire to verify the report. We are going to take the author's word for it. We do not have an adding machine with sufficient capacity to enter the record of the national debt of the U.S. and we probably would not be able to add that high sans number.

What a heritage to leave our children!

What can we expect our world tomorrow to be like with such chaotic mess of finances starting future generations in the debt?

We must have adopted the advice, "Eat drink and be merry, for tomorrow you may die."

Can we say that we care anything at all about our children? We say to them: "We leave you America and the biggest national debt in the world."

It would not be dissimilar to giving it up high and mighty and handing up a world of debt and offering that as the inheritance to our own children.

Now as you read this, you smirk, and say there's little or nothing you can do about it, or you say that this is the price of freedom, government or democracy, or anything else you want to say.

But you smirk and evade the issue. But let's see you explain away the fact that we, as a people, are tolerating a waste of money.

The House recently passed a bill to eliminate the salt cedar in the Pecos.

The purpose is "to conserve water."

Anyone can think of a "good purpose" when they start spending someone else's money. But we people can think of ways of saving someone's money.

We like the conservative ways of those who opposed the passage of the bill. And we have no quarrel whatsoever against the ranchmen and farmers on whose land the salt cedars grow.

The eradication of salt cedars, cedar, biteweed, lechuguilla, predators, and all other pests to the ranchmen in our opinion should not be eliminated by the taxpayers.

We always favor any plan to help a farmer or rancher in helping himself, the same as with other businesses. But the ranchmen have seen now what it means to the industry when you get the federal government doling out money for different phases of an operation.

And too, it's difficult to turn down a dole coming to you, and it's easy to condemn a dole going to the other fellow.

We have threatened to get a picture of the mess that constant litter on our highways in spite of the efforts of the Texas Highway Department, and law enforcement officials. The reason we haven't is that we hate to advertise our messiness!

Drive out the roads for just a few miles from Sanderson some cleaning and look at the clutter of bottles and cans than line the highway or that are stacked in piles at turn-around points on the road. This mess costs money to clean up, and it is unsightly because it is picked up. It is also difficult to catch people making such litter.

And we don't suggest throwing the bottles and cans over the fences where they will injure livestock.

## Eight Indictments Are Charged By Local Grand Jury

Eight bills of indictment were drawn up by the Terrell County grand jury at its meeting Monday. All known considerations for the grand jury were heard Monday, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

Felony theft was charged in indictments against three different persons, embezzling, defrauding by hot check, breaking into jail to rescue a prisoner, and aggravated assault, were the eight bills of indictment issued.

The felony theft cases involved alleged theft of a radio, a car, and a typewriter; the embezzling case was against Joe W. Hale, former operator of the Red Bluff Service Station who is now under bond; the breaking into jail to rescue a prisoner indictment is against Gerard O. Durkin, who is currently in jail in lieu of bond on a charge of stealing an automobile; and the aggravated assault case is against a person who has not yet been apprehended. One of the felony theft suspects is in a San Antonio jail, according to Sheriff Cooksey, and the other felony theft suspect is an alien who has been deported.

## Heavy Rains Reported In This Vicinity

Up to two inches of rainfall was reported by some ranchmen in rains last weekend. The precipitation was scattered and widespread in amount of moisture received.

Motorists reported heavy rains between the Dryden airport and Lozier Canyon. North of Dryden heavy rainfall also was reported, as in the area north of Sanderson and in the central part of the county.

Some heavy rains were also reported west of Sanderson in the Longfellow area and north and west from there.

Some traffic was halted on the Fort Stockton highway by high water last weekend, also.

Locally, there were two showers Saturday, but only about 10-inch of rainfall was reported in many gauges, although there was a variation of the amount of rain reported locally.

## Stock Received For Boys Ranch

According to Stanley Frank, Roundup Publicity Chairman of the West Texas Boys Ranch, quite a bit of stock has already been received.

As of July 30, he reported that they had received donations of 132 sheep, 23 goats, 10 cattle, 1 horse and about \$655 in cash.

The work placement program of the ranch has been a success, according to Claude Collins of San Angelo, Board president of the ranch. He said that in the last five years, over 100 boys have been placed on "special summer jobs" and of this number 42 have become permanently employed as a result of their special job training.

Some of the boys have been in mechanics school, baking, butchering, etc., one boy received training in radio engineering and announcing.

The Ranch tries to line up jobs which are in keeping with the boy's own aptitude and ability. The success of the job placement and special training given the boys is due, the directors of the Ranch say, to the support of West Texans "who believe in being their brother's keeper."

It was pointed out that donations are appreciated any time during the year.

F. M. Wood is the Wagon Boss for this area and will assist in handling the Roundup donations.

The Roundup of stock is slated for August 28-29 in Terrell County, according to Wood.

Funeral rites for Dario Cardenas will be held Friday morning at St. James Catholic Church at 9:00 o'clock with Rev. N. Femenia officiating. Interment will be made in Santa Rita Cemetery with the Lawrence Janes Funeral Home of Ozona in charge of arrangements.

## New Course Offered In Homemaking For Next Year

"Home and Family Living", a course in homemaking for junior and senior high school students who have not had any previous homemaking courses, is being offered in the Sanderson High School curriculum for the first time this year, according to Mrs. J. D. McDaniel.

Study emphasis will include the following:

"Personal and family relationships, family living patterns, relationship problems of the beginning family, understanding self, personal development;

Preparation for family living, including laws relating to homes and families;

Establishing a home, including financial problems, housing in the community, selecting a home and its furnishings, housing problems in one's own home;

Budgeting time, energy, and money in the management of the home, including planning the day's work, timesaving work habits, personal banking, adjustment of finances to meet changes;

Consumer knowledge relating to the individual and the home;

Planning and preparation of meals to meet the nutritional needs of the family, including food selection, buying and storage.

Clothing the family, including color, design, construction, care and repair of clothing, grooming, and textiles;

Understanding children; guidance and care of children of various ages;

Job opportunities related to home economics.

All junior and senior students are urged to consider that their interests center on future responsibilities and activities of homemakers, therefore, they should consider this course as one that will be helpful in establishing homes of their own and help them in their present homes, Mrs. McDaniel stated.

## Redistricting Plan Would Group Border Counties

Several plans for redistricting of Texas into new legislative districts have been proposed by different groups in an effort to establish some bounds that possibly would meet with the approval of the legislative bodies.

One of the latest proposals is the regrouping of the 16th and 21st Congressional Districts of West Texas.

Under the plan outlined by officials from Midland and Odessa, would put Terrell County in the same district with El Paso, Culberson, Hudspeth Reeves, Pecos, Fort Davis, Brewster, Presidio, Val Verde, Kinney, and Maverick Counties.

This new district would include all the counties along the Rio Grande from El Paso to Eagle Pass and Reeves and Pecos Counties, which do not touch the River.

It is said that under this proposal El Paso County would have the majority votes.

## Breathing Aids Given Officers By Rotarians

A mouth-to-mask resuscitator and an emergency oxygen administration set has been given to the local sheriff's department officers by the Sanderson Rotary Club.

The mouth-to-mask resuscitator is a newer and easier system to use on victims of any age and protects the user from vomitus or infection from the victim.

The emergency oxygen equipment is portable and may be used in confined places. The oxygen supply lasts one hour and the small bottle may be refilled or replaced.

It is understood that the Rotary Club is considering the purchase of another emergency oxygen unit.

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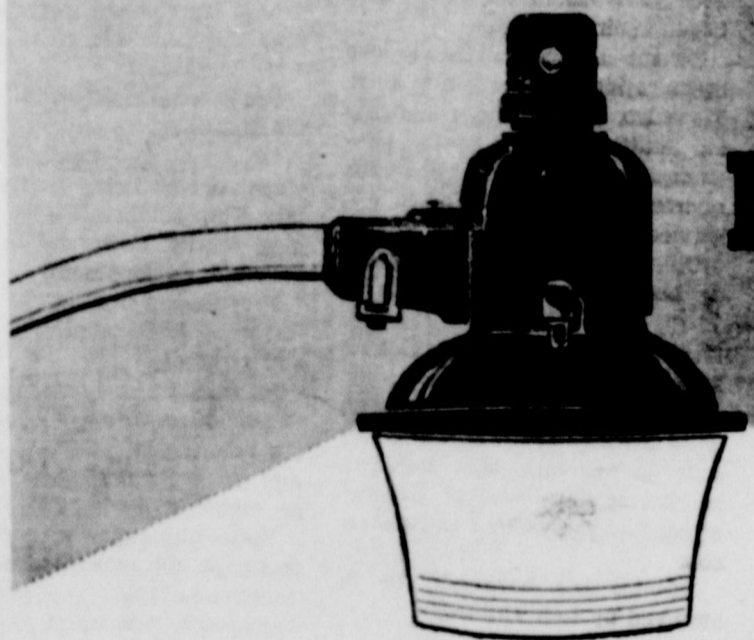

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:  
“(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district.”  
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
“FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts.”  
“AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts.”  
Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:  
“Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law.”

such a litter prevention drive, will get our cooperation.

And if we didn't have enough trouble on our hand already, we get reports from daily newspapers from different groups offering different ideas for redistricting the state, particularly this section.

Odessa and Midland, both well seated in conservative chairs, are trying to stay out of the same district as El Paso, which is predominately liberal. — And vice-versa.

Both Midland-Odessa and El Paso can pretty well control the selection of a representative if they are in separate districts, since they have an edge in population.

Terrell County, meanwhile, is in a precarious position — with only about 1,000 votes — of being thrown in with one of the two metropolises and thus being

almost forced to go along with the sort of representation that is chosen by one of those two elements, neither of which has anything common with our economy

The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.”

“AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.”

“The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.”
