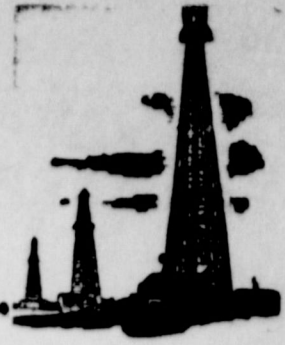

## A. T. Folsom, 89, First Co. Attny. Dies In California

Word was received by relatives last weekend of the death of A. T. Folsom, 89, in Gardena, Calif.

He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. John Clark.

Mr. Folsom was the first county attorney of Terrell County and was instrumental in the organization of the county, it is said. He also was a former owner of The Sanderson Times.

The surviving three daughters and a son were reared and given primary education in the Sanderson schools.

Mr. Folsom resided in the house which was formerly on the school block opposite the St. James Catholic Church. The house originally was an opera house, later a skating rink, and then a residence. Mr. Folsom purchased a prefabricated house from a mail order firm. The lumber was cut and numbered and shipped here for assembly. The house was built on the corner south of the Catholic Church and later moved to South Wilson St. and is behind the Robertson property on the corner of Oak and Wilson Sts.

## Rainfall Covers Most of County

Rainfall covered most of Terrell County Tuesday afternoon and night, according to word received from various parts of the county.

Some high water damage to railroad track ballast caused the delay of two freight trains and a passenger train Wednesday morning.

Report of 1-2-inch of rainfall came from the S. L. Stumberg ranch west of Sanderson and the river ranch, operated by N. W. Carroll, reported nearly an inch of rainfall.

North of Sanderson, over two inches of rainfall was reported with Dan Riggs reporting over 4 inches on his place north of Dryden, Vic Littleton near 4 inches Jack Riggs over 2 inches.

Dryden had 1.12-inches of rain. Water was reported to be over the highway bridge on Big Canyon on RM2400 and all canyon crossings on Texas 349 were reported bank full and stopping traffic.

Heavy rains were also reported south and southeast of Dryden, with heavy rains in the area west of Dryden again Wednesday morning.

The water fell in several different showers in some areas to give the total rainfall.

Only one-half an inch of rain fell locally.

A heavy electrical storm accompanied the rainfall and large and ominous thunderheads were visible until late in the night.

The tour of area ranches that was slated for Wednesday by the local Soil Conservation District was altered to include only the ranches where roads were passable.

Another shower fell right afternoon in Sanderson and what appeared to be heavier rains were falling to the northeast and to the south of Sanderson.

E. K. Parker to replace Beauchamp

E. K. Parker of Perryton, manager of the Panhandle properties for Community Public Service Company, has been named manager of the utility firm's West Texas division, effective October 1, according to the company's president, N. R. Parsons, of Fort Worth.

He succeeds Emmett W. Beauchamp, who will assume the new position of consultant until his retirement from CPS in May of 1965. Beauchamp will assist Parker in the numerous functions relating to direction of the division operations.

Parker has been with the company for 36 years serving in various capacities close to the management, including accountant and merchandise manager and division sales manager, until 1960 when he was promoted to Panhandle Division Manager.

Beauchamp, who will assume new duties as consultant on October 1 until he retires from the company in 1965, has served as West Texas Division Manager since 1936. He began his career with the company as lineman at Strawn in 1929 and later held the position of manager at Strawn Lone Oak, and Fort Stockton before going to Pecos. ## Fire Department Reports Expense Of 20 Months

Dudley Harrison, treasurer of the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department, has released a statement of figures for the 20 months showing the receipts and expenditures for the period beginning January 1, 1963.

Cash on hand on that date was \$656.66 and received from contributions since that time was \$11,084.40, making a total cash on hand of \$11,741.06.

Expenditures were as follows: Insurance, \$352.90; pump repairs, \$30.00; fire-fighting chemicals, \$140.18; painting fire house, \$68.17; telephone, \$330.93; CPS, \$30.20 letters for contributions, \$8.67; maintenance salary, \$215.00; batteries, \$52.98; fuel pump, \$19.40; generator repair, \$5.50; weed cutting and cleaning, \$36.00; gas oil, anti-freeze, \$34.70, making a total expenditure of \$1424.64, leaving a balance on hand on September 1, 1964, \$340.42.

It is called to the attention of readers that the funds in the treasury of the volunteer fire department are low and there will soon be the need of a drive for funds for the upkeep of the department.

State financial outlook is rosier than ever, but state agency spending plans are breaking all records, too.

Gov. Connally gave reporters a briefing on fiscal matters in a photo-slide illustrated press conference.

State agencies, he reported, are asking a whopping \$689,472,181 increase in spending for the 1965-67 fiscal period. He emphasized, however, they aren't likely to get it.

Connally pointed to possibility of a \$82,500,000 surplus at close of the 1964-65 period next August 31. He also estimated there will be \$623,800,000 available for appropriation by the Legislature next year. This is some \$153,409,000 more than the present level.

State agencies, however, have proposed spending of more than \$13,000,000 from the general fund or \$3,800,000,000 from all funds. Connally said he wanted to make "abundantly clear" that review of the requests did not represent his approval.

"The money is going to be a little harder going out than it was coming in. My own recommendations (to the legislature) will probably differ to a marked degree (from these figures)."

This is the way the requests break down: Judiciary — asking an increase of \$9662,808; hospitals and special schools, up \$51,600,000; departments and agencies, up \$229,100,000; public and higher education, up \$331,700,000; (not including a \$76,000,000 figure for pay raises being sought by school teachers.)

Parole Supervision Helps Fewer boys are being sent back to the State Training School due to better parole supervision, Youth Council Director James Turman reports.

Rate of return has dropped to 26 per cent, lowest in history, Turman told the Council. He calculated the dollar saving for the last year at \$217,000.

Buses Argue for Rate Boost National Bus Traffic Association, representing some 13 Texas bus lines told a State Railroad Commission examiner that oper-

ating costs justify a 10 per cent rate increase for most types of in-state service.

Rates requested would apply to passenger, charter, and express service.

Pollution Board Challenged

State attorneys claim district court has not jurisdiction over the Texas Water Pollution Control Board in an oil company's suit challenging the agency's authority to regulate disposal of oil field brines and waste.

Superior Oil Company sued the Board in District Court here claiming the Railroad Commission is the proper agency to regulate oil field brines and waste disposal. District Judge Herman Jones agreed to consider the suit questioning board jurisdiction.

The state moved for dismissal claiming such an action could be brought only with legislative permission.

Traffic Fatalities Increasing A steadily-increasing highway death rate is bringing demands for corrective action.

The death rate is up 14 per cent from last year. Total number of fatal accidents is up 17 per cent.

There have been 1,860 fatalities this year, compared with 1,631 in 1963.

Parks Program J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wild-

life Department, says improvements at Lake Whitney, Falcon and Dam B State Parks have reached the point where he foresees completion of the \$1,200,000 parks improvement program before next summer.

Parks people said the first days of the dove season proved a definite success as hunters "generally" obeyed the law, and most hunters apparently got their limits since birds were plentiful.

Mental Health Planning

A year from the date when Gov. Connally asked interested citizens to develop a moderate comprehensive program of mental health services for the state a 112-member committee was ready to review its steering committee's hefty volume of "a nearly-complete working draft" of a new Texas Plan.

Central theme of the 298-page document is that of treating mentally ill persons in or near their home communities, rather than sending them off to a mental hospital far from home and isolating them from society.

Psychopathic hospitals sti-

would be needed for many thousands of patients each year, but the community plan is designed to provide an emergency care formula for some patients who would not need to be institutionalized with early treatment, and for those discharged from mental hospitals who need a "half-way" house to help them back to normal living.

Committee's completed set of recommendations will go to Connally and to the 1965 legislature for implementation and legislative action.

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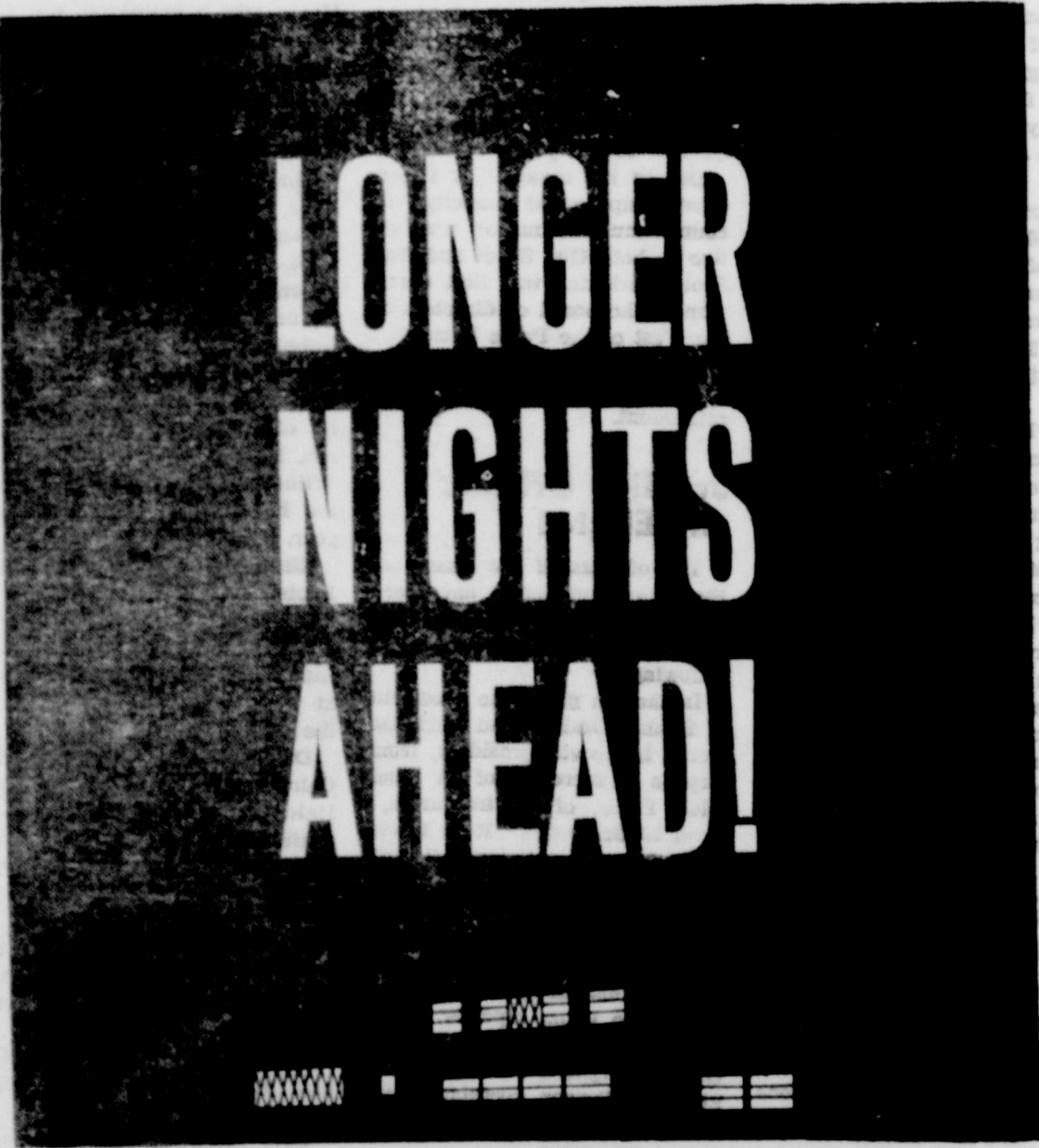

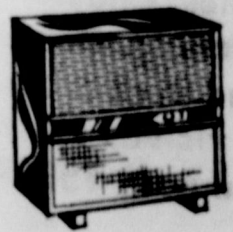
