Think seriously about this fact for a few minutes:

Isidro Veliz, 43, Killed By Car Monday Night

Isidro Rodriguez Veliz, 43, was killed Monday night about 11:30 when he was struck by a car on US 90 at Third St. The car was driven by George Gann, constable of Precinct 1.

The body was picked up by the Lawrence James Funeral Home of Ozona and funeral services were at the graveside at 4:00 p.m.

According to witnesses and the investigation by Texas Highway Patrolman Malcom Bolinger and Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg, Gann was traveling west on U.S. 90 and Veliz was crossing the highway south, just east of the Third Street intersection when he was struck by the car. The right front fender of the car struck Veliz, breaking the headlight.

The body was carried on the car across the Third Street intersection.

Gann stated that he did not see the man as he walked in front of the car, nor did he see him as he approached the path of the car. He said he was driving at a very slow rate of speed and when he saw what had happened he was so numbed by the realization that he had struck someone that he was unable to apply the brakes.

Gann called the doctor, the deputy sheriff, and J. A. Gilbreath, justice of peace.

The cause of the accident and the resulting death were ruled as accidental by the investigators.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Ticha Veliz; two sisters, Mrs. Francisco Hernandez and Miss Felipa Veliz; three brothers, Catarino, Fidel, and Anacleto, all Terrell County residents.

DPS Reports On County Accidents

The Department of Public Safety has released figures on accidents in the month of September of this year and on the figures of the year to date.

There was one fatal accident in Terrell County during September in which one fatality resulted, there was one accident in which personal injury was involved, and four accidents in which there was only property damage.

Total property damage during September for Terrell County accidents totaled \$5,400.00.

In the summation of the year's accidents, the report shows there have been two deaths, eight injured, and 31 total accidents for a loss of \$20,360.00.

"The trend upward in traffic accidents exists in our area, as well as throughout Texas, therefore, we are faced with the deadliest year in the history of Texas. Driver failure appears in most traffic accidents, to be the primary cause. Please accept your part of this responsibility and let's turn this trend back," pleaded Major Leo E. Gossett, commander of the Midland DPS Region.

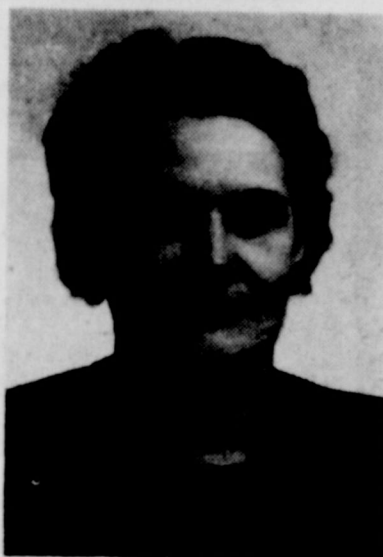
In the top three age groups, gold, silver, and bronze plaques were awarded to the first, second and third-place winners.

Eagles Lose To Sonora; Take On Iraan Friday

The Sanderson Eagles lost the football game here Friday night against the Sonora Broncos by a 20-12 score.

Injuries and fumbles played a large part in the loss since the Eagles were playing without David Hardgrave, a starting end or fullback, and John Cates, who was in the offense much of the time, with a knee injury that prevented his carrying the ball. Ricky Felts had a hand injury from the previous week's game.

The Eagles kicked off to Sonora to open the play and the

Broncos made three successive first downs to take the ball from their own 34 to the Eagle 32 where their offense bogged down and they lost the ball on downs in a 2-yard deficit try.

Sanderson took the ball from there to the 35 on Sonora's end of the field where they fumbled.

Sonora again began a march which four first downs later put the ball on Sanderson's 18-yard line. The Bucks tried a pass on the second down and it was intercepted by Tommy Weigand, Eagle safety, who ran all the way for the first TD of the game.

The try for the extra point was no good due to a fumble on the place-kick try.

The interception was the 1st play of the first period.

In the second quarter, Sonora put the ball in play on their own 47 and Sanderson was penalized to their 37 and Sonora received losses on each of the three successive plays, back to the Sanderson 44 from where they punted.

The set-back put the ball in play on the Eagle 20 and after a 5-yard penalty the Eagles got to the 21-yard line before they punted to the Sonora 49. Sanderson received another 15-yard penalty and Sonora again worked to the Eagle 28 where they were penalized and then lost the ball on downs. Sanderson benefitted from a 15-yard penalty to the 50 and started a drive which took them to the 28-yard line from where Weigand ran over for the second Eagle TD. The try for the point-after failed.

The first Sonora score came in the second period when Sonora, after receiving the kickoff threw a pass which went to the 11-yard line where three plays later, Ben Perez went over from the 6. The PAT try was no good and the half-time came with the Eagles leading 12-6.

In the third period, Sanderson received the opening kickoff and after a pass interception, Sonora marched goalward. They fumbled on the 12-yard line and Sanderson fumbled two plays later, giving Sonora a two-yard gain on the exchange of fumbles. It took two plays for Sonora to score and David Fields was the score for the Broncos from the 4-yard line. Bill Elliott ran the extra points over.

Sanderson was unable to go with the ball in the fourth frame and Sonora got the ball on Sanderson's 47 and went from there to score, using pass plays to eat up the ground. The final lunge was from the 4-yard line by Jerry Shurley. The try for the extra points failed.

Sonora used the short jump pass and the long bomb effectively against Sanderson Friday night, and their ground game was contained in the first half, but proved to have the needed punch for the second-half scores. Sanderson's offense was sparked with the thrilling runs of Tommy Weigand on slant plays and by Billy Garza on the power plays.

The Statue of Liberty play was used once effectively against the Broncos.

On Saturday the Eagles will go to Iraan to meet the Braves in another conference game.

Iraan has been proven as a worthy opponent for the Eagles judging from mutual foes and each team's effectiveness against a common team.

The Eagles coaches stated that if they can have full strength against the Braves, they expect to play them a good ball game Friday night.

The Eagles used some single-wing offensive plays last Friday against Sonora and worked mostly from a tight-T formation.

Parsonage At Church of Christ Being Changed

Repairs are underway at the parsonage for the local Church of Christ. The two-story garage has been moved toward the front of the lot and connected to the house at the southeast corner with the stairway inside.

The double garage will remain and there will be two bedrooms upstairs with the former kitchen to be used for a workshop and storage room.

Johnsongrass Head Sprouts From Seed

W. O. Ray, work unit supervisor for the Soil Conservation District, last week had a head of Johnsongrass which had sprouted from the seed in the head. The sprouting was due to recent rains and moisture both in the ground and in the air.

The sprouted head of Johnsongrass came from a planted field on a ranch in Terrell County and was spotted during a tour in the field to see the effects of recent rains on the Johnsongrass.

The moisture in the ground and in the air and the warm days that followed caused the unnatural sprouting of the seeds prematurely, they said.

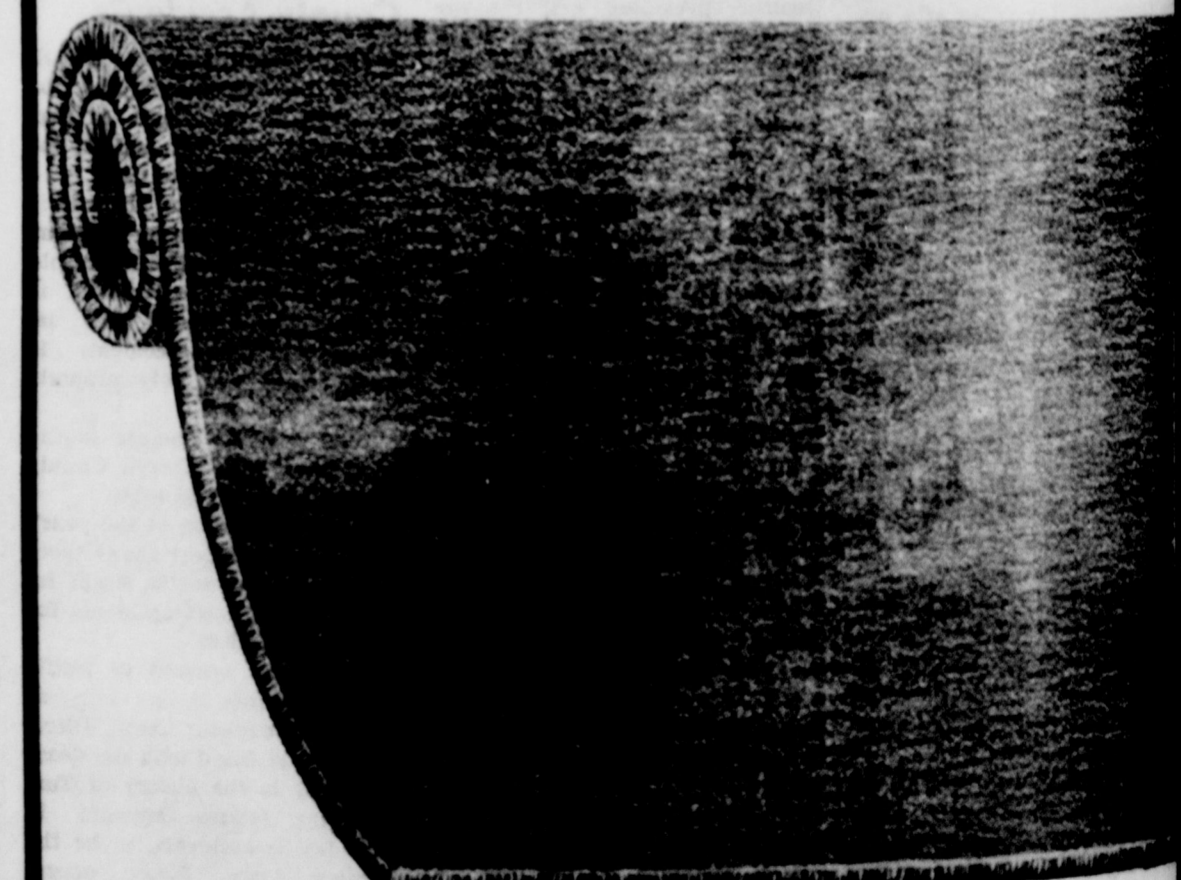

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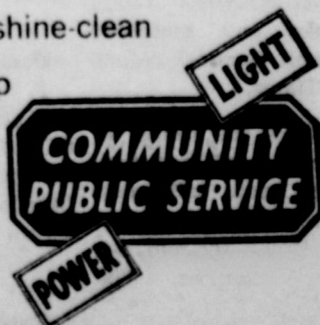
