The American Legion is in favor of economy in government" said Emerich, "but such economy at the expense of sick and disabled veterans, as well as cutting services for elderly widows and orphans of the nation's war dead is unthinkable. To me, this is totally inconsistent with the President's program of total war on poverty. In fact most of the veterans who use the McKinney hospital fit the test rule being applied by he President to determine those in poverty."

"As commander of the American Legion in Texas, I am lodging a most vigorous protest to the President, to the VA and to members of Congress," Emerich said.

At its state convention in San Antonio last year, the Legion adopted a resolution asking for additional beds in the McKinney Hospital due to the long waiting lists. More beds are needed, not less. These patients cannot be transferred to the Dallas VA Hospital, for they are already extremely overcrowded with a long waiting list. Closing of McKinney will cost the north Texas area 312 sorely needed beds, and will further tax the facilities at Dallas.

The American Legion fails to see how money can be saved in consolidating the San Antonio VA office with Houston and the Lubbock office with Waco, Emerich added. "Does the VA realize how far it is from Amarillo or El Paso to Waco? The extra cost to the government in travel and per diem would offset any savings

realized by putting employees out of work.

The closing of these facilities will eliminate jobs for about 600 trained people. These will be thrown into the labor market, thus increasing unemployment. According to the commander. it is imperative that all members of the Legion, its Auxiliary, as well as all veterans and their dependents, lodge strong protests

Among these realities to which so many citizens shut their minus, she declared, are innocent children born with open spines, swollen skulls, missing limbs, facial disfigurements, and perhaps worst of all, sound bodies harboring retarded minds.

The results of widespread failure to recognize that these conditions are real and that something can be done about them are twofold, asserted Mrs. Ezelle. The public does not provide the necessary support to bring the full resources of medicine into the fight against birth defects.

It was pointed out that since the entrance of the March of Dimes into the largely neglected field of birth defects in 1958, significant forward strides have been taken in both research and treatment

She cited the financing by the March of Dimes of 50 treatment centers where birth defect children can, in one medical institution, receive the attention of up to a dozen specialists, trained to detect and treat the multiple problems common to birth defects

Betting Bill Shown

The battle over whether Texans are going to bet on horse racing has begun again. This time Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville is introducing the race track bill. Last session Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry of San Antonio couldn't get it through the Legislature.

Pipkin's bill would allow both thoroughbred and Quarter Horse racing on licensed tracks. Also, the city, county, and state could collect taxes from the track operators. Before a track could be licensed in a county, voters in that county would have to call and approve a referendum.

The bill is backed by Texas Racing Association, which has raised more than \$150,000 from some of the most prominent men

in Texas ranching and business. Opposing the association will be a group of businessmen being organized by the Texas Council of Churches and the Texas Baptist General Convention.

Pipkin said the state would get \$20,000,000 a year from a sliding tax of from four to six per cent on all bets and that the state would get millions more from increased tourism. One of the first men to speak in opposition, Rep. J. C. Whitfield of Houston, said, The plain facts are that legalized racing and gambling not only damage the moral fabric of our people, but that the revenues they bring in are more than offset by losses in other more le gitimate fields of commerce."

Liquor Bill Introduced A Texas Restaurant Association bill which would make legal the selling of two-ounce bottles of liquor in licensed restaurants has been introduced.

The bill would permit customers to fix their own drinks from the small bottles of liquor. This would go part of the way for those who like to buy their liquor by the drink. Church groups and others will oppose it.

Redistricting Plans Seen

A committee of the Texas Legislative Council, which is made up of representatives from both houses of the legislature, has prepared two plans for congressional redistricting.

According to a Houston federal court order, the Legislature must redraw the present 23 districts so their populations will vary no more than five per cent from the mathematical average of 416,508 and they must do the job by August 1.



These events highlighted the Legislature's opening week.


Rep. Ben Barnes of DeLeon was elected Speaker of the House by acclamation. He is the youngest speaker named since reconstruction days.
