LISTEN TO LUKE

The local school board race is generating interest. There are — this writing — five candidates announced for the race to fill two seats.

The talk of the necessity of getting the schools back into the education business is going on all over the state from what we are able to read and hear.

We have heard of at least two school administrators who are trying to find a school where education and not athletics is the main concern of the school and receives the backing of the school parents to a greater degree than does the athletic program.

We would not accept any statement that we are against sports. We love sports. But we don't think that the schools are maintained to expose athletes to some knowledge of academics.

And we like to see a school that has athletics — but to supplement the education and activities of the school.

We have been proud for a long time of our athletes from Sanderson. We like the track team that competed in Fort Stockton Saturday — went over there against the best, ran their races, won some awards, brought credit to themselves to their school, and to their town, and came home to go back to school, back to practice and back to try to win again.

The same kind of spirit should have prevailed last week during the 6-weeks exams. Each student should have seen the job to be done, did his best, and went back to work to try to do better next year.

There should be no disgrace in defeat by a stronger team, a faster or fresher runner, or a higher jumper unless the loser disgraces himself by disgraceful actions.

Track fans seldom cry "foul" at the start, or the judge, or one of the runners, or competitors, when their favorite competitor loses, and that's why we particularly like track.

The horse-racing enthusiasts are being used by the pari-mutual enthusiasts to get legalized gambling in Texas.

If horse racers want to race horses, that's one thing. If bettors want to bet on horse racing, that's something else.

One of the cries now being promoted by the pari-mutual people is that "two and a half million dollars was put into the economy of the El Paso area by the park at Sunland." They didn't say how much was taken out!

But wouldn't it make sense that if that figure is true, and we are not doubting it, that much more than that had to be spent at Sunland before that much could be put back into the economy?

Sanderson Gets 32 Points In Comanche Relays

The Sanderson High School track team garnered 32 points to tie with Coahoma for fifth place in the Division 2 portion of the Comanche relays last Saturday in Fort Stockton.

The Sanderson team was the second smallest school represented at the meet, higher only than Dalou and was competing with some class AA teams.

Coach Jim Spann stated that he was proud of the effort shown by the boys at the meet and felt they made a good showing of themselves in the competitive they had. Spann stated that he believed that Tommy Weigand was the best man in the low hurdles event, but that he ran out of steam from participation in the other events. He said that a win by Weigand in this event would have given Sanderson a first place and he would have been high-point man of the meet. The Eagles went to the meet with only a week's workout, he said.

Weigand placed second in the pole vault and ran the anchor position in the 440-yard relay in which Sanderson placed fifth. His relay-mates were Roman Gonzalez, David Hardgrave, John Cates.

Weigand also placed second in the 100-yard dash.

Cates placed second in the 440-yard dash and Hardgrave was 4th in the same event.

School Census Shows 78 Gain

There was a gain of 78 students in the figures of the school census this year compared with the figures last year.

Mrs. J. A. Gilbreath, census enumerator, turned in a total of 658 scholastics between the ages of six and 18 as of September 1, 1965.

Of the total figure, 49 children now living in Terrell County will be eligible to start to school this fall, 26 girls and 23 boys.

According to the census figures, there are eight more girls than boys on the census rolls.
