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Committee Named To Appraise All County Property

The county commissioners, at their regular meeting Monday, named a committee to appraise all property in the county in an effort to equalize valuations for the county's tax rolls.

Besides the commissioners, F. M. Weigand, Roy Deaton, Sid Arkins, and C. M. Turk, tax assessor Bill C. Cooksey, others named to the committee include the Terrell County Independent School District's board of equalization, Dudley Harrison, Lee Dudley, and C. I. White; also Edward Kerr, Troy Druse, Clyde Griffith, James Caroline, Pres Escamilla.

The committee was named after certain inequities were noted on the tax rolls of the county and the commissioners stated that every effort would be made to do a fair job in equalizing the values of all county property.

Payments Made On 1964 Wool Under Incentive

Incentive payments totaling \$81,731.21 were made to Terrell County producers the first part of April under the National Wool Act. These payments were made in one check to each producer and covered both shorn wool and unshorn lambs.

In addition, \$9,003.02 for shorn wool and \$1,197.62 for unshorn lambs were deducted as the annual contribution to the self-help program for the advertisement and research on wool and lambs. The amount of the promotion deduction is determined by figuring one cent per pound for shorn wool and five cents per hundredweight of unshorn lambs sold. This program is carried out by the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc.

Shorn wool payments for 1964 marketing year amounted to 165 per cent of each producer's net proceeds for the marketing year. This amount brings the national average shorn wool price received by growers of 53.2 cents per pound up to the previously announced support level of 62 cents per pound. This compares to the 27.8 per cent payment made for the 1963 marketing year.

This year's lamb rate is 55 cents per cwt., as compared to 54 cents paid last year. This payment on sales of live lambs that have never been shorn is designed to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing.

No payments will be made on mohair sold during 1964, because the average price of 94.3 cents per pound received by growers is well above the incentive level of 72 cents per pound.

Nearly Half-Million Pounds Of Wool Sold Here Tuesday

Buyers took nearly a half-million pounds of wool here Tuesday at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. John T. Williams, manager of the firm, stated that none of the wool offered was refused.

Prices on the 12-months wool ranged from 42 1/4 to 57 5/8ths cents per pound. Most of the 12-months wool brought 50 to 55 cents per pound.

Eight-months wool sold from 45 1/8th cents to 54 3/4th cents per pound with the bulk of the months wool brought 50 to 55 cents per pound.

Of the total wool offered and sold, 340,363 pounds were 12-month fleeces and 112,600 pounds were 8-month fleeces.

Prouvost-Lefebvre Co. of Boston was the top buyer with 164,440 pounds of 12-months wool and 35,331 pounds of 8-months wool.

Second high buyer was J. P. Stevens Co. of New York who purchased 16,239 pounds of 12-months wool and 31,740 pounds of the 8-month wool.

The prices paid for the wool in Sanderson were said to be slightly above prices paid on the bulk of wool sold in the last month in New Mexico. Prices are approximately 12 to 15 cents a pound lower, grease basis, than prices paid in the area last year.

Fleece weights were said to be heavier than a year ago and of good quality.

Wreckage Cleared After Derailment Last Thursday

Wreckage has been cleared at the site of the derailment of 31 cars of an east-bound freight train here about 7:30 a.m. Thursday of last week. The derailment was the result of a "hot box" that caused a wheel to come off of one of the cars.

None of the train crew was injured in the derailment, according to reports, but two transients riding the freight train were injured and hospitalized in Alpine.

Construction crews worked all day building a "shoo-fly" track around the wreckage, and it was completed about 5:30 p.m. and train service was resumed immediately upon completion of the detour track.

The derailment occurred about 15 miles west of Sanderson.

Work of clearing up the wreckage continued until the middle of this week.

Guards were stationed around the wreckage to prevent looting and injuries that might occur due to the movement of heavy equipment, and also because of the nature of cargo of some of the derailed cars.

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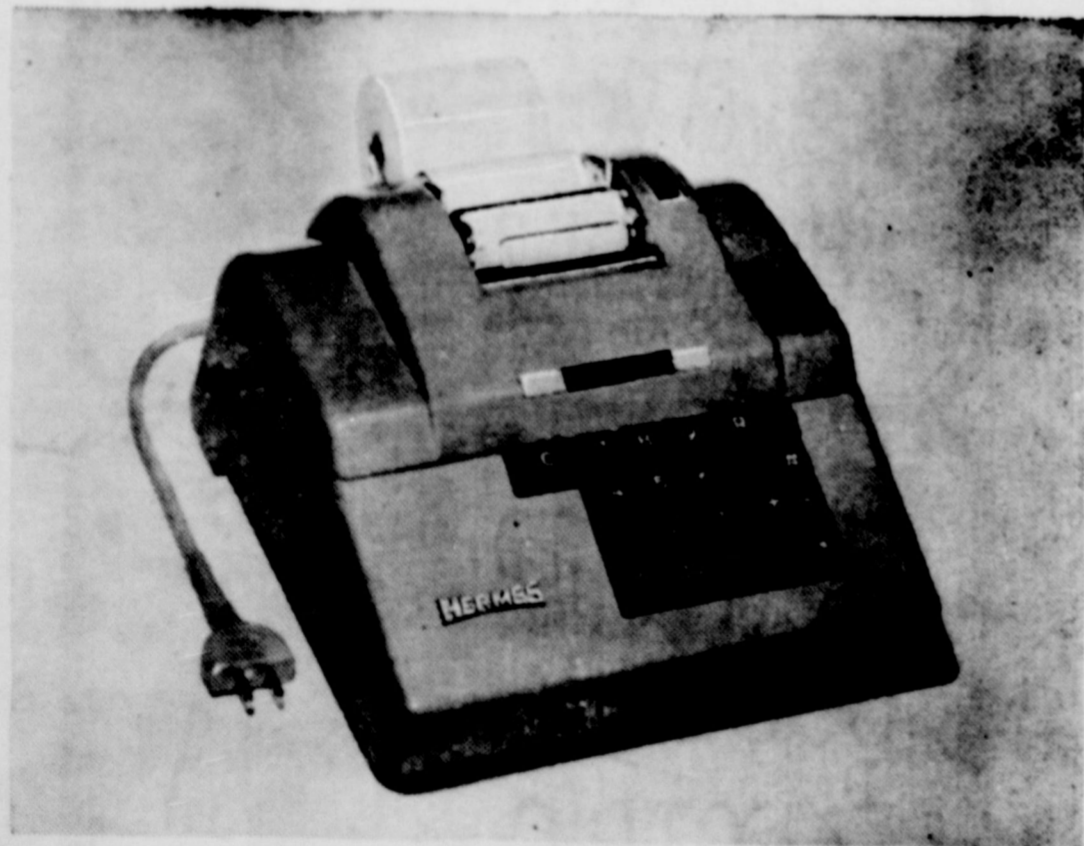
