Phone Test Plan Being Tried At Alpine Hospital

Brewster County Memorial Hospital in Alpine has been selected by American Telephone and Telegraph Company, parent organization of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, for the first product trial in the nation of a new telephone system designed especially for small hos-

Announcement of the trial was made by Dan Ratcliff. Odessa. sales and service manager in this area for the telephone company Ratcliff said arrangements for the test were worked out some time ago between telephone company officials and the board of directors of the county-owned hospital. Ratcliff also said there were no extra phone charges involved for the hospital. They'll pay the normal telephone bill and that's all, even though the equipment which will be in use for the three-month trial period is the newest and most modern available.

"We appreciate the fact that the directors and the administrators of the hospital were willing to cooperate with us to see if a system like this is the type of telephone communications a small hospital needs". Ratliff said the system is similar to telephone systems now being used in hotels and motels in that it permits patients to make local and long distance calls without going though the hospital's switchboard. Ratcliff emphasized that no patients would be allowed to receive any calls over the system without permission of their doctors. The system also provides for two-way communication between the nurse on duty and the patient and permits patients to make calls to other hospital rooms by connection through the hospital's switchboard. The telephone located next to the patient's bed is unlike any telephone you may have seen. It is called a Trimline Phone and has a dial located in the middle of the handset rather than in the base of the telephone. The patient can also talk to the nurse without using the telephone handset by means of a "handsfree" Speakerphone which is a part of the unit. The unit contains buttons to signal the nurse's station, or obtain an "outside line" for local or long distance telephone calls. The patient may also signal the nurse and talk to her over his "hands-free" Speakerphone by pressing a button on an extension cord at his bedside The switchboard or "console" which is the heart of the system is located at a nurse's station, I: has no cords or plugs like an ordinary switchboard, the entire operation is by pushbuttons. The nurse or switchboard operator pushes buttons to answer calls,




