Mass Clean-Up Ends Tuesday This Week

Clean-up help for Sanderson's after-flood rehabilitation effort continues to be a shot in the arm not only to the program but to the morale of local citizens.

Advisory Group Named By ARC

Appointment of an advisory committee that will assist the local American Red Cross disaster relief team as it helps with the recovery of flood-stricken Sanderson families was announced this week by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, disaster chairman of the Terrell County Red Cross Chapter.

Odessa was here Sunday to complete work in the restoration of the Little League baseball diamond on the Legion ground east of town; a spraying crew and vehicle from Del Rio was in Sanderson early Tuesday morning to begin fogging the town with chemicals to help rid the area of flies and mosquitoes. The entire job was at no cost to the people here.

State, National Agencies Offer Help Locally

State and federal agencies' representatives were in Sanderson Tuesday morning to offer the services of their agencies to the county officials in rehabilitation following Sanderson's having been declared a disaster area by President Lyndon B. Johnson recently.

Col. Jesse Ward, of the office of Texas Civil Defense and Disaster Relief gave a discussion of the possibilities available through the agency he represents. His remarks were augmented by Alex Hart, the Office of Emergency Planning, Washington, D.C., and W. C. Ilgenfritz, O.E.P., Region 5, of Denton.

Hearing And Public Meeting Called For July 12

A hearing before the commissioners' court of Terrell County of members of the Soil Conservation Service, and a public meeting that night has been called by the commissioner.

The purpose of both meetings is to obtain information concerning SCS proposals for construction of water flood control dams and to get the feeling of the people in the matter.

When the thought of water control dams was initiated about two years ago, it was brought out that one of the essential initial steps was a field review of the watershed done immediately at the expense of the county, or at no expense to the county by waiting a turn in the normal operational procedure.

The purpose of the review is, basically, to determine past and possible future damage from flooding; also the economic feasibility of building structures in the watershed for flood prevention.

Two More Bodies Found Brings Total Now To 22

The bodies of two more of Sanderson's flood victims have been recovered from the Rio Grande near Langtry since last week's paper, bringing the total now to 22 bodies recovered.

On Wednesday the body of Mrs. Martha Calzada Lopez, 33, was found in a vega in the Rio Grande a few miles above Langtry. The discovery was made by a ranch worker Wednesday afternoon and Mexican authorities were notified and the information relayed to Val Verde County Sheriff Herman Richter and Terrell County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

SCS Reports On Flood Rainfall

What constitutes the watershed that contributed to the Sanderson flood and what are the statistics?

This question may be on the minds of a great many people.

Sanderson Canyon watershed covers approximately 211 square miles or just over 135,000 acres. It extends some 30 miles west and eight miles north, as the crow flies, from the town of Sanderson. The average width of the watershed is approximately five miles.

Rainfall occurred over the entire watershed with the heaviest amounts falling on Rattlesnake and Three-Mile subwatersheds. On the Rattlesnake Draw area, located on and near the C. F. Cox ranch west of Sanderson, from three to four and one-half inches of rain fell the night of June 10, lasting intermittently until 3:00 a. m., June 11. On the Three-Mile Draw area, located north of Sanderson, from three to five and one-half inches of rain fell during the night of June 10 and morning of June 11.

The peak of this floodwater reached Sanderson just after 7:00 a. m. June 11 and had receded substantially by 9:30 a. m. The Corps of Engineers, U.S. Army, estimated that the watershed yielded a maximum of 101,200 cubic feet of water per second. This amount, converted to gallon per minutes, would be about 45,540,000.

From the high water mark behind the Spears-Duncan Drug and the Sanderson State Bank perpendicular to Sanderson Canyon, the water rose to an elevation of 15.77 feet above the bottom of the canyon.

A majority of the draws in the Trans-Pecos area have a very steep slope. This was of great consequence to the severe damage done to property. The true speed at which this water swept through the area has not been determined. The actual tearing destructive force of water is very much affected by the slope of the land.

It should be pointed out that the large amount of rainfall three to five and one-half inches, did not fall over the entire watershed, although the total area did receive some moisture. If this amount had fallen on every acre, and had it been timed just right, the amount of flood water reaching Sanderson could have been much greater.

It was the 22nd body to be recovered after the flood of June 11. Funeral services were held Tuesday from El Buen Pastor Methodist Church of which he was a charter member.

Rev. J. C. Soltero of Odessa was assisted by the local minister, Rev. Moises Yanez in conducting the services.

The body had been found two days previously, but due to a misunderstanding of the location, it was not recovered immediately.

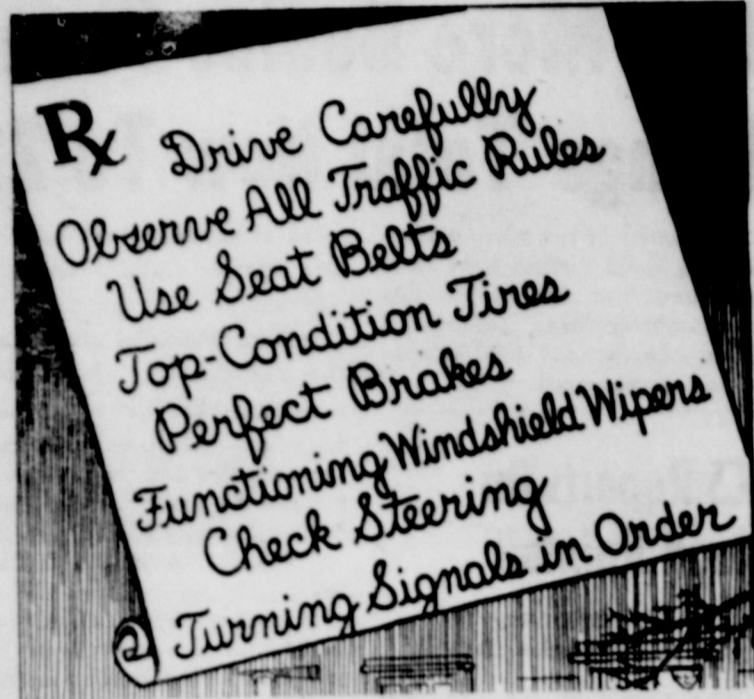

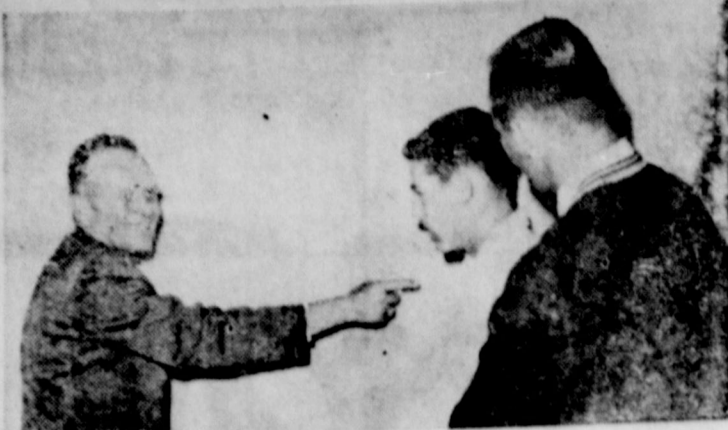

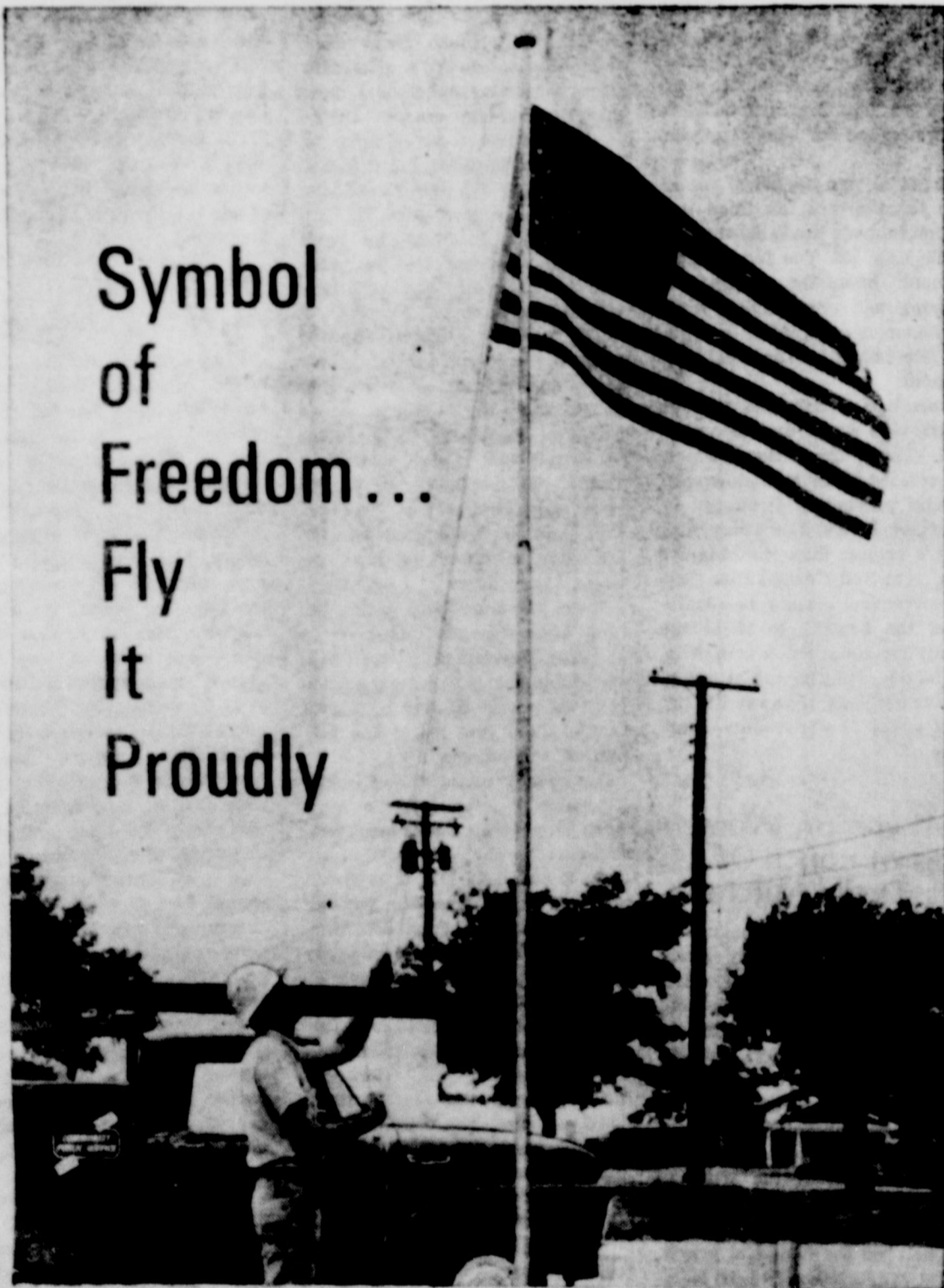

completed project as he proposed.

It was stated that it would take several years to complete such a project since it would take action by Congress to determine the need for such a project, allocation of funds to determine the need, do the survey, engineering, and other work necessary to begin the project, and then another act by Congress to authorize the completion of the project and allocation of necessary funds.

He cited one case that was initiated in 1958 and was just now receiving final Congressional action for completion of the project.

If such a program is undertaken, it will be the responsibility of the local government to provide the land necessary for the project, hold the federal government free of damages resulting from any phase of the project, to maintain and operate the project after completion, and to alter the location of all utilities involved except the railroad.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44** proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

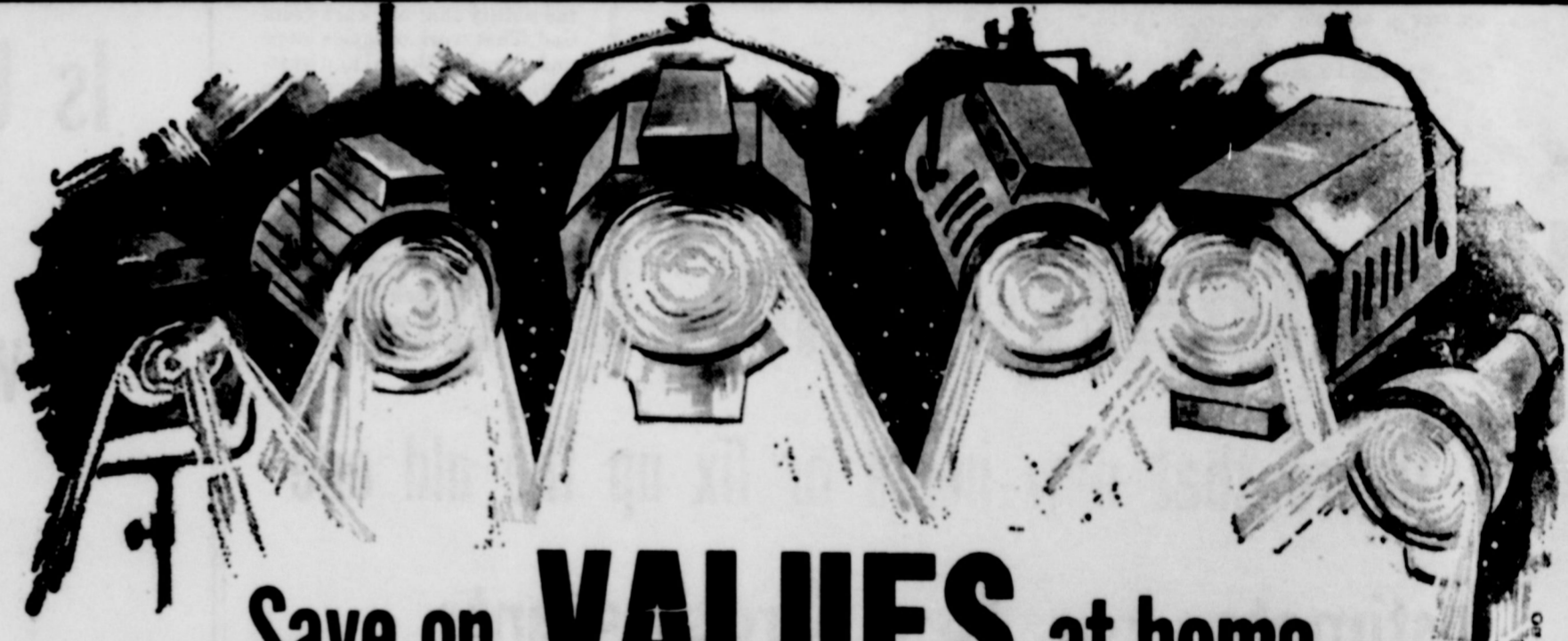
come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
