We don't wish anyone any hard luck, but it would be our guess that if every community that suffered flood damage got things done — with neighborly help and self-help — the way Sanderson got things done, the Office of Emergency Planning would go out of business tomorrow.

If God gives up the time to do so, we plan to be talking for the next forty years in praise of the work done by local people and with humble thankfulness for the help given to this community out of a spirit of friendship by our many neighbors.

If anything is ever done for anyone that is not done in compassion and humility, it is done for praise of the doer rather than for the good of the beneficiary.

Our government continues to send more and more soldiers to Viet Nam, more U.S. planes from U.S. carriers are making more and more bomb runs into North Viet Nam, the threat of calling up reserves now has been made. Congress is working on passage of a bill to help veterans in a way similar to the G.I. Bill, but they are called "cold war veterans".

Everybody refuses to call our Viet Nam action a war, instead of those who are being shot at.

We heard a new one the other day about the anti-poverty program: Those who are recipients don't like the idea of having their life-long habits reversed. They are accustomed to eating in the house and having their toilets out in the back yard. The change would put their toilets inside and promote outdoor eating.

Property Values Are Raised For More School Money

The Board of Equalization of the Terrell County Independent School District has set the factor used for determining taxes for the coming school year at 1.75 times the county valuation. The act was at the request of the Board of trustees of the school district.

The Board of Equalization met recently to hear taxpayers who wished to appear before the board to voice opinions regarding valuations.

It was pointed out that the taxes were not to be increased in proportion to the valuations this year because the tax rate had been lowered. The increase in valuations was necessary because the tax rate was at the maximum and the necessity for increased revenue for the operation of the county's schools was not possible without a raise in valuations. The actual tax increase, it was pointed out, was very slight.

The school board pointed out

that the need for increased revenue was not due to any frills that were being incorporated into the operation of the school, but to take care of increased costs of school operation due to higher prices of all commodities.

The system of financing the school's operations — local taxes, minimum foundation fund, Gilmer-Aikin money, etc. — are all closely associated and a complicated system of financing.

The budget of the school is open for the inspection of any individual or group and questions regarding budget or expenses should be directed to school officials or school board members.

Prior to the meeting of the Board of Equalization recently, a letter was mailed to each property owner of Terrell County telling them of the plans to increase the valuations and giving them the date of the meeting of the board of equalization.

C. E. Litton Jr. Dies Thursday In Alpine Hospital

Clarence Eugene Litton, 48, died suddenly in an Alpine hospital Thursday afternoon after being hospitalized there for almost three weeks for the treatment of a cardiac condition.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church, of which he was a member, Saturday afternoon with Rev. Neal Hufford, pastor of the Fort Davis Methodist Church, officiating, assisted by Rev. M. H. Stroup, pastor. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery with the Geaslin Funeral Home of Alpine in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers were D. L. Sullivan, W. J. Murrah, Weldon Cox, W. W. Sudduth, Irvin Robbins, A. C. Garner, W. E. Stavley of Del Rio, J. C. Roark of Alpine. Honorary pallbearers included Tol Murrah, W. F. Born in Norma, Tenn., Mr. Litton came to Sanderson when about a year old with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Litton. At the time of his death he was a conductor for the Southern Pacific Railroad, having been in the employ of the company for the past 25 years. He was a veteran of World War II and a past commander of the Clarence Halley Mulkey Post of the American Legion.

He was also a member of the Sanderson Lions Club, a past director of the Little League, assistant Boy Scoutmaster, and a legislative representative of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

On July 4, 1945, Mr. Litton was married to Miss Ginette Bondivena in St. Claude, France, and after his discharge from the U. S. Army, his war-bridged joined him in Sanderson about six months later. They are the parents of one son, Steven.

He is also survived by two brothers, Curtis Litton of El Paso and Kenneth Litton of Birmingham, Ala.; three sisters, Mrs. H. W. Halsell and Mrs. P. H. Snoddy of El Paso and Mrs. Lee Black of Los Angeles, Calif.

Commissioners To Meet With Neighboring Courts

Terrell County Commissioners have set up meetings for Thursday of this week with the Commissioners Courts of Pecos and Brewster Counties. The meetings are relevant to the proposed watershed control system on Sanderson Canyon.

Ed Thomas of the district office of the Soil Conservation Service, W. O. Ray, of the Sanderson Soil Conservation District, and County Judge R. S. Wilkinson plan to accompany the commissioners to the meeting with the Pecos County Commissioners in Fort Stockton at 8:30 a.m. Thursday and at 1:00 p.m. in Alpine.

The purpose of the meetings is to seek cooperation of the commissioners courts of those counties as co-sponsors of the application for a watershed control project since much of the land of the Sanderson Canyon watershed lies in those counties.

Since it is planned to construct dams on tributary canyons of the watershed in those counties, it is necessary that those counties cooperate in the securing of easements and maintaining the construction after their completion.

The written application for the watershed control project has been completed with the exception of obtaining the cooperation of the neighboring commissioners' courts.

Judge Wilkinson stated that if the cooperation of the commissioners' courts of Pecos and Brewster Counties was obtained, the application would be filed immediately.

Youth Choir To Sing Tonight (Thursday) At Baptist Church

Times Receives Report From Dept. of Interior

The Times last week received a detailed report from the U.S. Department of Interior, Geological Survey, Water Resources Division, giving their findings following their survey after the flood on June 11. The reports are separate for Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile Draw and give detailed information about the various circumstances which caused and added to the flooding conditions at that time.

Their figures bear out the estimate of near 100,000 cubic feet of water per second being carried by the draw at the peak of the flow.

The report, sent to The Times by Trigg Twichell, district chief of the Water Resources Division, with offices in Austin, has been turned over to the Soil Conservation Service for including in the data to accompany the application for the watershed flood control project.

R. U. Grozier, engineer-in-charge of the Geological Survey West Texas subdistrict office at San Angelo, worked with the Corps of Engineers to determine the peak rates of flow of the two draws.

Survivors May Be Eligible For Payments Of Social Security

Almost 25 per cent of all monthly social security checks now go to survivors of deceased workers, according to H. P. Thomas, social security district manager in Odessa.

Thomas said that 9 out of 10 of the nation's mothers and their children can count on survivors' benefits to help keep the family together if the breadwinner dies. He indicated that this fact is often overlooked, because many people think of social security in terms of retirement only. It is important, therefore, that survivors check with the social security office about possible benefits whenever a person dies.

Figures released by the Social Security Administration show that, in 1964, four and one-half million survivors of deceased workers received monthly benefits. The average benefit paid to widowed mothers with two children amounted to about \$193 a month.

tion by the proper authorities, that every effort will be made to expedite the application, that it will be approved, and that work will begin as soon as possible.

While we do not advocate lessening our appeals for urgency in this project's completion, we believe that it is vital that we use some discretion in realizing that there is a speed which cannot be accelerated in the planning and engineering and as far as that's concerned, even in the construction.

We were all told that there was the necessity of a minimum time in our expectations of completion that we could expect.

This idea and others that were given by Mr. Thomas at the public meeting, blew the lid off the accusations made by some concerning the presentation of the proposal two years ago.

We have heard very little talk about the raise in property valuations in the county. We hope this indicates approval of the action of the Board of Equalization and the Board of Trustees of the school district.

When you sit down with a member of the board and hear the explanation of the need for higher valuations and thus more revenue, it is not difficult to appreciate their position.

The men on the school board have the responsibility of operating an extremely large business. The school, like any other business, has certain expenses that cannot be trimmed. There are
