County Produces \$4.4 Million In Gas

Terrell County's producers and royalty owners are marketing some \$4.4 million in natural gas a year — 1963 production amounted to 35.4 billion cubic feet — according to statistics released by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association this week.

The county ranks 129th among Texas oil and gas producing counties.

Ranchers and other mineral owners share in a \$534,000 distribution of oil and gas royalty payments annually.

The Association based its annual study of this county's oil and gas output on statistics compiled by the U.S. Bureau of Mines for 1963. Production data for 1964 would be approximately the same.

Statewide oil and gas wells produced an estimated \$3.6 billion in income.

Data from the Texas Employment Commission indicates direct employment in oil and gas industry jobs for more than 55 Terrell County citizens with a payroll of approximately \$271,000 a year.

An important indicator of activity is the amount expended on drilling of wildcat wells, seeking new fields and those wells drilled to develop fields already located. The Association estimates that in 1964 approximately \$470,000 was risked by Texas oil and gas producers on drilling ventures in Terrell County.

A tabulation by the Oil and Gas Journal shows 2 wells were drilled in the county in 1964, both dry holes. A total of 35,000 feet of hole were drilled — 14,000 for development wells and 21,000 for wildcats.

In addition to local school and county property taxes by oil and gas operators, taxes on production from Terrell County flowed into the State Treasury at the rate of about \$31,000 a year.

Contract Awarded For Local Street Topping

The Terrell County Commissioners Court Monday approved a contract to Wood Construction Co., Kermit, for the seal-coating or topping of all local streets.

Work is expected to begin immediately.

The low bid was \$14,708.00 and there were five bidders, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson. The highest bid was for \$16,850.00.

Work has been underway in the preparation of local streets for the contractor to begin as soon as the supplies are received.

Downie Street, which parallels the railroad, will be reworked completely since it was destroyed by the flood June 11. The area in front of the postoffice will be wider than the balance of the street to permit more parking space on the south side.

There is also the possibility of the widening of all the streets by seal-coating from gutter to gutter.

The Sanderson Eagles lost in a scrimmage against the Monahans "B" team Tuesday night in that city. Monahans is a Class AAA school.

Hunting Dates Are Announced

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission this week announced the following hunting dates for the Trans-Pecos District, comprising Terrell, Brewster, Jeff Davis, Presidio, Culberson, Reeves Pecos Counties.

Pronghorn antelope — open season October 2 through 10 by permit only. Bag limit, one antelope per season.

Deer — open season last Saturday of November through December 12. Bag limit, two buck deer in aggregate per season of which not more than one shall be a mule deer. In areas to be designated by the Parks and Wildlife Department, three deer in the aggregate; only two of the deer can be mule deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by permit only.

Javelina — open season Nov. 1 through Dec. 31, Bag limit, two javelina per season.

Bear — no closed season.

Quail — open season, 2nd Saturday of November for 60 consecutive days. Bag limit 12 per day, possession limit 24 quail.

Mourning Dove — open season September 1 through October 31. Bag limit 10 per day, possession limit 20 except the first day.

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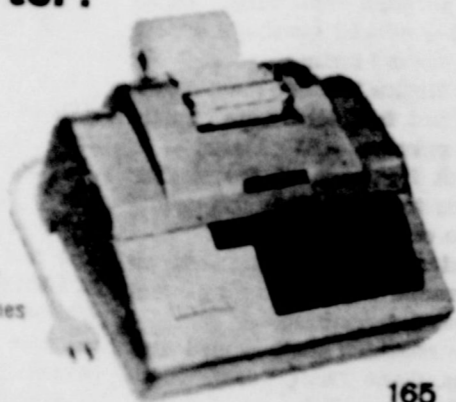
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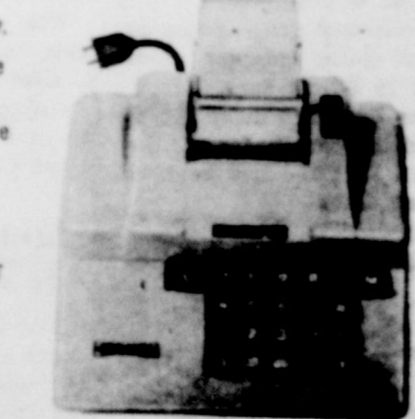
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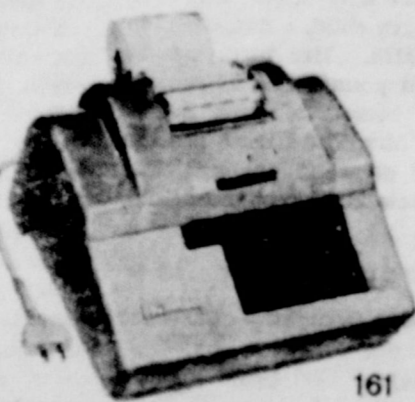

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Up until fairly recently, the taxing objective of the American government was to secure revenue. But now there has been grafted onto the taxing system the principle of using taxes to regulate the economy.

Recent experience shows that when government seeks to adjust economic conditions by tax policies, there is a constant conflict between economic and political expediency. In the end, so far, political expediency has won.



According to the information being gathered all this year by a special field survey conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business, the 1964 income tax cut has not been considered very helpful by the nation's independent businessmen.

The independent business, as a matter of equity, voted through the Federation in favor of the removal of excise taxes, but there is still a great question how helpful this move will be.

Now there is a great deal of static being set up in Foggy Bottom about a tax measure that would relieve those considered in poverty income levels from paying any tax.

On the other hand, there seems little official concern over the fact that it does cost a family more than \$600 per year to raise a child. Rep. Walter Rogers of Texas realizes this fact and has introduced a bill to...

the personal exemption to 1960. In a nationwide vote on this bill conducted by the Federation, 83% of the independent businessmen favor such a means as common sense, practical tax relief.

In addition, for several years, men such as Senator John Sparkman of Alabama, Rep. Charles Chamberlain of Michigan, Rep. Abraham Multer of New York have sought to get passed the so-called "plow-back" allowance.

Briefly, this would permit any business to plow back into the business tax free up to 30% of a year's profit, to a maximum of \$30,000 to expand.

Now it is recognized that a main cause of poverty is a sufficient lack of jobs, and this situation is being aggravated by the automation programs in huge industry which releases men to unemployment.

On the other hand, nationwide surveys being conducted by the Federation show clearly that independent business, given a chance, will expand, and create more jobs.

The best example of this fact is shown by the data gathered by this survey. Many independent business firms were able to utilize the small business tax reform act passed in 1958. In one year, some 32% expanded with the result that in 1965 there are over 3,500,000 more employees in small business than there were in 1964.

It is to be hoped that future tax cuts will be predicated on an awareness of the new jobs that will be created, not the votes that may be influenced.

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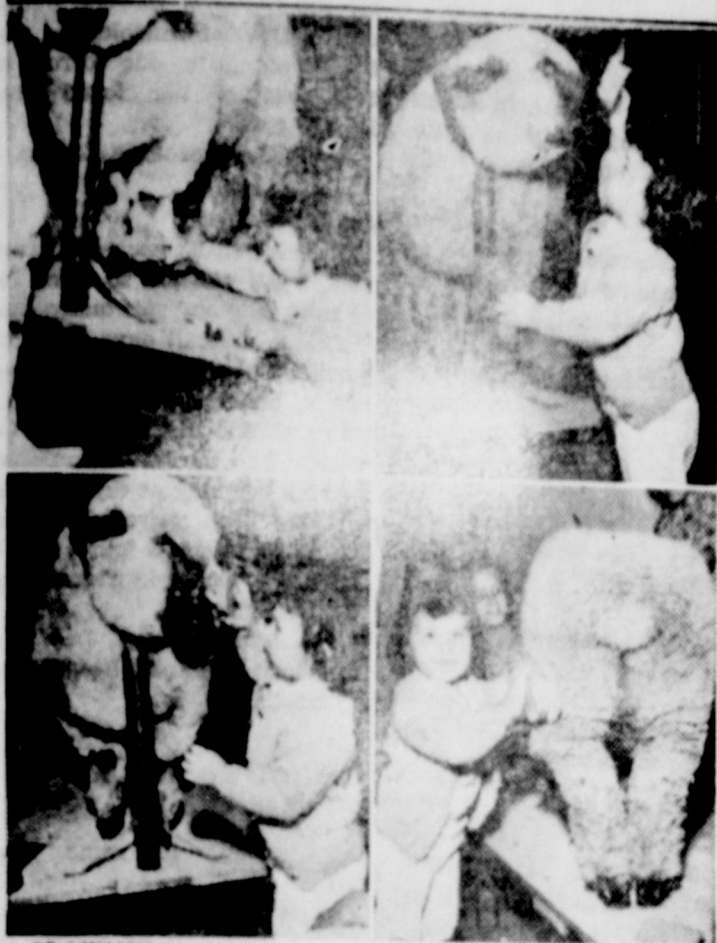

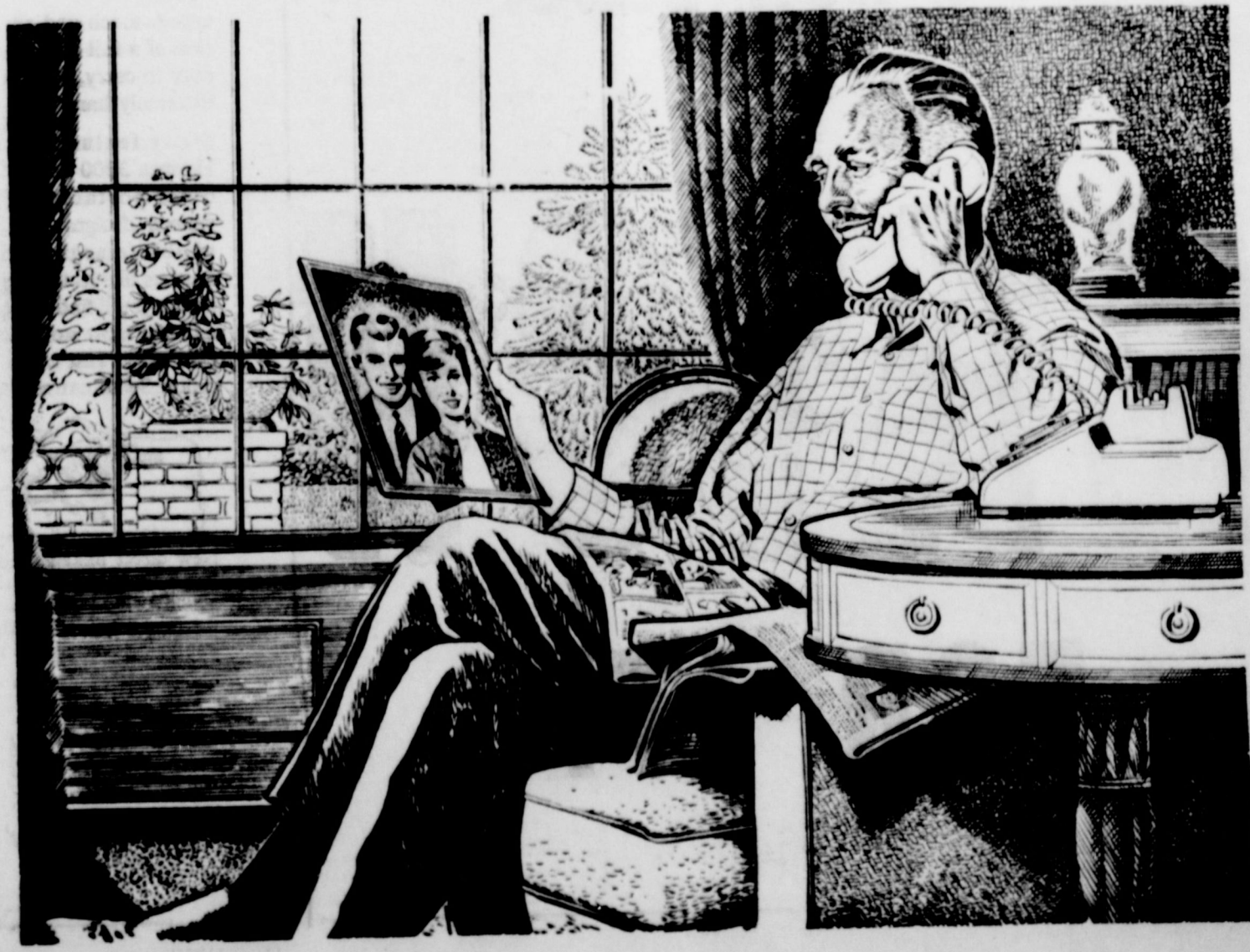
