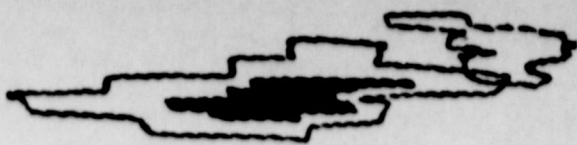

## Eagles Open Season Friday Against Marfa

The Sanderson High School Eagles will open their 1965 football season Friday night against the Marfa Shorthorns in a non-conference game. Marfa is a class AA school.

The Shorthorns have a strong team going into the the season with a good number of returning lettermen.

Sanderson has a large number of boys out this year, but are shallow in experience and also further weakened by the loss of the services of two returning lettermen and key players, Travis Harkin, quarterback on last year's Eagle spud and almost a shoo-in to retain the spot or this year's team had a back injury that cropped up. Harkins will not be in the lineup this year.

The Eagles also have lost Tommy Weigand, halfback and returning letterman, who was one of the outstanding backs of the district last year. Weigand has moved to Enterprise, Alabama.

Coach Clay Barrow stated that the boys had had long and strenuous workouts during the past two weeks and sore muscles were the only ill effects of the practice. He stated that the boys had a good spirit and attitude and expected them to give a good showing of their ability in the coming season.

The Eagles will play their first home game Friday night of next week against the Class AA Alpine Bucks.

## Enrollment Up 17 Pupils In Local Schools

The enrollment of scholastics in Sanderson schools is up 17 pupils over last year, according to enrollment figures released by Supt. Ken McAllister Tuesday.

The enrollment last year was 583 and this year is 600. The enrollment in the elementary school is 287 and is divided: 61 in the 1st, 52 in the 2nd, 63 in the 3rd, 52 in the 4th, and 59 in the 5th.

In the junior high school, there are 55 in the 6th, 48 in the 7th, and 51 in the 8th for a total of 154.

The 159 high school students are divided by grades as follows: 51 in the 9th, 41 in the 10th, 31 in the 11th, and 36 in the 12th.

## Voting Tuesday On Increase In State Senators

The proposed amendment was the result of redistricting and the possibility of overlapping Senatorial Districts, causing the possibility of some of the incumbents to risk losing their offices or having to run against another incumbent.

Fern covered the curtains at the back of the altar and in

the upper left corner there were three large wedding bells and white satin bows and streamers. Tall white ivy-twined candelabra held white burning tapers, all arranged to form a background for the altar. Pews were marked by a spray of greenery, a white wedding belt, and white satin bows.

Music was by a quartet from Abilene Christian College A Cappella Chorus, including Homer Martin, Charlet Siburt, Miss Jo Oldham, and Miss Anita Butler.

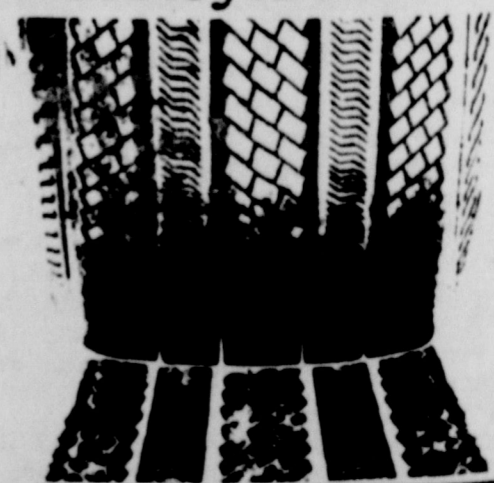
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Miss Carol Jane Lemons

Mention was made of the Border Construction Company, working on the highway north of Sanderson, which suspended the work there and for 10 days used their men and equipment in town to assist in the clean-up job at no charge. Neighboring towns provided crews of 50 men or more with their own food and water for 10 days to use hoes, picks and shovels and rakes to assist in the clean-up. ## Bargain Day Crowds

Just after World War II, in the heyday of scarcities, a grocery store received a shipment of hard-to-get margarine. The manager dropped a carton in a narrow aisle and sang out:

"Oleo! Come and get it!"

In the ensuing stampede, a woman shopper was injured. In due course she sued the market, pointing out that the manager should have known—from two previous stampedes—what to expect. And the court granted her substantial damages.

A store does not guarantee each customer absolute protection from the actions of other shoppers. But a store may be held liable if, by its own negligence, it permits a crowd to become dangerous.

In another case, a large crowd jammed the entrance of a department store on the opening day of a sale. The management let only a few shoppers in at a time, allowing the rest to surge impatiently against the glass show windows. There were no guards, no barricades, no warnings of danger.

Finally the glass cracked, and a woman was badly cut. Here, too, a court held the store liable for failing to prevent an accident that it could reasonably have averted.

However, the mere presence of a crowd does not necessarily make the store liable for mishaps. Not only must there be negligence on the part of the management but also there must be a sufficient cause-and-effect connection between the crowding and the injury.

For example:

A woman was seated at the hosiery counter of a department store that was swarming with bargain hunters. Suddenly she was bumped off her chair by another shopper, going past in a hurry. The woman sued the store, but to no avail. The court noted that the injury was not

really caused by the crowd at all, but by the recklessness of one particular individual.

Besides, some discomforts must be tolerated as part of the shopping process. As one court put it:

"Crowds are often found in large stores at the time of special sales, and during holiday seasons. They are an unavoidable feature of mercantile life in large cities."

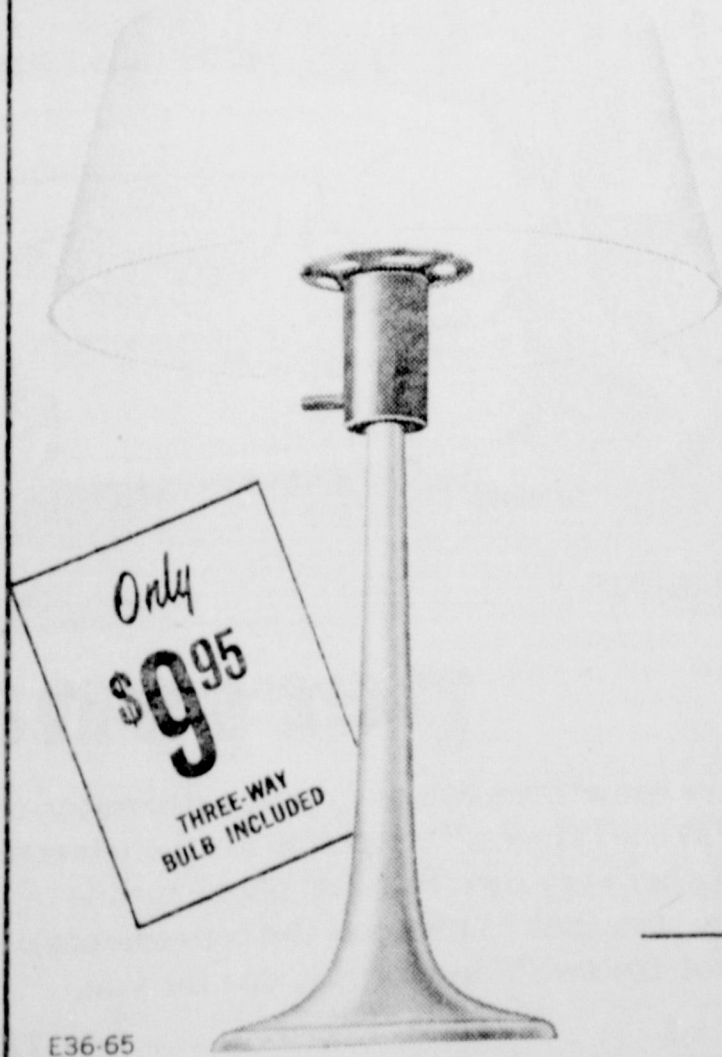
