First Midge Signs Seen In County

Definite signs of sorghum midge in Parmer County have been reported by County Agent Deryl Coker.

"The midge season is now more of a threat to our county. Farmers should keep a close watch on their fields, and report any actual findings of the midge to me," said County Agent Deryl Coker.

He suggested that farmers construct a "midge detector" to satisfy themselves as to whether or not they have midge. "The small orange midge gnat is always present. By using a shoe box with a small glass vial in an opening, a farmer can soon tell if he has midge in his grain," Coker said,



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

is so much "food quackery" going around that one wonders what to believe. Recently in a Medical Conference held in Dallas, Dr. Frederick . Store, Professor of Nutrition the Harvard University School of Public Health spoke on "Nutritional Nonsense" and his statements were: "There is more nutrition sense than nonsense though one may wonder if this is so with the nonsense one hears today. One must have an understanding of nutrition to recognize nutritional quakery statements. How do you tell a quack? He usually promises his product is good for many, many illnesses and that you will

get quick and sure results." Whether you are eating to lose weight or gain weight, you need three meals daily.

Crash diets or liquid diets do not answer the weight reduction problem. A reducing diet should be well balanced to include the necessary nutrients to meet the body's needs. The selection of calories is important; they should come mainly from lean meats as beef, pork, fish, poultry, and eggs, fruits, vegetables and milk. Eat not only to add years to



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
