## Postmaster Urges Early Mailing Of

 Overseas ParcelsThe period from October 21 to ovember 10 has been designat parcels by surface transportation to members of our Armed Force overseas. For airmail parcels the period is December 1 to De ember 10, according to Post master J. R. Hodgkins. Greeting cards should be mailed within the periods designated for parcels if they are to delivery prior to Christmas. The term "Armed Forces overseas" includes personnel of our Armed Forces, members of their families, and authorized U.S. civilian personnel employed overseas an APO. All articles should be packed
in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper and well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or package. A slip showing list of package. A slip showing list of
contents should be enclosed in the parcel. Customs Declaration
forms, completed by thesenders,

In addition to the articles normally prohibited in the mails, matches of all kinds and lighter fuid may not be mailed to overettes, other tobacco products, ettes, otfee and various other items are prohibited in parcels addressed to some military post offices. Addresses must be legible and complete, and should be prepar ed by typewriter or pen and ink. All APO numbers have been changed to five digits which are identical to the ZIP codes.
The domestic rates of postage are applicable, and post age must
be fully prepaid. On fourth-class parcels the parcel post zone rate from the post office of mailing to the post office through which the pan el is addressed will be charged. A irmail articles weighing 8 ounces or less, are charge able at the rate of 8 cents per

sounce minimum are chargeable at the rate of 88 cents for the first pound and 80 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.
