post. The order was never carpied out, historians say, because horses weren't ava
wate the cannon.

Rainfall Records In Sanderson Noted

## C onservation Servic

We often hear the expressions: "It doesn't rain as much as it did years ago", or "When we get normal rainfall". These expres-
sionsprobably originated of the decline in forage produce tion.
Let's take a look at the rainfall records in Sanderson. Records from 1891 to the present indicated that the only thing "normal"about rainfall in Sanderson 1900 withe fluctuations such as 1900 with 22.48 inches and 1901
with 7.30 inches 1932 and 2055 with 7.30 inches; 1932 had 20.55
inches and 1933 had 3.35 inches In 1934 there was 2.80 inches. and 1935 back up to 17.34 . The long-time average for
Sanderson is 11.29 inches. However, $54 \%$ of the years are below
the average and 27 percent of the years received one-half or
less of the average rainfall. The less of the average rainfall. The

took its toll of perennial grasses with five years in succession of

What happened to the forage? Many of the plants died of starvation and old age during the drought. A grass plant starve? --

the plant food that was stored in the crown and roots of the plant. If the new leaves are allowed to continue to grow they begin ditional leaves, produce new roots, produce seed and restore
food reserves in the crown and roots. If leaves are continually
clipped, food reserves are used up and the plant dies of starva-保 because it was not allowed to replace roots and feed itself Most perennial grasses have a natural life span of 2 to 10 years
