We learned last weekend that there was some vandalism to the school property over the holidays at the football field and at high school building.

Every adult in the county has the obligation to be anxious to see this stopped. It is a waste of money and the waste of morals and possibly the waste of some lad's character for it to be permitted to continue.

Within the next few days each house in Sanderson will receive a letter from the local Volunteer Fire Department. The letter is self-explanatory and pretty simple in its request-50¢ per month from each householder to maintain the fire department.

Now, before reading any fur-ther some will say, "Yes, but I'm paying as much as so-and-so and I don't even own the house I live in. "

Maybe you are asked to pay as much as some person who owns 3 houses or 5.

But is fire protection for your belongings worth 50¢ a month? Or is it worth 50e a month for you and your friends to have fire protection?

Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman ... seeks re-election

State Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo has announced his candidacy for re-election in the 25th Senatorial District which now includes 21-counties.

"I am grateful to the people for their confidence and respectfully ask their support, "Senator Hardeman said. "My record in office has been predicated on a deep and abiding respect for the principles of our Constitution. It has been my purpose to help maintain a sound, responsive state government and to handle all legislation of local interest with dispatch. This I will continue to do."

Elected to a four-year Senate term two years ago, Hardeman is running for re-election in 1966 as a result of the redistricting law enacted by the last Legislature which re-aligned the state's senatorial districts to comply with the U.S. Supreme Court's "one man, one vote" decision.

The 25th District includes 15 of its previous 20 counties: Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton, Terrell, Tom Green, Upton and Val Verde. The six counties of Ector, Kinney, Loving, Midland, Reeves and Uvalde were added to make up the new 21-county district.

Poll Taxes Are Due By Jan. 31st

January 31 is the deadline for paying a poll tax for the upcoming elections in 1966 and so far there has not been avery enthusiastic response, according to Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax collec-

According to the count Monday there were only 139 poll tax payments and only 14 days left in which to pay the tax.

Those elegible for exemptions are those who have reached their 60th birthday before January 1, and those who have had their 21st birthday after January 1st of last year. Exemption certificates are necessary here for the 21-year-olds, but not for the over-60s, as the population of Terrell County is under 10,000.

The Times was advised by Congressman Richard C. White Monday morning that the Depart-ment of Agriculture had placed Terrell County among others in the state eligible for emergency feed for 1966.

The program makes available my Caroline, and Cooke. government-owned feed to the ranchmen at a cheaper price than three-year term. available elsewhere, Cong. White stated. He said that feed for all dairy cattle, sheep, and goats would be available at 75% of the support price and all other feed at the support price.

Applications for the feed or information about the program are available at County ASC offices, White stated.

Fire Department Asks 50c Month For Maintenance

The Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department is putting letters in the mail in the next few days to every householder in Sanderson asking for cooperation in a new method of raising money for the maintenance of the department and the possibility of purchasing a new truck sometime in the fu-

The letter explains that both the trucks now in operation are more than 20 years old and that since the purchase of the second truck right after WWII, the only equipment that has been bought is new hose, nozzles, extinguishers, etc.

The letter states that the directors of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District #1 approved the addition of a 50¢ per month charge to be added to each water bill and collected by them and turned in to the fire department for its

maintenance. This plan is now used in the collection of "sanitation" fees and has proven to be very satisfactory, according to reports.

The payment, is was pointed out by the fire department officers, was not mandatory, but it would be appreciated and used as wisely as was possible in furnishing the needs of the organization.

SOME OTHER IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE SOCIAL SECURITY ACT

(In addition to Medicare, the new aw makes several important and public assistance programs. Some of these changes are described here.)

How Much Are Monthly Cash They Start? Monthly cash benefits are increased 7% a month, acrossthe-board, with a minimum increase of \$4. The increase is retroactive to January 1, 1965. The minimum for retired single worker now over 65 will be \$44 a month, up to a maximum of \$135.90. For a retired worker and his spouse, the new minimum would be \$66 a month and the new maximum \$203.85.

How Does The New Law Liberalize The So-Called "Earnings Ceiling"? Effective January 1, 1966, you will be able to earn up to \$1,500 a year without any loss of

What About Early Retirement? Under the new law, a widow may elect to receive a reduced benefit at age 60, instead of 62 as in the

How Have Survivor's Benefits Been Changed? It continues payment of benefits for a surviving child up to age 22 if he is a fulltime student in an accredited school. This benefit is retroactive to January 1, 1965.

Are Self-Employed Doctors Covered Under The New Law? Yes, for taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1965. This is an improvement I have been advocating for years.

Does The New Law Change The Kerr-Mills (Medical Assistance To The Aging) Program? Yes. The new law makes several important improvements in the Kerr Mills program, but action by the State Government is required before they become effective.

The new law establishes a single and separate medical care program for the needy, extending the ad-

Final Income Tax Installment Due

Deadline for paying the final installment on estimated income tax returns for 1965 is Monday, January 17, 1966, C. E. Mangelsdorf, administrative officer of Internal Revenue Service in Pecos, reminded taxpayers today.

"If you have previously filed an estimated return and events occurring in the last quarter of 1965 indicate that your income will be substantially more or less than your original estimate, you should file an amended declaration by January 17," he said.

This declaration should be marked "amended" and filed with the same District of Internal Revenue who received the original declaration. A blank amended declaration is printed on the back of the notice of payment due which the taxpayer received by mail.

An original declaration of estimated tax for the year 1965 should be filed by January 17 on Form 1040ES by taxpayers who first became liable for filing an estimate during the

fourth quarter of 1965. There's one exception to these rules! If the taxpayer finds it necessary to file an amended declaration on January 17, or if he becomes liable for filing a declaration for the first time on January 17, he need not file or pay on that date if he files his final return for 1965 and bays in full the balance of tax he owes on or before January 31, 1966.

Beautification Survey Due For Texas Highways

AUSTIN -- Texas second phase of Texas' initial plan of compliance with the recently-en acted Federal Highway Beautification Act will get under way Monday (January 3) when field parties from the Texas Highway Department begin the actual count for inventories of billboards and junkyards along Texas highways.

The act, as approved by Congress and signed into law by the President, envisions the control of billboards and junkyards and scenic enhancement along the nation's federal-aid highway systems.

In Texas this will cover more than 3,000 miles of Interstate highway system and more than 14, 500 miles of the primary sys-

The Texas inventories were ordered last month by State Highway Engineer D.C. Greer.

At that time Greer said information obtained in the inventories will be used in studies that will be made relative to possible state legislation to implement the provision of the act, including the zoning of industrial and commercial areas along the State highway system.

A Highway Department spokesman said May 15, 1966, has been set as a target date for

completion of the inventories. The Highway Department field parties will travel over every mile of federal-aid highways in Texas gathering information for the inventories.

The number of junkyard in the state is considerably smaller than that of billboards.

On billboards, Highways Department personnel will record such information as size, ownership, subject displayed and location.

The signs will be classified as in rural, industrial or commer-

Signs directly related to the property on which they are located, such as "for sale" signs, will not be surveyed.

The first project in Texas plan of action under the Federal act was launched earlier this nonth when the Texas Highway Commission approved plans for the first landscape planting project to be linanced in Texas under the act.

This project is to be on section of Interstate Highway 45 adjacent to the downtown business district of Houston.

The Federal act calls for an expanded program of landscaping and scenic enhancement.




