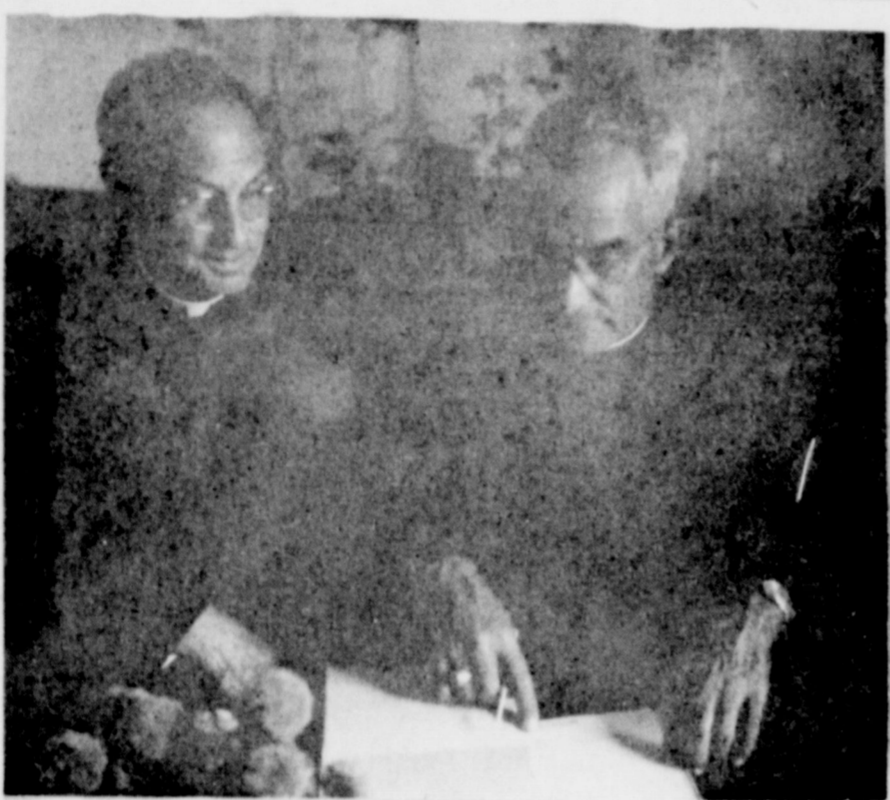
He stays about as busy as he feels like and we try to keep odd jobs waiting for him so that he he won't grow stale.

## Local Catholics Plan Three Jubilees For Weekend of July 23 Through 25

Rev. Nicholas Femenia and the members of St. James Catholic Church are planning three jubilees for the weekend of July 23-25.

It is the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the St. James Parish, and the 25th anniversary of the building and of the pastorate of Rev. Femenia in Sanderson.

Besides Bishop Tschoepe of San Angelo, other church dignitaries are expected to be here for the occasion, and invitations are being sent to all priests of the San Angelo, El Paso, and Corpus Christi Dioceses.

Details of the program for the weekend will be released in the paper next week.

## Draft Call Upped For Next Month

State draft boards will be called upon to furnish 1,585 men for the armed forces in September. Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, Selective Service director said this week.

He also announced that the quota for Texas for August had been increased from 1,636 to 1,837.

The state director of Selective Service said that the local boards would probably be called upon to send between 4,000 and 5,000 men for pre-induction mental and physical examinations in September.

The Texas quota of 1,585 for induction in September is the state's share of a national call of 31,300, all for the army.

On July 1, five men from the four-county area covered by Local Board No. 14 reported for service in the U. S. Army including Oscar Marquez of Sanderson. On the same date seven men reported for pre-induction physicals. Three more were ordered but transferred elsewhere.

The calls on the local board for August 3 have been received and are six for induction and 10 for pre-induction physicals.

## Mrs. Carruthers Sr. Dies In Wink July 8 Rains, Wind Come To Area

Funeral services were held here Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the First Baptist Church for Mrs. Jennie Carruthers, 80, who died in the Winkler Memorial Hospital Friday after a long illness. Rev. J. C. Hancock, pastor, officiated at the rites. Her body was taken to Del Rio for interment following graveside services there Monday afternoon.

Survivors include a son, John W. Carruthers Jr., Sanderson, and two daughters, Mrs. Virgil Ogle and Miss Eva Carruthers of Wink; three brothers, Sam Roberts, Fort Stockton, Bud Roberts, Del Rio, and R. L. Roberts, San Angelo; three sisters, Mrs. Albert Turk, Del Rio, Mrs. Levi Duncan, Uvalde, and Mrs. Tom Turk, Quemado; also four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Carruthers was born October 30, 1885, in Hamilton County. She was married to the late John W. Carruthers Sr. in Grandfalls December 31, 1902 and they ranched in Val Verde County for many years before coming to Terrell County in 1932. After Mr. Carruthers' death in 1953, Mrs. Carruthers and her daughter, Miss Eva Carruthers, continued to make their home on the ranch until they moved to Wink a year and a half ago.

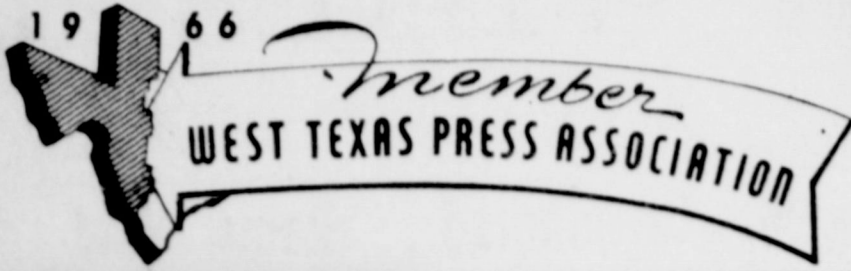

Social Security Earnings Limits Increased in '66

Social security beneficiaries can earn more in 1966 without losing any of their payments, according to H. P. Thomas, district manager of social security in Odessa. Starting in 1966 the \$1200 a year limit has been increased to \$1500; if earnings are \$1500 or less, there will be no adjustment or withholding of social security benefits. Beneficiaries earning more than \$1500 a year, but under \$2700, will have one dollar withheld for each two dollars they earn over \$1500. Above \$2700, the withholding will be on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

The monthly limit has also been changed. No matter how much a beneficiary earns for the year, he can receive his social security check for any month in which he does not earn wages of more than \$125, and is not active in a business of his own.

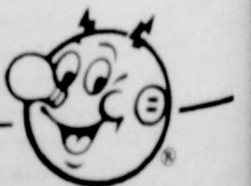

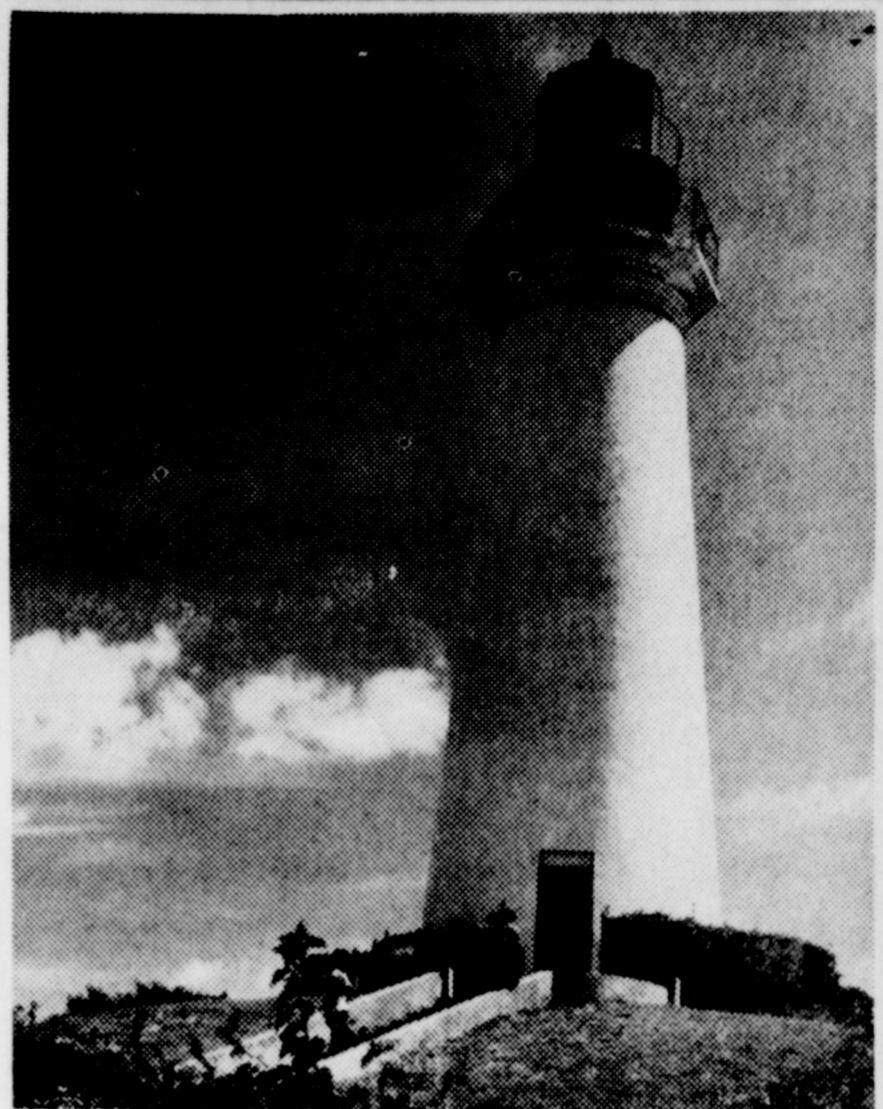

Pesticide products are thoroughly tested before they are sold for your use, says D. C. Langford, county agent. Research results are available for all to read on the label of many home pesticides, explains Langford. Take your time when you buy, and read the label carefully each time you use the product.

Each pesticide container is labeled with information so that you will know how to use the product in the right amount and in the proper way. The label contains warning and caution statements regarding the safest way to use the product.

Most of the pesticide products designed for home use have labels, that are written in "layman's language." You will find a few new terms, but look them up in the dictionary before you use the product.

You may also be faced with a term that is so new that it is not in a dictionary. In that case, contact the county agent's office where a listing of pesticide terms is available.

Nothing is left to chance by the manufacturer as he develops, tests and checks the product before it is put on the market. Each product takes three to five years of testing and research work at a cost, to the manufacturer, of around \$2 million for each new product. Yet, this time, effort and money will be wasted if you neglect to read and understand the information on the label, which is there to help and protect you.

Never use a stronger concentration than is recommended on the label. It is not true that if little is desirable a lot more will be that much better.
