THE UNWELCOMED GUEST
The American housewife may have her last op－ portunity to raise questions about＂politicians in the pantry＂when the Hart Packaging and Labeling Bill is considered by the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee of the U．S．House of Repre－ sentatives．
The Senate，in passing the bill，chose to disregard existing state and national laws which protect against intentionally deceptive packaging and label－ ing practices．These laws are fully supported by in－ dustry and Better Business Bureaus．

Almost every shopper can tell which products are high－priced，which low－priced and which me－ dium－priced，and she doesn＇t base her choice of product on splitting hundredths of a cent．Yet the bill would authorize government agencies to find that the fractional weights of products＂are likely to impair the ability of consumers to make price per unit comparisons＂and to issue regulations setting the only weights at which products could be sold， regardless of price．
In an Alice－in－Wonderland exercise of＂making a word mean what I want it to mean，＂the agencies could establish what a＂serving＂，of a product must be，and what＂small，＂＂medium＂and＂large＂must mean．This arbitrary freezing of practices could seriously interfere with future efforts to provide better bargains for the shopper

Other provisions of the bill duplicate and con－ tradict existing state and federal laws and regula－ tions．They would apply even though the manu－ facturer was making a conscientious competitive effort to supply the customer with a high quality product at the lowest possible price．Competition is still the best means to assure that Mrs．Housewife will get the best possible bargain－not unnecessary laws which interfere with competition．

Yes there are many questions which Mrs．House－ wife could raise as to what influence the Hart Bill will have on her range of choice of products and on the cost of her market basket items．
One such question might well be，who knows better，and is more solicitous about，the needs of Mrs．Housewife than the manufacturer，whose life or death in business depends upon her confidence？

Effective January 1, 1966, the F.I.C.A. (Federal Insurance Contributions Act) tax was increased from $3-5 / 8$ percent to 4.2 percent nd the self employment tax was increased from 5.4 percent to 6.15 reased. The earnings base was $\$ 4.800$ to $\$ 6.600$. The Hospital Insurance Trust Fund and the Supplementary Medical Insurance Trust Fund were created to finance the program of health insurance for the aged. These funds will be used to pay the benefits and administrative expenses of each separate program; they may be used for no other purpose. 0.35 percent of each persons' social security tax for the year will be used to
finance hospital insurance and will e placed in the Hospital Insurance Trust Fund. Voluntary payments of 3 per month from people over 65 . and an equal amoust from the Fedral Goverument will be placed in the Supplementary Medical Insurto finance medical insurance.
