30 Gas Plant Pupils Transfer From District To Sheffield and Iraan Schools

About 30 pupils will transfer out of the Terrell County Independent School District to the Sheffield and Iraan schools, according to Supt. Ken McAllister. The move will affect only two high school students, and the balance are in the elementary and junior high grades.

Average daily attendance, a factor involved in determining the amount of state aid received to go toward teachers' salaries, will be lessened for the Sanderson schools, consequently caus-

ing the loss of the salary of one teacher, or about \$5,000, Mr. McAllister stated.

There will be about 12 students who will continue to ride the bus in from the plant and there will be some students picked up between the plant and Dryden. Plans are, also, to extend the Dryden bus run to the roadside park east of Dryden on US 90 or to Cedar Station. Details of this change will be told as soon as plans have been completed.

According to Mr. McAllister, the distance for the Iraan school students from the plant to travel is 47 miles, compared to the 53 from the plant to Sanderson. If a bus is scheduled out of Iraan to pick up the students at the plant, then the students who go to the Sheffield school will have to wait until the bus from Iraan arrives to bring them home, necessitating about the same time of arrival at the plant as when the bus came into Sanderson.

Members of the school board, the school superintendent, and some of the interested parents were in Sanderson last week to consider the move and some of that group met with the Terrell County Independent School District Board on Monday night.

Some details of the transfer as pertains to the transportation, tuition, etc., will have to be worked out and each student will have to apply for the transfer individually, Mr. McAllister stated.

The superintendent stated that it was specifically made plain that at any time any of the students wished to transfer back into this school district, they were welcome to do so.

School Enrollment Drops from '65-'66

The enrollment in the Sanderson schools has dropped from last year, according to figures released after the opening day of school.

Much of the decrease was due to the transfer of 30 students at the El Paso Natural Gas Plant to the schools in Sheffield and Iraan.

There are 535 students enrolled in the Sanderson schools with 237 in the elementary school, 148 in junior high, and 150 in the high school. Not included in the grand total are 18 students in the pre-school classes in the elementary building.

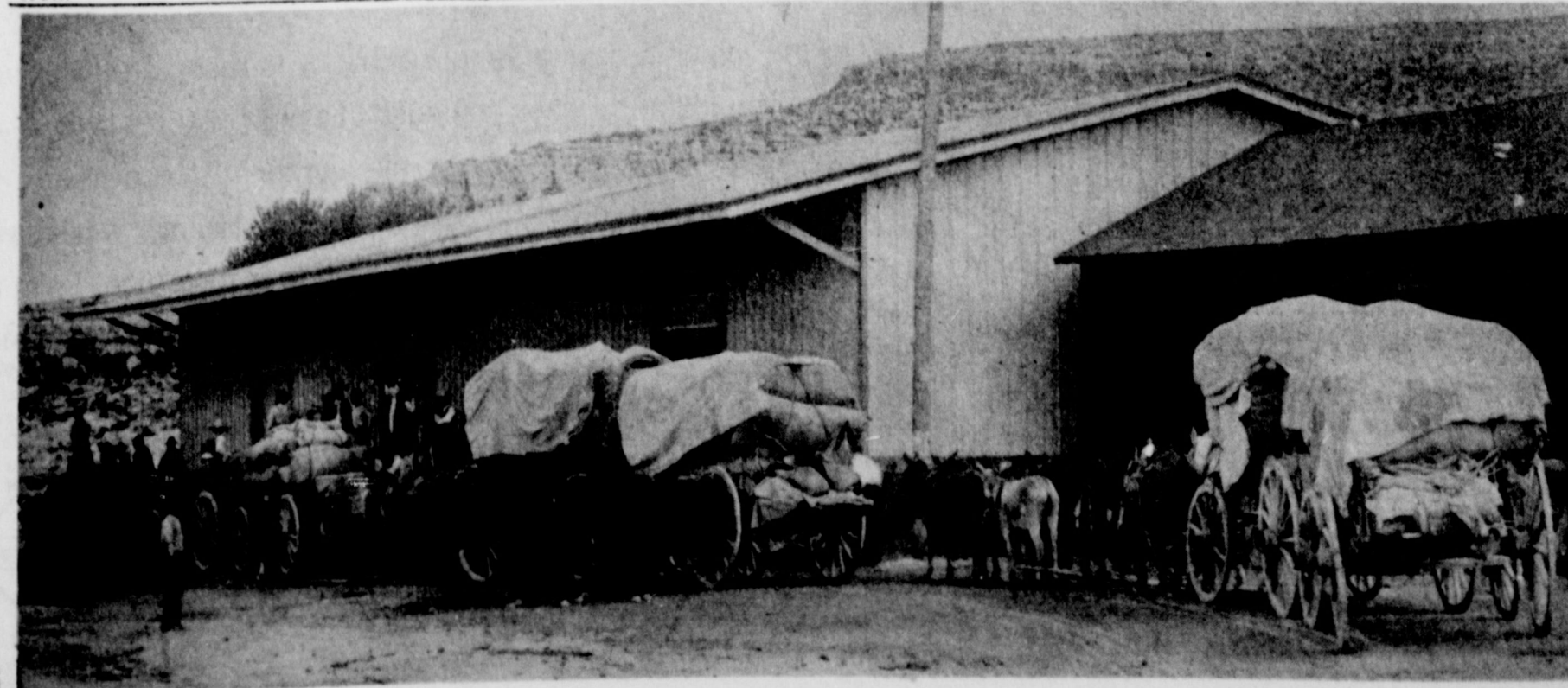

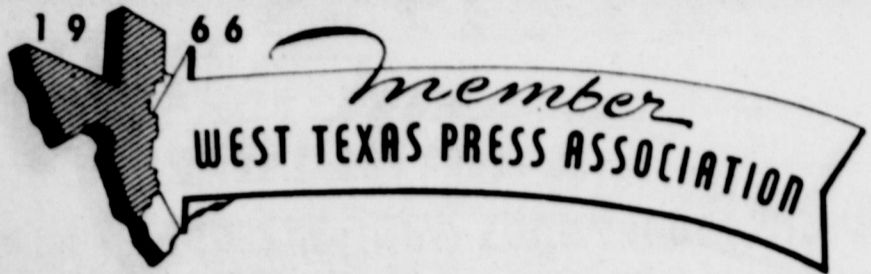

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Livestock Needed For Boys Ranch

Roddy Peeples, chairman of the 1966 West Texas Boys Ranch Round-up, said this week that the round-up had reached 105 animal units, which is just over halfway to the goal of 200 animal units. "A large number of livestock are still needed to insure the success of the round-up as West Texas Boys Ranch is still struggling to overcome the setback caused by the loss of the recreational facilities in a fire last May. We need a lot more help on Round-up if we are to complete a successful drive for the boys."

The funds from Round-up go a long way toward summer and fall operating expenses. "Getting 70 boys ready and outfitted for school is quite an expensive undertaking in itself," Peeples said. Joe Vander Stucken of San Angelo and Sonora, has offered to help arrange pick ups of any animals in the area that are donated to the ranch. "Most animals are donated through the auction ring, but anyone wishing to give a cow, sheep, steer, horse, or anything else and can't get it to market, we'll be glad to come pick it up," Vander Stucken said.

Round-up will continue for the next several weeks to give the rancher who has not yet marketed his cattle, the opportunity to participate in the Round-up.

Any animals can be donated simply by consigning a portion of the livestock at the auction to West Texas Boys Ranch.

Peeples concluded, "It takes a lot of people working together to support the fine work of the West Texas Boys Ranch."

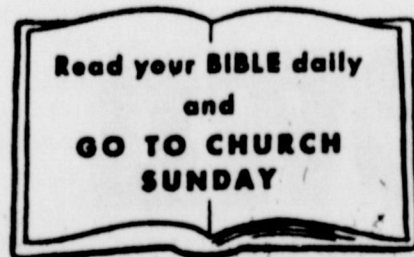

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The Joe Browns Celebrate Anniversary

(Ed. note: The story and picture of the golden wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Brown was June 21, but due to their subsequent illness and hospitalization, it was impossible to get the story and picture earlier. We are printing them late for the information of their friends here. The Browns are former residents of Terrell County.)

Mr. and Mrs. Joe F. Brown were honored on their Golden Wedding anniversary Tuesday evening, June 21, at eight o'clock in the Fellowship Hall of First Presbyterian Church. Hosts for the colorful event were Mrs. Brown's brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Shurley, who are visiting here from Del Mar, California. Approximately 300 friends from far and near were present to help make this a gay occasion.

Receiving the guests were Mr. and Mrs. Shurley and the honorees. Next in line were their honor attendants of 50 years ago: maid of honor, Miss Clara Shurley; the bridesmaid, Mrs. Mary Marshall, and the organist, Mrs. J. E. Mayberry. Appearing in Mrs. Brown's wedding dress was Miss Adra Franks of Warsaw, Missouri, a great-niece of the honored couple.

In the foyer, where the line had formed, was a beautiful arrangement of gold gladioli in brass scales with the numerals, "1916-1966" in tall gold letters. On either side of this arrangement were gold candles in gold candelabra.

The entrance door to Fellowship Hall was flanked on either side with arrangements of gold mums. To the left was the registry table, covered with a white net over gold cloth and decorated with a bouquet of gold roses, which surrounded the anniversary candle, to which a big gold "50" was attached. On the table was an enlarged picture of the bride and groom on their wedding day. Guests registered with gold pen and a gold plume pen. Presiding at the guest book was Mrs. Minnie Shurley of San Antonio.

A "memory table" held a replica of the Model T Ford in which the couple took their wedding trip; a model of the original lighted church, in front of an arrangement of gold roses. Photographs of the couple during their courtship days in 1915 were mounted opposite more pictures, taken after the wedding. Also on the memory table were two beautiful cakes: one heart-shaped cake, decorated

with a jewelry box holding a lamb cake nestled on a green set of rings; and the other, a base, to recall the ranching

career of Mr. Brown. The serving table was laid with a beautiful white net cloth, over slipper satin, appliqued with love birds, wedding bells, lilies of the valley, studded with iridescent sequins and pearls. Of special significance, the cloth was made by the couple's niece, Mrs. Seth Davenport.

On one end of the table was a golden coffee service, and on the other, the gold punch service. Flanking the centerpiece of golden roses were triple gold candelabra with gold candles. Gold forks and spoons were used and gold compotes held mint covered nuts. Napkins were inscribed in gold.

An open Bible cake was placed in front of the centerpiece as a symbol of the dedicated Christian lives of this couple during their 50 years of married life.

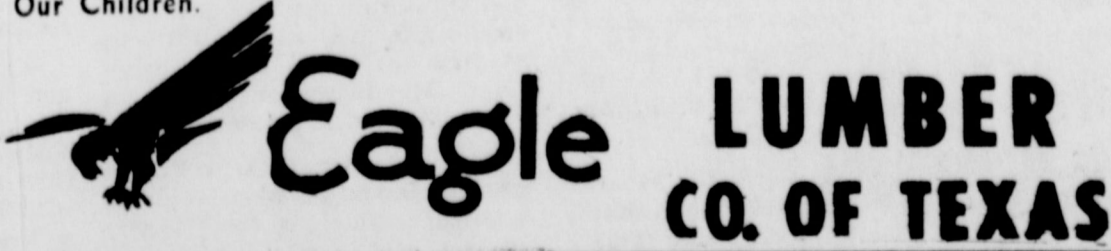
