LISTEN TO LUKE

 It seems that the rains of the week past and the cloudy weather that has existed for many days have taken the spotlight in much of the activity around the country.
 We had thought at first, during the onset of the rains, that they were about as general as any rains could be. We found out differently as the reports began coming in. It seems that the country to the south of Dryden didn't know that there was a rain anywhere in this part of the world.

The heaviest of the rainfall was to the north of Sanderson, according to all of the information that we got. Water in Big Canyon was running on US 285, on FM 2400, and on 1217 north of Dryden on several occasions during the past week, and we were told that water was over the highway at several points on US 90 west, and the other highways mentioned.

This high water kept the highway maintenance crews busy for the Labor Day weekend.

The school bus that goes to the El Paso Natural Gas Plant north of Dryden had to go around on FM 2400 one day last week due to high water on 8-Mile or Downie Draw north of Dryden on 1217.

There were some reports of stock lost on some of the ranches north of Sanderson, and lots of wire fencing was lost due to high water on the draws washing out water gaps, and some lost where high water came off of slopes so fast that it didn't take time to seek the low places immediately.

There was also some report of extreme erosion due to the rushing water.

But there were some benefits, too, for the ranchmen who had the moisture, in that there are some weeds popping through the ground that will help to carry the stock into the winter.

There were some uneasy times here in Sanderson during the recent rains. Few people say anything about it, but a wary eye is kept on the draw.

The concern that we all have for high water in the creek is certainly understandable, as is the reluctance of everyone to mention a possibility of its eminent recurrence.

We continue to ask every now and then about any news from the State Water Board, the State Soil Conservation Service, etc., concerning the proposed dams for Sanderson Canyon and 3-Mile Draw, and there continues to be nothing new to report on a possible beginning time for the ground party survey.

The wheels of progress seem to turn slowest for those who are waiting for something.

And in the meantime, we just continue to be apprehensive and prayerful.

 We heard an interesting story this week about when the "cave man" was shot at Dryden recently and placed in custody in San Antonio subsequently.

3.49 Inches Rainfall Here Since September 1 In Six Showers

There have been 3.49 inches of rainfall in Sanderson since September 1, according to information from Ervin Grigsby at the Desert Air Motel, official rain gauge station for Sanderson.

The rainfall was in six showers in the first 10 days of the month.

The gauge showed the following amounts as of 8:00 a. m. on each of the days indicated:

- September 1 - .21
- September 2 - .27
- September 4 - 1.03
- September 8 - .25
- September 9 - 1.42
- September 10 - .31

There was some run-off of the water that fell to the west and north of Sanderson, but the bed of Sanderson Canyon contained all of the water than ran.

Hernandez Tells of Burglaries, Waits For Transfer To Del Rio Jail

Alfredo Hernandez, the "cave man" from the Dryden area, has admitted to some crimes, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, who has been in San Antonio with Texas Rangers A. Y. Allee and A. Y. Allee Jr. to question the man.

Cooksey stated that they had a judge go with them to the San Antonio jail where Hernandez was transferred after being in a hospital there since he was captured on August 19.

Hernandez also waived the right to have counsel present at the interrogation, Cooksey said.

Hernandez admitted to shooting Cooksey near Dryden in November of last year, and also admitted to the burglary of the Pumpville post office and to the shooting of Pelham Bradford at the same time. Bradford was the Pumpville postmaster at that time.

Sheriff Cooksey stated that the man would readily admit to those things which he felt were known by the officers, but was reluctant to talk about anything if he felt that they did not have the "dead wood" on him.

They said he was linked with some burglaries in the Uvalde area dating back as far as 1962, which was soon after he got out of LaTuna Penitentiary, El Paso. He has also served time in the state pen of Texas at Huntsville, and in the New Mexico penitentiary, according to Cooksey.

Fingerprints taken from the cave near Pumpville, and the one where Cooksey was shot in November, also from the most

recent known campsite, all have definitely been identified as those of Hernandez, according to the sheriff, and a palm print was taken to see if it matched one taken at the site of a burglary near Uvalde.

It has been surmised that Hernandez lived along the railroad and used that as a means of transportation in the area of his activities.

Cooksey also reported that the ballistics test on a gun found in

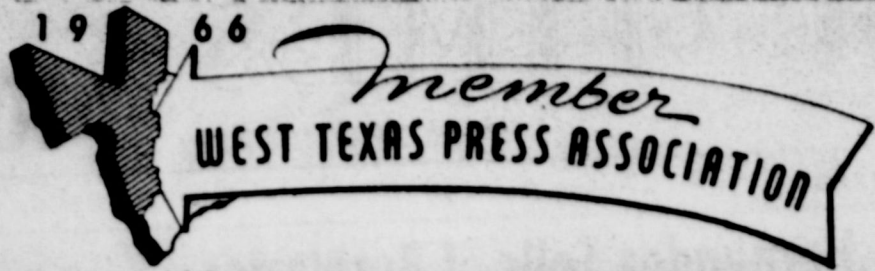

possession of Hernandez proved it to be the gun that fired the bullet that hit Mr. Bradford in the leg at the time of the burglary of his home and the Pumpville postoffice.

X-rays taken Monday of this week of Hernandez' jaw were to determine when he might be moved to the Val Verde County jail, which was expected to be sometime this week.

During the time that he has been in the hospital in San Antonio, one of the Terrell County officers, either Sheriff Cooksey or Deputy Dalton Hogg, and officers from surrounding counties have been on a guard detail at the bedside of Hernandez, who once tried to get away, according to Cooksey. Since he was taken to the Bexar County jail, he has been in a hospital room in that new facility so that the guards were unnecessary.

After he is released from the Val Verde County jail, he has promised to take local officers to the cave where were hidden the pistol taken from Cooksey and the .30-.30 rifle taken from Lewis Cash at the time Cooksey was shot.

Charges of armed robbery, dating back to 1962, have been filed in Uvalde County and further charges are awaiting evidence of the palm print; charges are also filed in Val Verde County and Terrell County, and other charges are planned, as are charges by postal authorities in connection with the Pumpville incident.

As soon as Hernandez can be returned to the Terrell County jail, plans are to call a meeting of the grand jury, Cooksey said.

Law Requires TB Tests Of Personnel In State's Schools

According to Section 5 of the Senate Bill Number 130, an act passed by the Texas Legislature in 1965, all school personnel, including teachers, clerical employees, supervisory personnel, bus drivers, personnel handling food, and personnel performing janitorial services shall be required to furnish the governing board of any public school in the state on or before September 1 of each year a certificate revealing that such school personnel have been examined for the disease of tuberculosis during a period of time not exceeding 120 days prior to September 1 of each year, and revealing the results of such examination.

It is hoped that this new law and the new program being instituted in the schools of Texas may be the means of helping to eradicate tuberculosis.

The Department of Health is now furnishing a guide to all schools titled "Child-Centered Approach to Tuberculosis Eradication". The guide is the result of the joint planning by representatives from several agencies. The Senate Bill No. 130 placed the responsibility for consolidation of tuberculosis control in the State Department of Health.

As a result of the above, Supt. Ken McAllister will soon get out letters of approval to be sent to all parents of children in the first and seventh grades of the local schools for examinations for tuberculosis. The patch test has been given for many years by the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association free of charge, but this year the Sternedle process will be used since it is considered to be better than the patch test for several reasons.

In this test a small amount of harmless tuberculin is injected into the skin of the forearm. The area is examined at a specified time to determine the reaction to the tuberculin.

If there is a reaction, the student has "picked up" a tuberculosis infection at some time in his life. This does not mean, necessarily, that the child has tuberculosis. It does mean, however, that the child has been closely associated with someone who has or has had active tuberculosis. This is the reason why it is so important that all close associates of the "positive reactor" child be examined for tuberculosis to find the source of infection of the child.

Parents should know that the infection of a child with tuberculosis germs is not inherited. The infection is always the result of close association with a person who has or had contagious tuberculosis.

Reasons are given in deciding to give the test to the pupils in the first and seventh grades. The first grader usually has a limited number of close associates—parents, brothers, sisters, grandparents, aunts, uncles, etc. The baby sitter, the maid, and others must not be forgotten in this investigation.

The seventh grader is entering into adolescence. This is an age when there is a greater risk of

The action was prompted after the dog of the Hansons was found dead in the yard Monday morning near the playpen of the Hanson baby. The meat was found nearby.

The information is given so that parents of small children will be alert to look for meat or candy before letting their children out in the yard to play by themselves.

The dog did not seem to have anything wrong with it when it was last seen alive, and it is believed that the poison was put in the yard for the dog.

Mr. and Mrs. Hanson were upset over the loss of the dog, but their reaction to the finding of what could be some poisonous meat in the yard was no less than hostile.

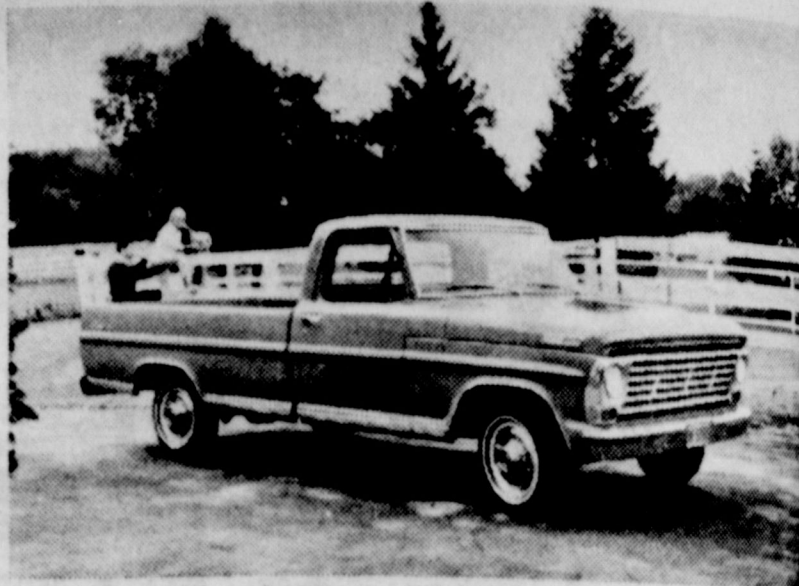

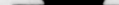

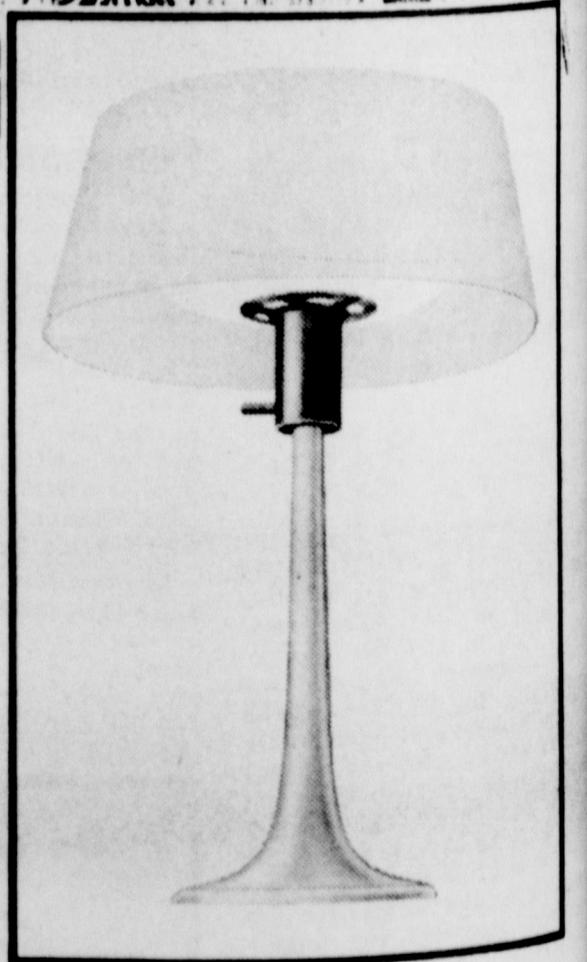

New MVI Sticker Is Available

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced today that the 1967 vehicle inspection period has begun.

Garrison said that the new inspection period began on September 1 and will end on April 15, 1967, as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. The inspection period is the same as in previous years.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one-half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5,500 official inspection stations," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas inspection stations can be identified by the official inspection station sign displayed at each station.

Garrison suggested that if the motorists have their vehicles inspected during the routine visits to the garages for ordinary maintenance, the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection will be eliminated.

In announcing the new inspection period, the Public Safety Director pointed out that vehicle defects contributing to traffic accidents in Texas during 1965 were the fewest yet experienced since the inspections began.

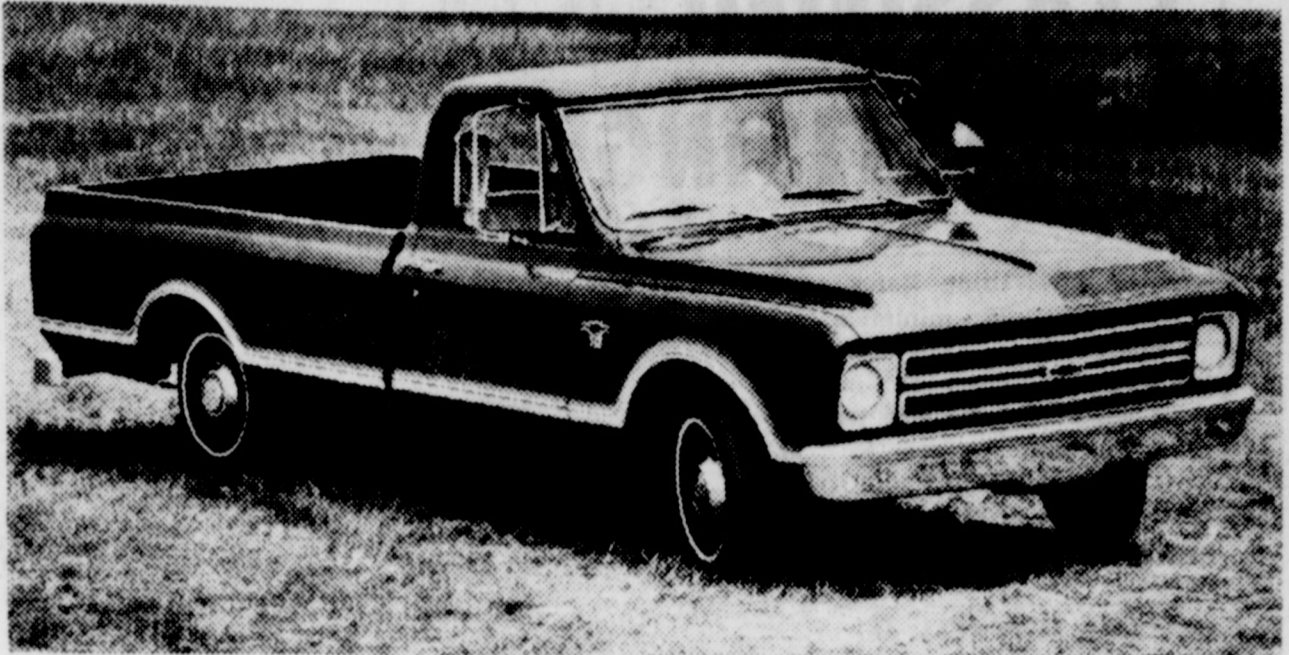

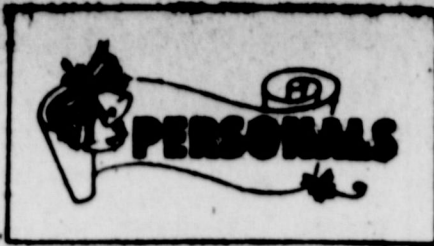
