One might imagine that since the rains, there was an abundance of feed and the animals wouldn't have to come into town for supplies. This doesn't seem to be the case, however.

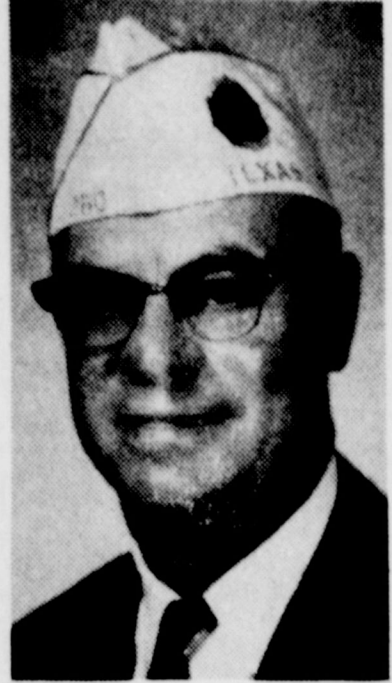
The season this year will begin on November 26, the Saturday after Thanksgiving and go through the third following Sunday.

Menard Stomps Eagles 39-0 There; Ozona Lions To Come Here Friday Night

The Menard Yellowjackets hit the Sanderson Eagles for a 39-0 score in that city last Friday night in a conference game.

Fumbles accounted for some of the loss by the Eagles, with five mishaps being recovered by

Menard, while Sanderson recovered only one of the Menard fumbles.

The statistics stacked up on the side of Menard with the exception of first downs and passing percentages.

Sanderson fumbled on the reception of the opening kickoff, Menard fumbled on their first scrimmage play, then Sanderson handed the ball back on the third down. On the second play following, Menard scored on a 20-yard pass play. They missed the extra point conversion.

Menard scored again with a minute left in the first frame to cap a 48-yard drive. The TD was set up by a 28-yard pass to the 2-yard line. The conversion try was good.

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School Board To Consider Building Program

The trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District will consider a building program at a special meeting to be Monday, November 7, according to Supt. Ken McAllister.

The meeting was called after a study of an evaluation of the physical plant made by the Texas Education Agency in March of this year.

In the evaluation, the survey stated that the high school buildings were in excellent condition considering their age and need only to be modernized to be entirely suitable for many more years;

The junior high building has deteriorated beyond the point of feasible or economical repair and should be razed;

The elementary building is in excellent condition except possibly for the need of a four-room addition, and needs nothing more than a good maintenance program.

The board approved the employment of Mrs. T. R. McClellan as the teacher of the second grade replacing Mrs. Clarence Jessup; hired Mrs. Ike Billings to replace Mrs. McClellan as teacher aide in the junior high school; approved Miss Carol Horton as assistant girls' basketball coach.

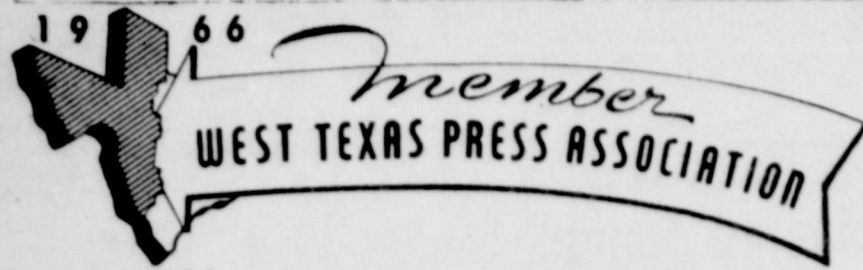

Field Designated In Terrell County

The Little Canyon (10,000 Strawn) field of Terrell County was opened Oct. 22 with official potential for Mobil Oil Corp. No. 1 G. K. Mitchell, 29 miles north of Dryden.

It was finalized for an official, calculated, absolute open flow of 1.54 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-oil ratio of 31.000-1, through perforations between 10,106-129 and 11,630-670 feet. Gravity of the liquid is 49 degrees.

The well was reported completed Dec. 3, 1963 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.1 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Location is 858.5 feet from the north and 3,341.8 feet from the west lines of 11-1-CCSD&RGNG.

Game Warden Trainees Being Sought By State

AUSTIN — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is accepting applications for prospective state game warden trainees leading up to competitive examinations at eight key state cities in November.

Successful candidates receive \$397 a month while studying and \$453 per month after six months on-the-job training. They are requested to contact the nearest Parks and Wildlife Field Office or write to the Personnel Office, Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building in Austin. Completed applications must be received by the department's personnel office, no later than Nov. 4.

Applications meeting the initial requirements, such as high school graduate, within the 21 to 40 age bracket plus physical requirements, will be assigned to

take written examinations at these places: San Antonio, Nov. 16; Corpus Christi, Nov. 17; Houston, Nov. 18; San Angelo, Nov. 21; Lubbock, Nov. 22; Waco, Nov. 28; Dallas, Nov. 29; and Tyler, Nov. 30.

Applicants qualifying under a rigid selection process involving personal interviews, background and character checks, will be given an extensive training course, including one semester at Texas A&M University.

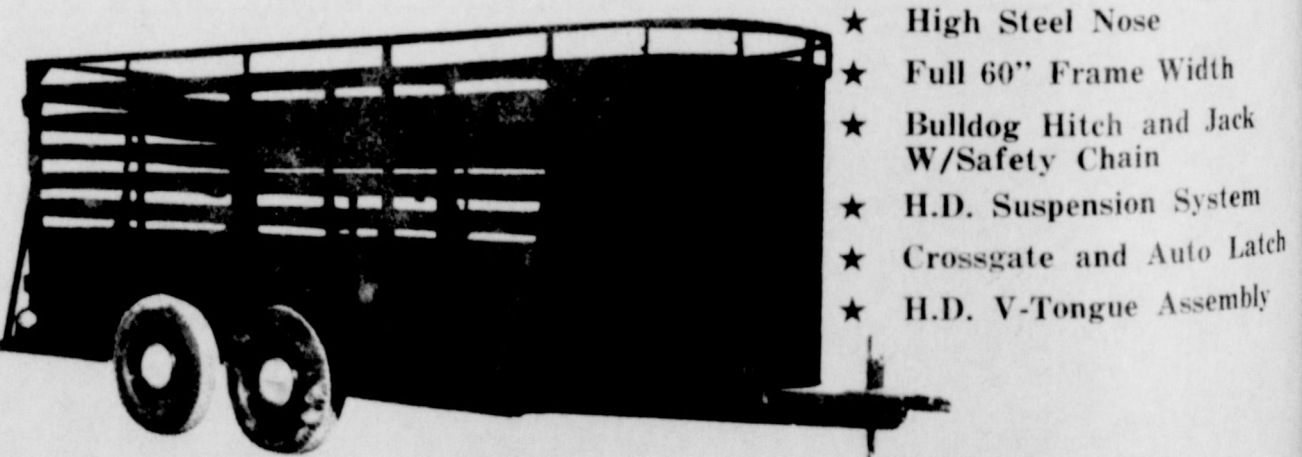

FIRST EARTH FOR Amistad was moved in January 1965. Completion is scheduled for late 1968 or early 1969. Construction is by contract and under supervision of the International Boundary and Water Commission.

"It was necessary to blast through bedrock for about 132 feet to build roads and set the

base of the dam," explained Loyd Hamilton, a staff engineer. "The course of the Rio Grande had to be changed to permit concrete construction on the U.S. side."

Mexico is in process of constructing its share of the dam.

Hamilton said slightly less than two miles of the dam would be in the United States and slightly more than four miles would be in Mexico.

An international highway will be atop the dam.

Giant crane-borne buckets move precooled concrete at the rate of 5,000 cubic yards per day, depositing it in forms atop the construction.

"Ingredients for the concrete are cooled to 50 degrees Fahrenheit or less before they are mixed," Henderson explained. "If the concrete was

mixed and poured at natural temperatures it would become extremely hot and highly expanded.

"Consequently, as it cooled it would shrink, leaving cracks between the concrete and the canyon walls. So it is precooled and when it warms up to outside temperature it expands to become flush or tight against the canyon walls."

Texas Travel Handbook issued

AUSTIN, TEXAS -- Two years of detailed research were culminated with the release of a comprehensive, 176-page "Texas Travel Handbook," published by Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department.

The glove-compartment-sized book contains more than 1,500 items of interest ranging from Alibates Flint Quarries to General Zaragoza's birthplace. In the family of materials now published by the Highway Department, the new Handbook fills a need by providing information on points of interest and where they are located.

As State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer pointed out, "We have in the past attracted visitors with a colorful array of brochures, maps, motion pictures and posters--all broad in scope. But once within our borders, there was no single volume to introduce specific sites of interest."

"This new publication," Greer said, "will lead our visitors to attractions in every corner of the state."

In addition to guiding the individual visitor, the new "Texas Travel Handbook" will serve as a reference tool for national travel writers, whose interest is increasingly focused upon Texas.

"Through Highway Department distribution channels," Greer said, "the new travel handbook will be placed in the hands of travel writers, editors and publishers throughout the United States -- and in fact, in many countries over the world. However," Greer said, "the Handbook will not be available in bulk quantities for redistribution. Rather, it will be provided on a select and individual basis to the actual traveler."

The publication represents the first attempt by a state agency to compile a comprehensive visitor's guide to Texas.

"We realize," Greer said, "in volume of this depth and detail, some omissions are inevitable at the first printing. As new sites and attractions develop, and our information is updated, subsequent printings will include those new ones."

Handbook subjects are as varied as the state itself, ranging from the melancholy Empty Saddle monument in Dalhart to the humorous Dovey statue in Crystal City. With the Handbook as a guide, travelers will discover scenic tracks and Indian pictographs; learn the location of little-known ghost towns, and follow specific directions to the most popular attractions of modern Texas cities.

Special sections provide information on recreational facilities at Big Bend National Park, four national forests, and more than 100 Texas State Parks. Summaries of Texas hunting and fishing regulations are provided, as well as information on visiting Mexico. In producing the book, the Highway Department was assisted by several groups including the Regional Chambers of Commerce of Texas, the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, Parks and Wildlife Department, Texas Water Development Board, and many other state and private groups. Significant contributions were also realized from city officials, civic and fraternal organizations, and numerous individuals interested in the Texas travel program.

The new "Texas Travel Handbook" will be available to more than 750,000 visitors who annually visit the Highway Department

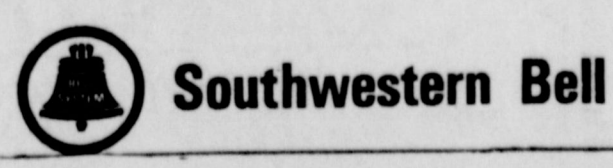

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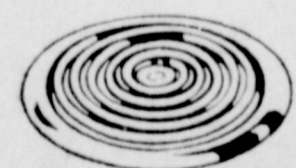
