Absentee votes can and do make the difference in many elections. In 1940 the Governor of Kansa, non reelection, with the absentee ballots giving him the margin of victory.
In 1960 Richard Nixon carried the State of CaliCornia by the margin of the absentee vote.
Today there are over a million Americans out side the continental limits of the United States. Many of them are of voting age, and only temporarily out of the country-in the military service, on assignments from their employers, or just traveling for pleasure.
One out of five Americans changes his domicile every year. Many of these people not yet qualified to vote in their new location may still vote by ab sentee ballot where they used to live by virtue of property. ownership or other legal consideration.
