Food Stamp Program Okayed For Year **By Commissioners Court For County**

Action of the Terrell County Commissioners Court Monday morning in their regular meeting included the adoption of the Food Stamp plan for one year at a cost of \$1,300 for administrative fees. Total budget for administration of the program in the seven-county area as of now is \$26,423, with \$8,128 being paid by the federal government.

The plan was presented to the Commissioners by the Terrell County Community Action Committee with L. E. Muller being the spokesman for the group. Muller is the president of the local committee.

The Food Stamp program is one of the outcroppings of the organization of the Terrell County Community Action Program Committee and their affiliation with the Big Bend organization composed of several West Texas Counties.

The Food Stamp program and other potential programs for adoption of counties within the Big Bend organization were gone over, some in detail and some only mentioned, at a meeting held recently in Alpine and attended by officers of the several counties' committees, county officers, businessmen, and other interested citizens. Cong. Richard C. White of El Paso was one of the speakers to the group assembled.





The program, as it is outlined now, means, in simple terms that a three-person household can purchase \$19 worth of food for \$3. These figures change, of course, as the original amount spent varies, and also as the net income of the household varies. The larger income, the smaller buying advantage, generally.

It is designed however to give those persons with the least income the better opportunity to get more foodstuffs with their dollars.

Regulations as they stand now will allow stores to participate in the handling of food stamps, if the stores agree to sell only edible products and food stuffs. This excludes such things as alcoholic beverages and household supplies.

It has not been decided yet what person or persons will disperse the stamps to the area, or where the stamp headquarters, if there is such, will be.

The United States Department of Agriculture will examine local persons to compose an administrative team, and probably a form of merit exam will be required. The USDA will have a man in Austin in charge of the Texas program.

Whether the stamps will be issued from one office or whether persons will travel throughout the area issuing the stamps is not yet known. At the present persons eligible for the program include those whose annual income is less than \$3,000. This is a widely-recognized limit, though it is flexible, sometimes depending on the number of children in the family and other factors. This figure also is subject to change and inter-







Oil Strike Seen In Terrell County

Hunt Industries, Dallas, completed as an unidentified Permian discovery its No. 1 Blackstone-Slaughter, Terrell County deep failure, 15 miles west-southwest of Sheffield, and 21/2 miles southwest of the depleted one-well Schuler (Leonard oil) field.

It was finaled to pump 11.67 barrels of 16.8 gravity oil, plus 5 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 265-1. Production was through perforations at 4,312-324 feet, which had been acidized with 2,500 gallons. Top of pay was picked at 4,422 feet on ground elevation of 2,607 feet.

Drilled "tight" to 12,488 feet, with 41/2-inch casing set at 12,485 feet, it is plugged back to 4,702 feet.

Location is 4,405 feet from the south and 4,250 feet from the east lines of 5-162-B. F. Allen.

Detailed Game Regulations Are Problem for Hunter

Ask a law enforcement specialist in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department what is his principal concern over the coming big game season, and he probably will say hunter carelessness in not being informed on where and what to shoot and how many.

There is the major worry about assorted dates for hunting deer and wild turkey. Then there is the problem of orienting the gunner about what is a legal deer and what is a legal turkey.

In some areas, taking of bearded hen turkeys is allowed. In others hens are fully protected. Some hunters naturally have problems telling a hen from a tom, beard or not.

The spike buck or legal buck situation confuses some because of conflicting regulations.

The tag on the left is labeled antlerless deer and is intended to be used only as a bonus tag in the counties where a third deer is permitted as a means of cutting into the huge surplus. In other words the two tags on the right side of the license may be used for either buck or antierless deer.

Law enforcement personnel stress that no - repeat NO antlerless deer may be shot except in areas where landowners issue permits. And there permits must be on the person of the hunter bagging the antlerless deer.

The department is eager to inform all hunters because game wardens stand instructed that ignorance of the law is no excuse for breaking it regardless of the circumstances.


