## 576 Register To Vote Here

People who are over 60 years of age and meet the other qualifications for voting, do not have to register to vote this year in Terrell County.

## MC Committees Report On Funds Used For Expenses

The Medical Center Committee reported recently that there had been none of the money that had been contributed to the medical center fund spent for any purpose and that all of the money collected was on hand and accountable.

Those in the position of trust had spent their own money for traveling, phone calls, postage, etc., and that all the stationery receipts, etc., had been contributed, thus eliminating the necessity of any of the funds that had been collected being diverted for other uses.

The committee members said they felt that the contributors had given to the fund to build the medical center and that not one penny of it had been earmarked for any other use. Since there were no contingency funds allocated so there was no other way to take care of the incidental expenses.

It was specified that there was no record kept of all of the expenses involved in phone calls, travel, writing, bookkeeping, collecting, etc., since none of the money spent was from the amount collected.

The executive committee and the heads of some of the other committees after checking all over town for incidental bills, expressed their thanks to everyone for their helpfulness in seeing that there were no bills that were owed over town and to all who made additional contributions in that manner.

## Local Grocers To Hear Details Of Food Stamp Plan

There will be a meeting of retail grocers of Terrell County to discuss the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food Stamp Program. The meeting will be in the county court room at 8:00 p. m. on Thursday, February 9.

All grocers and their employees are urged to attend this meeting as it will provide them with an opportunity to learn the details of the program.

The Food Stamp Program will be operated jointly by the Texas Department of Public Welfare, USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service and Terrell County.

John R. Boyd of the Consumer and Marketing Service will explain the program.

The program, now being set up in the seven-county area that is served by the Big Bend Community Action Program, has established an office for this area.

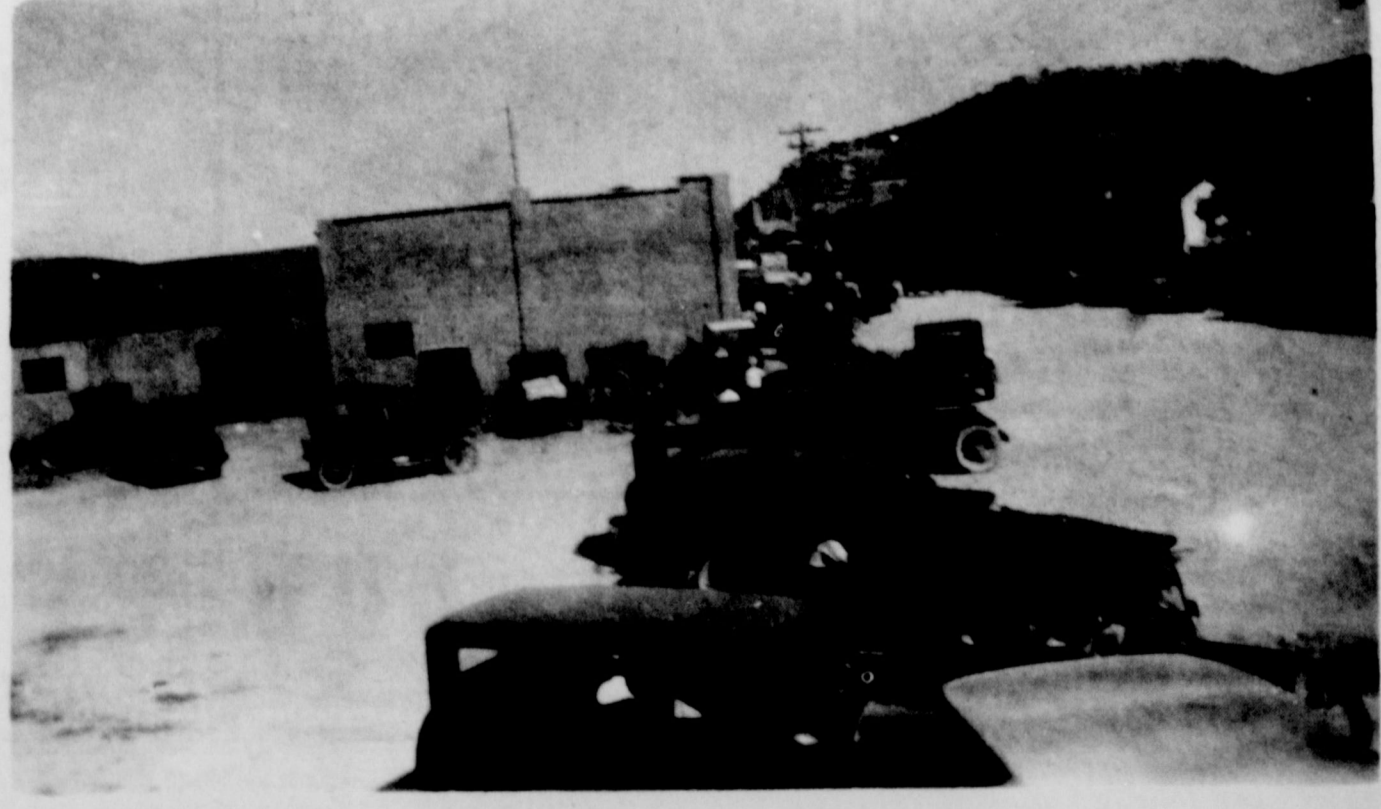
Families now receiving state welfare assistance are eligible under the program, which is designed to help them "stretch" their food dollars through a system of bonus coupons.

Coupons, which may be exchanged at licensed food stores, or route carriers of dairy products, are issued to eligible families according to monthly food requirements - with the number of bonus coupons depending on two factors - size of family, and cash income. Lowest income families receive a proportionately higher amount in bonus coupons.

Grocers are prohibited from redeeming the coupons for cash, or from giving money change when purchases are less than the coupon amount. They may be

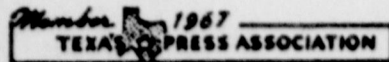

used to purchase only American grown and processed food products, but may not be used to purchase alcoholic beverages, tobacco in any form, or non-food items.

Participation by stores is voluntary. Those which are licensed will handle coupons in the same manner as money, depositing them along with cash and checks.

Re-education in buying methods will be needed in many of the homes which in the past have established a pattern of frequent purchases in small quantities. It will be necessary to buy in more economical sizes for longer periods of use, and there will be an incentive to shop carefully for maximum benefit for the coupons used.

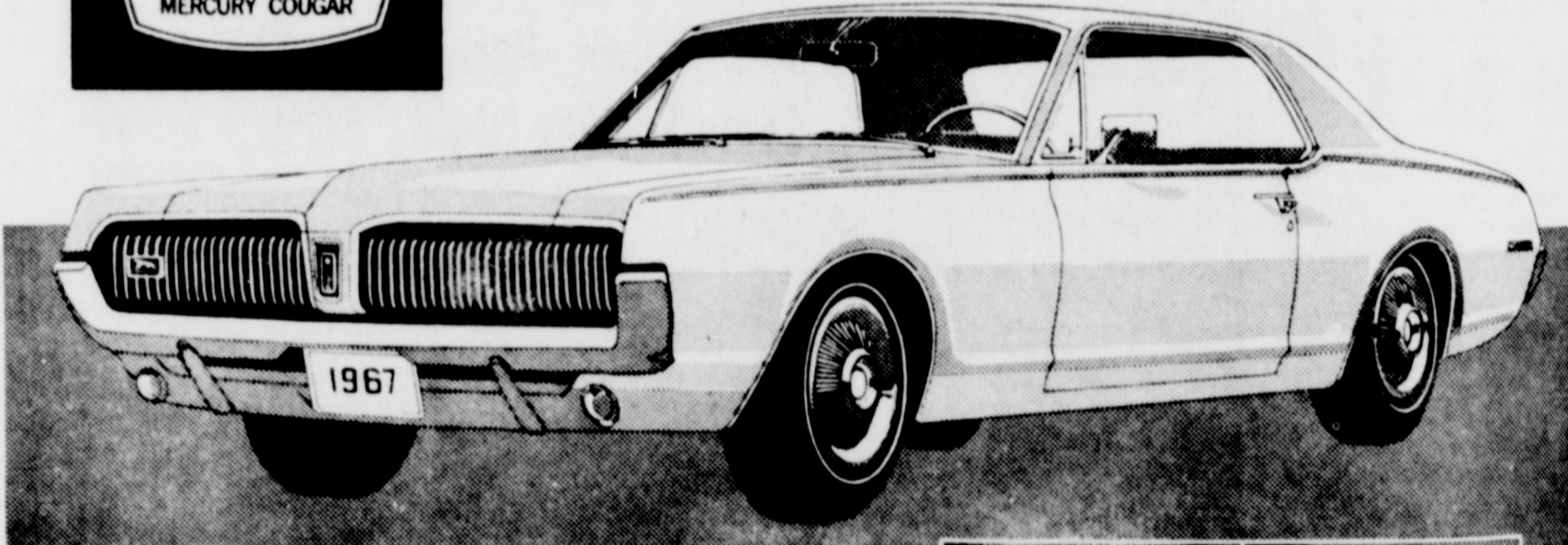

### Referendum Sought For Mohair Program Of Promotion

Ballots for voting in the referendum on the mohair promotion and marketing development program have been mailed to known eligible voters in Terrell County, E. E. Harkins, the chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced this week.

The referendum will not affect the mohair payment program itself, which is authorized by law through 1969. The voting will determine whether or not deductions will be made from the produce payments on mohair marketed during 1966-69. Funds collected would be used by the Mohair Council of America, Inc., to carry out a program of mohair advertising, promotion, and related activities under an agreement with the Secretary of Agriculture.

The proposed agreement will become effective if it is approved by at least two-thirds of the total number of producers voting or by producers having at least two-thirds of the total volume of production represented by votes in the referendum. The chairman points out that a similar agreement for wool and lamb has been in effect since 1955.

Approval of the new agreement would authorize payment deductions of up to 1 1/2¢ per pound on mohair in each year in which incentive payments are made on the commodity.

Producers eligible to vote in the referendum are all those who have owned Angora goats 6 months of age or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1966. Votes may be cast by individuals, partnerships, or corporations.

Producers may vote in the mail referendum during the 2-week period ending February 17. The long period is offered in order to encourage participation in the referendum by as large a number of mohair producers as possible. Preliminary referendum results will be announced as soon as possible.

Harkins urges any producer who believes he is eligible to vote and has not received a ballot through the mail to get in touch with his ASCS county office. To be counted, the ballots must be received by the county office, whether delivered in person or by mail, no later than Friday, February 17.

Let us always remember that God wills for every man the opportunity to earn salvation and has marked a clear path across the face of the earth.

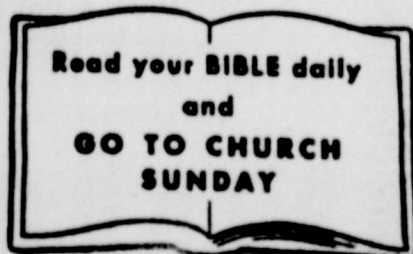
Because Christ did "taste death for every man" and remain perfect through sufferings, we may place our trust in God and share the great strength of faith.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was recited to close the meeting.

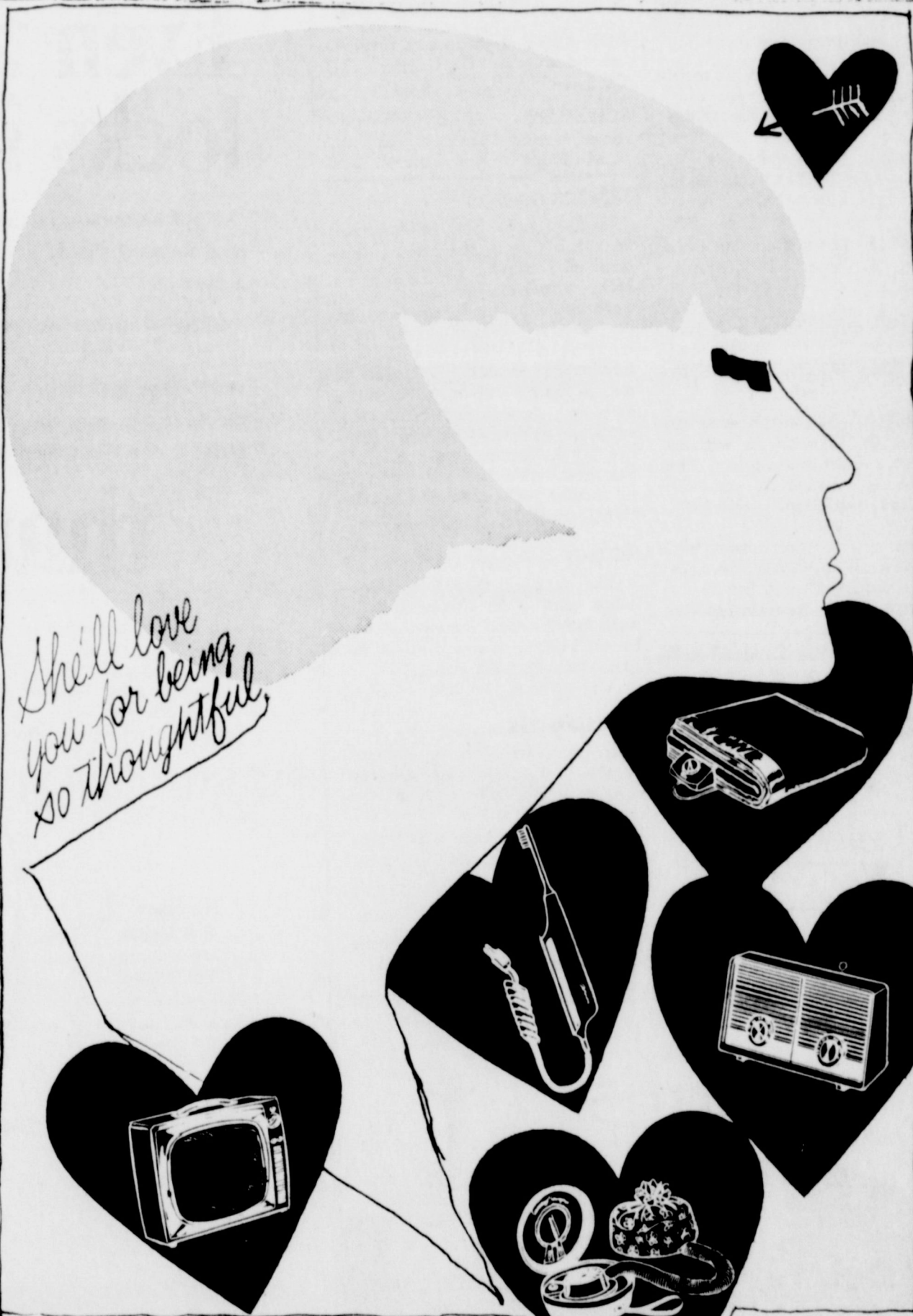

a \$136.8 million surplus. This is on September 1, 1965.

The next-to-last paragraph, and the last one says:

"On the basis of income over the past year, there should be more than enough to meet this total (the general appropriations bill to run state government for the next two years) and have some left over even if state income fails to increase as it has over the past several years.

"If state revenues continue

their present rate of increase total income should be approaching the \$2 billion per year mark by the end of this biennium!"

The figures show that there was \$136.8 million more taken in up to Sept. 1, 1965, than was paid out and was about \$40 million more than state officials anticipated when the 1966-67 budget was written by the legislators some six months prior to the writing of the story.

And we are told we need more tax revenue.

But these are big figures and there's a lot we don't understand.

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
