LISTEN TO LUKE

The other morning we got up a little earlier than usual - we have been doing that for the past two weeks since four of the grandkids are visiting us - and heard most of the "Today" show that comes on to keep the early risers company during their pre-dawn coffee.

This particular morning, Supreme Court Justice William Q Douglas was one of the guests on the program. He has quite a reputation - among other things - as being an outdoorsman of some note and was telling about some of the sights and conditions, as he saw them, in various parts of the United States in his travels.

Somehow the conversation wound around to the golden eagle in the Big Bend country of Texas and the Justice made some statements on nationwide television that were stated pretty much as a fact with which some people might take issue. In his discussion about the golden eagle, he said that the eagles in this part of the country come here from the north and east in winter. But due to the accuracy of the shooting of the ranchmen in this area and their persistence in ridding their land of the eagle, the bird has all but become extinct. He said in sum and substance, among other things, that there was a lot of doubt of the eagle's like for lamb or kid, that eagle nestings were almost non-existent now in this part of the country, and that one could travel in this area for days and not see a sign of the golden eagle because the bird was becoming so scarce.

We were glad to hear him make that last statement because there was some basis of agreement there.

Three times in my life have I seen an eagle flying, and for the life of me I couldn't tell if any of them were golden eagles or not, and the only thing that makes me think they were eagles is the fact of their being larger than buzzards and not having any characteristics of a crane or pelican, which we have also seen, as well as flamingos, egrets, herons, and a dove or two.

We have heard many ranchmen tell of hunting eagles for days on end, knowing it was eagles that were making kills, but being unable to see them when they were in the midst of their range. And we know lots of people who have lived in this country for a long time that have never seen an eagle flying. So Justice Douglas is not by himself in not having seen many eagles in his travels. He has some company in thinking that the golden eagle is becoming extinct, though there are also those who will firmly state that there are far too many of the birds alive and who are far more interested in the survival of their lambs and kids than they are in the survival of the golden eagle.

We would opine that it would be good for the ranchmen to get together and form a society called "Keep Innocent Livestock Living - Eagles Are Goats' and Lambs' Enemies". The letters could be used to shorten the name of the organization, a name continued to back page

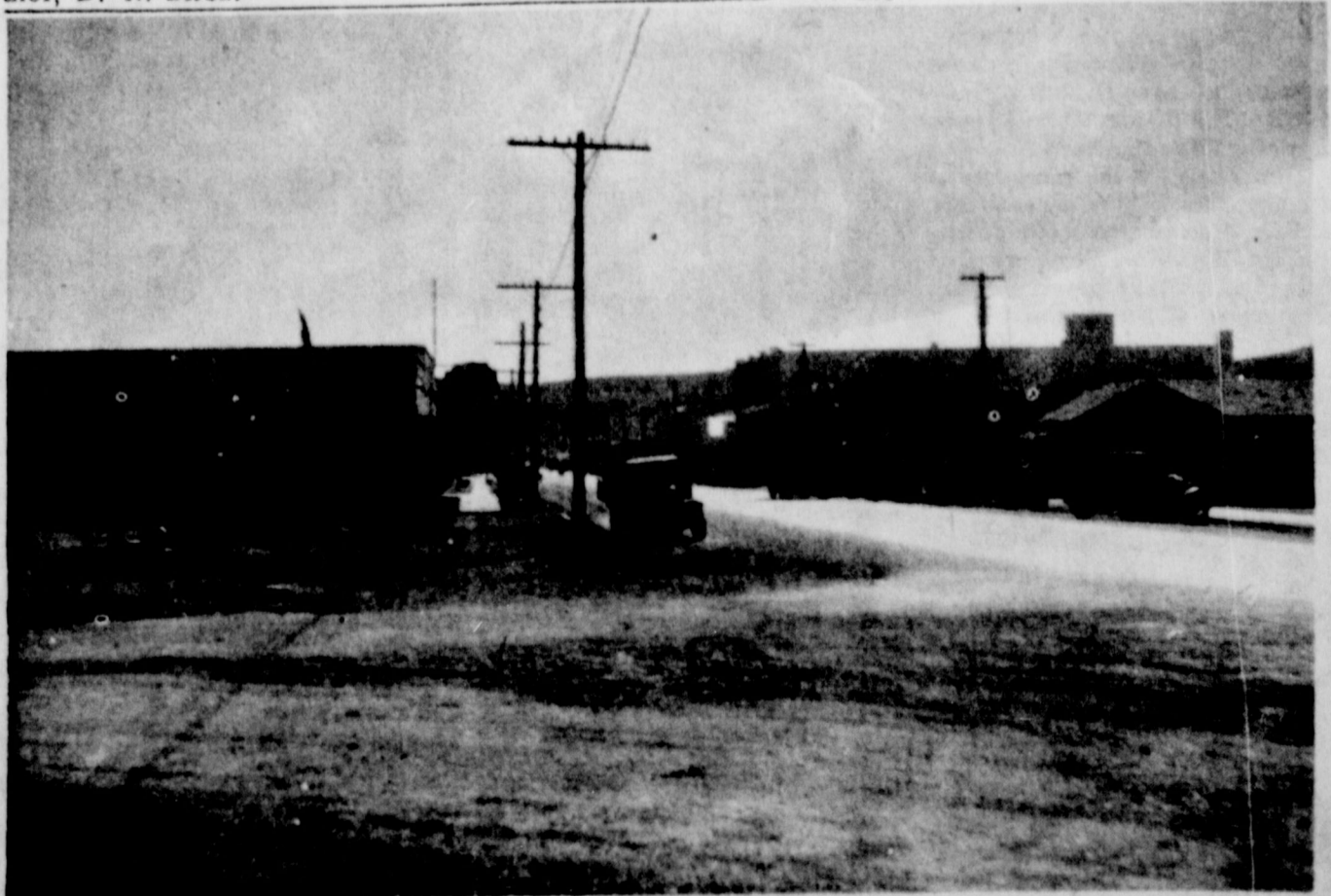
STEGALL NAMED DIRECTOR OF T&S GRA AT STOCKTON

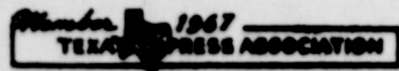

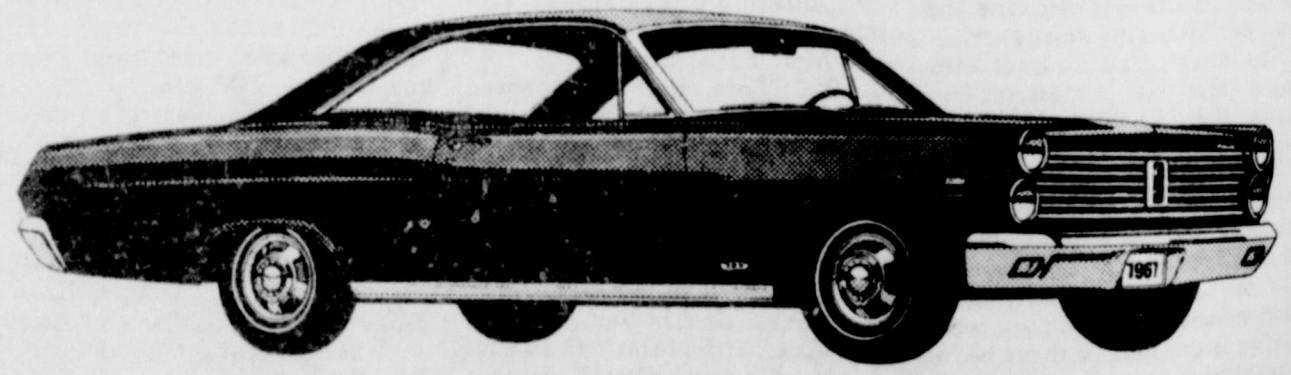

The centerpiece on the bride's table was a tall arrangement of white majestic daisies topped with a miniature bride and groom and surrounded by poufs of white net.

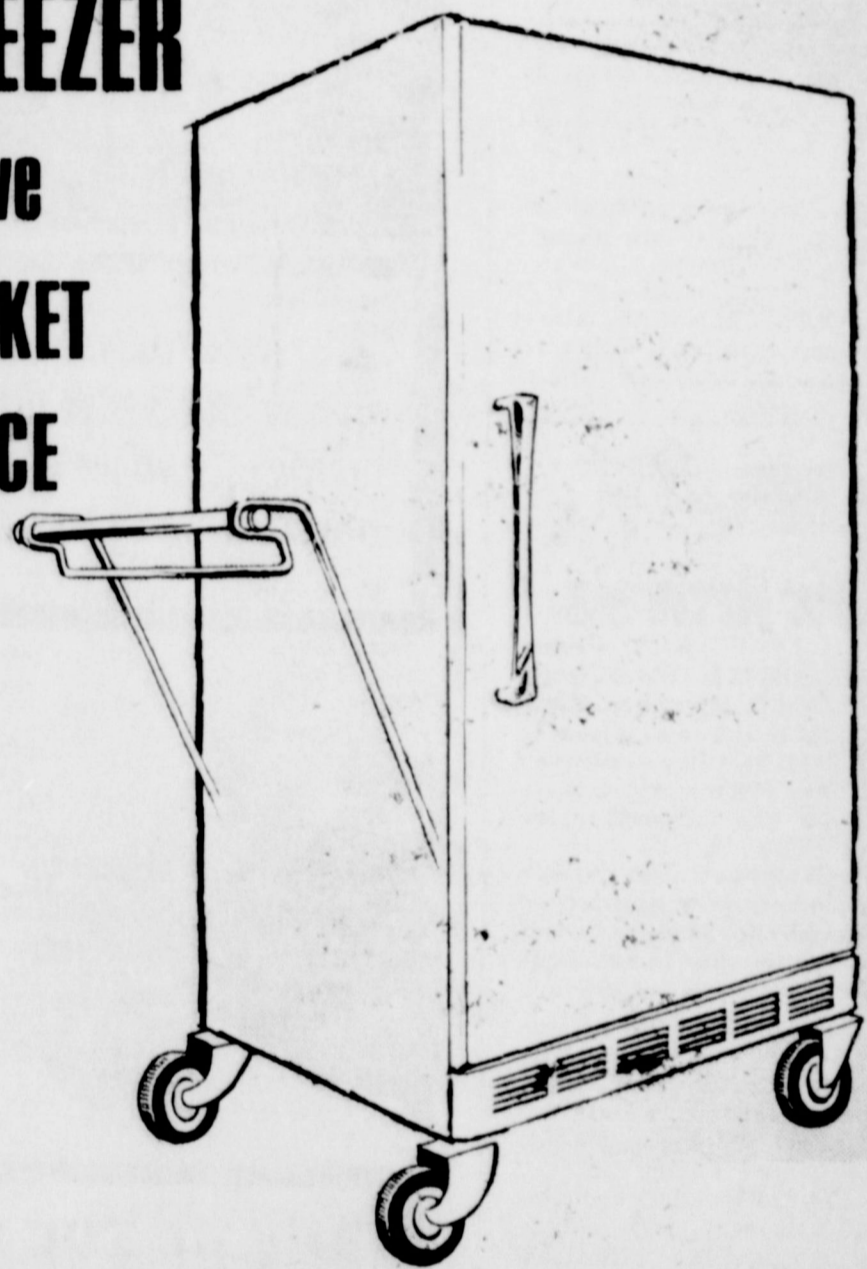
